USED BUTCHER KNIFE

Medford man slashes victim with fourteen inch knife.

Daniel A. Manning was bound over to the grand jury late yesterday afternoon by Justice Taylor on a charge of having assaulted Fred Hoffman, a stone decorator, with a long butcher knife. The court room contained a very fair display of cutlery during the hearing, exhibit No. 1 being a knife with a blade fourteen inches long and exhibit No. 2 was another knife with a blade about seven inches long, which, through a mere coincidence, happened into court on the same day, coming from the Manhattan cafe, where the fracas between a cook and a waiter was pulled off Saturday night.

The two men met on the railway track near Tenth street at 1:30 Sunday morning. An argument over a trivial matter started a fracas and the stone-cutter was slashed back of the left ear by the butcher, who, it seems, carried his full equipment of carving tools with him.

The injured man made his way to the United States chop house and inquired for a physician. Dr. Stearns responded to a telephone call and dressed the wound, or the man would soon have bled to death. The knife cut to the bone, laying the skull bare. He appeared in court yesterday with his head in bandages.

The police were notified and the butcher with murderous tendencies was escorted to the city bastille. The knife used was found on him, being a carving knife with a fourteen-inch blade, and plainly showed bloodstains.

PORTLAND LETTER.

West Will Show the East What it offers to Settlers. Oregon Pioneers will hold Reunion and Banquet June 21.

Portland, Or., May 23 (Special)—Representing ten Western states, the executive committee of the Western Development League met at the commercial club during the past week and mapped out a plan that promises to be of great benefit to the whole west. The purpose is to attract people from the crowded east to vacant lands of the west where there is room for millions to build happy homes.

The big drawing card proposed by the League is a special train of exhibit cars that will tour the east next fall and will give the people of that part of the country an object lesson of the opportunities to be found here. In this movement the commercial bodies, railroad, state officials and the Panama-Pacific Exposition will cooperate and share the expense. Prominent westerners will accompany the train and they plan to call on governors of the states visited and other leading men, interesting them in the campaign, which will be of such a magnitude as to be free from any selfish boosting by any narrow section.

At least five cars of exhibits will be taken along, showing the products of the west in a comprehensive fashion. This will be the biggest showing ever attempted along this line and is certain to attract much attention. The exhibits will later be placed at the Eastern land shows during the winter.

Mining men completed the organization of the Oregon Chapter of the American Mining Congress in Portland during the past week. The whole state being well represented. Steps were taken at the convention to put the industry on a better basis and considerable benefit to all engaged in the development of the state's mineral resources will result.

Oregon pioneers will hold their annual reunion and banquet at the Masonic Temple in Portland on June 21. Arrangements are now being made for this gathering by the Oregon Pioneer Association. Secretary Geo. H. Himes is arranging a program of unusual interest and a large number of the sturdy pioneers who laid the foundations of our state will meet and recall the incidents of the past. Indian War Veterans will meet here on June 20.

Oregon jewelers will meet in Portland on June 5 and 6, these being the dates fixed for the fourth annual convention. Trade matters will be discussed and entertainment features will not be overlooked.

Portland people are making their plans for the annual Rose Festival, June 5-10, and the whole city is looking forward eagerly to the event. It will be bigger and better than ever year and the larch string to the whole city will be out. Residents of other cities will be given a warm welcome.

Union will hold its annual horse show June 1, 2 and 3. Union county is the home of many fine horses and the exhibition will include high class draft stock, harness and fancy drivers. Some animals will be shown that will equal the best seen at national stock shows.

Portland's campaign for a big auditorium is now under way and there seems little doubt that it will be successful. Various business and improvement clubs are giving the movement their hearty support.

Workmen will soon be putting the finishing touches on the new McMinnville hospital.

The La Grande council has awarded an additional sewer contract for 7 1/2 miles, at \$40,000.

Silverton has the materials on the ground for the new water supply and sewer systems. Work will commence at once.

The Fraternal Brotherhood at Albany has opened a membership campaign. The mark set is 250 by October 1.

The old building of the First National bank at Medford has been torn down and a new building erected on the site.

The membership campaign of the Women of Woodcraft at Baker will close with a grand rally and banquet this evening.

Instead of cleanup day, the women of Astoria propose to make it clean up week, in view of the approaching centennial season.

The Silverton Marine band has been engaged to furnish music for the M. W. A. and R. N. A. picnic at Woodburn, Thursday, June 1.

