Notice.

Whereas, it has been proven beyond doubt that the use of the common drinking cup is responsible for the spread of many infectious and contagious diseases, particularly is this true of such dire diseases as Consumption, Syphilis, Diphtheria and many others, and that

Whereas, The abolishment of what is known as the common drinking cup would be for the betterment of the public health.

Therefore be it resolved, by the Oregon State Board of Health that the use of the common drinking cup on railroad trains, in railroad stations, in the public and private schools, in all the educational institutions of the State of Oregon is hereby prohibited, from and after September 1st, 1911.

That on and after this date, no person or corporation in charge or control of any railroad station or any railroad train, electric car or any public conveyance or in any public or private school or any State educational institution shall furnish any drinking cup for public use, and no such person or corporation shall permit on said railroad train or station, or on said electric car or on said public or private school or on said public conveyance, the use of the common drinking cup.

Womanly Wisdom.

Now, joyously, fair June we greet,
Long parting makes her coming sweet;
And in her name, each soul drinks up

Strawberries and roses—hurrah! It's fun to be alive these days.

Needles are small and easily lost, but just secure a small bottle to keep them in and you will not be bothered that way any more.

For five cents you can get a brush that will help wash the vegetables for the table, before cooking. Saves wear and tear on the hands.

For variety cook some little white onions with the green peas. Fresh peas need no flavor but their own, but if not perfectly fresh the onions improve them.

When putting away your furs and woollens for the summer, brush them thoroughly and air them, sprinkle them liberally with black pepper to preserve from moths. There is no disagreeable odor and the pepper is usually on hand.

Strawberry jam: Pour a cupful of red currant juice over two pounds of granulated sugar and let it stand for twenty minutes, while you boil over a slow fire two pounds of mashed strawberries, stirring constantly. Add the sugar and currant juice and simmer for half an hour; skim, and when cold seal in tumblers with paraffine.

It is a waste of good material not to make pea soup every time you have peas for dinner. When they are boiled much of their value is left in the water, and when this is thrown away you do not get more than half of the good of them, and soup is always an excellent beginning for a dinner. To make it after the peas are shelled, wash the hulls and put them to cook in cold water that does not more than cover them. Let them simmer a while till they look "faded," then throw them away and put the peas to boil in the same water. When done, dish them as usual. They are improved by the additional flavor given by the hulls. Then add some good milk to the water and thicken it slightly with about a tablespoonful each of butter and flour rubbed to a paste, and season with salt and pepper. When peas are too old to be good, use them to thicken the soup by putting them through a colander. It is true of any boiled vegetable that much of its value stays in the water in which it was cooked; and any one of them can be made into soup in the same manner as the peas.

TOBACCO CHEFS.

Experts That Make Sauces For Flavoring the Different Brands.

"I am a tobacco chef," said the sallow man. "I make the sauces that give us smoking or chewing tobacco as a food chef makes the sauces which give us sole Colbert or poulet creole.

"Take this dark, sweet, juicy plug of 'navy brown,' so popular among the more prosperous type of teamsters. Well, the flavor of this plug is due to a sauce made of sugar, licorice, whisky and honey.

"Here is a mild, cool pipe tobacco that college boys favor. Smell it. Very aromatic, eh? Well, it has been steeped in a sauce composed of the essential oils of citronella, bergamot and cassia.

"But it is when you come to the high grade Havana cigar, the cigar that sells for 40 or 50 cents, that you see the tobacco chef at his best. He doesn't make his sauces then of such common ingredients as sugar, bergamot, licorice and so forth. No, he makes them of bacteria. The flavors of the high grade Havana tobaccos depend, you see, entirely on their ferments. Each tobacco undergoes a different fermentation, and here the chef comes in, applying the bacteria of years which cause these fermentations to the leaf.

"Yes, the tobacco chef of the highest type, the one who ferments Havana tobacco, handles the various breeds of bacteria as an ordinary chef handles pepper and salt, mustard and cloves and mace."—Buffalo Express.

Punishment After Death.
