Pittsburg, Aug. 22—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt does not want to be boosted for the Republican presidential nomination in 1912. Writing to A. P. Moore publisher of the Pittsburg Leader, the colonel makes the following request which was given out today:

I appreciate your kind and friendly feeling but am sure you will understand me when I say that I must ask not only you but every friend to see that no movement whatever is made to bring me forward for the nomination in 1912. I feel that I have the right to ask my friends actively to prevent such a move. I should esteem it a genuine calamity if such a movement were undertaken.

**THE COKE RECALL**  
**Is a Failure Owing to Lack of Funds.**

Roseburg, Or., Aug., 23.—Owing to lack of funds with which to circulate the necessary petitions it is understood here today that the movement to recall Circuit Judge John Coke, of Marshfield has been practically abandoned. It is said that considerable difficulty was encountered in securing signatures in outlying districts, especially in the four districts which, together with Douglas, comprise the Second Judicial District. The charge preferred against Coke by the recallers was to the effect that his instructions in the McCallen murder trial were such as to bias the jury in favor of the defendant.

**FIVE KILLED.**  
**By falling bridge near Roseburg Several injured.**

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 24.—A large bridge over the Umpqua river sixteen miles northwest of here collapsed this afternoon killing five and injuring several. The dead: Wm. Belieu, Gary Brown, Wm. Gardener, Peter McFarland, Wm. Accuta. A span of 300 feet collapsed and fell into deep water. The cause of the accident was defective timber in the upper frame work.

**POWER OF AN AUDIENCE.**

**Influence It Exerts Over an Actor or a Speaker.**  
 No orator living was ever great enough to give out the same power and force and magnetism to an empty hall, to empty seats, that he could give to an audience capable of being fired by his theme.

In the presence of the audience lies a fascination, an indefinable magnetism, that stimulates all the mental faculties and acts as a tonic and vitalizer. An orator can say before an audience what he could not possibly have said previous to going on the platform, just as we can often say to a friend in animated conversation things which we could not possibly say when alone.

As when two chemicals are united a new substance is formed from the combination which did not exist in either alone, the speaker feels surging through his brain the combined force of his audience, which he calls inspiration, a mighty power which did not exist in his own personality before he rose to his feet. No public speaker ever forgets that first surprising feeling of confidence.

Actors tell us that there is an indescribable inspiration which comes from the orchestra, the footlights, the audience, which it is impossible to feel at a cold mechanical rehearsal. There is something in a great sea of expectant faces which awakens the ambition and arouses the reserve of power which can never be felt except before an audience. The power was there just the same before, but it was not aroused.—Success Magazine.