The Carlton Sentinel has taken a house to house census of its town and counted exactly 554 people. This beats the government count by 168.

Madras Pioneer: The Central Oregon Well Drilling company has reached a depth of 100 feet in the well they are drilling for the O. W. R. & N. Railroad company.

It has been decided by the Madras council to proceed with the well for the city water system, whether the \$10,000 bond issue authorized is disposed of or not.

Eugene Register: Felix E. Moore of the Eugene High school has been elected principal of the Ashland High school. Ashland is now building a \$75,000 high school.

Ashland Record: Rev. George Williams has been called as pastor of the Christian church at Ashland. He will also have charge of the new church at Talent, which he organized.

Medford Mail Tribune: By a vote of 66 to 2 the city charter of Phoenix has been accepted by the citizens of that place. The much needed water system can now be installed and work will commence in the near future.

Hillsboro Independent: Mayor Bagley has donated his official salary for the next year and a half to the High school piano fund. He receives the magnificent stipend of \$3 per month, but the total amount will wipe out the indebtedness for the instrument.—Journal.

ALLEGED WHITE SLAVER

Is held to Federal Court. Bond fixed at \$5000.

John De Soto, the alleged white slaver, yesterday was bound over to the federal court by Commissioner Canon on three counts, after a hearing lasting a couple of hours. He had been indicted by the Jackson county grand jury, but the federal case will take precedence over the state's indictments, according to District Attorney Mulkey.

De Soto was taken to Portland, where he will have his next hearing before the federal grand jury. His bond was placed at \$5000.—Sun, May 23.

The Poultry Yard.

Good, clean runs are a delight to the hens.

Sometimes litter gets so filthy that it is worse than none.

Turkey eggs set this month should give good salable carcasses for Christmas feasts.

Leave it to the old hen to pick out the best nest to lay in. She can do it better than you can.

Two sprinklings a week with kerosene oil should keep the house free from insect pests. But be thorough.

Get the screens over the windows now, so that intruders will not disturb your favorites while they are asleep at night.

Are you troubled with crows about your chicken yards? Cover the pens with wire netting. That will fool the thieves.

Overfeeding must be avoided, as must also underfeeding. Either extreme will stunt the growth of the young stock.

Can't expect to succeed with broody hens, incubators and little chicks, these days, unless we stay close at home to meet all emergencies.

Feed very little soft feed and you will raise more chicks. If you must feed soft stuff don't throw it upon the ground. Feed it in a small trough or on a clean board.

Look suspiciously at eggs that have been laid in a stolen nest. They may be all right, but test them carefully, lest you lead some one who buys them to say things that will make your ears burn.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Supreme Court upholds the grazing regulations of the government.

Washington, May 24.—The decision handed down by the Supreme Court, on May 1, concerning the right of the Government to control grazing on the National Forests are of great interest to western people, and especially to the western stockmen. The right of the Government to control its own lands within the various States and Territories is so clearly defined that it is regarded by Secretary Wilson as establishing absolutely the position these lands occupy under the law. "I am very sure," said Secretary Wilson today, that the stockmen of the west, as well as the western people generally, will accept this decision of the Supreme Court at its full worth and that the controversy which has heretofore existed regarding the right to use the grazing lands within the various National Forests without permit from the Department of Agriculture will be brought to an end.

"The two cases decided were the so-called Light case, which originated in Colorado, and the case of the United States against Grimaud, Carajous, and Inda, three California stockmen. In the Light case one of the principal issues joined was on the question whether the fence laws of the State must be complied with in order that the United States might sustain action for trespass on the National Forests. The California case concerned the question whether violation of the National Forest regulations is punishable as a crime.

"Light is a Colorado stockman who, in 1906, turned his cattle loose on public land adjacent to the Holy Cross National Forest in such a way that they would naturally drift upon National Forest lands. Mr. Light refused to take any steps to prevent this and also refused to take out a grazing permit. It was maintained by Light's lawyers that, inasmuch as the laws of Colorado do not allow a private person any remedy against owners of stock which stray upon his land unless the land is fenced, the Government is without redress. An injunction was secured from the District Court requiring Mr. Light to take steps to prevent them from trespassing upon the National Forest. Mr. Light, however, refused to do this, with the backing of other stockmen of his state and, eventually, of the State of Colorado itself, which made a special appropriation for the purpose, carried the case up to the Supreme Court for final decision.
