Fraternal insurance is now under official supervision in this state, and every first-class fraternal order ought to be glad of it. The business transacted by the fraternal societies that issue insurance is a considerable percentage of the entire insurance business of the state; possibly, considering the risks taken in a numerical sense, it is the major percentage. There is little doubt, in fact, that fraternal insurance is a factor in the future welfare of a greater number of homes than that sold by the level premium companies. There is no doubt whatever that unregulated, fraternal insurance offers an inviting field for crooked exploitation in which the public becomes an easy victim, and regulation or supervision which will put a check on this sort of business will serve as a protection for worthy insurance orders and for the public as well.—Ex.
