#### Oregon Sidelights.

The Coquille Herald, has moved into larger quarters.

The new home of the Farmers and Merchants bank at Stayton is completed, and the bank is moving in.

The deposits in the postal savings bank at Marshfield total about \$6000. Nearly all the depositors are foreigners.

The Myrtle Creek council has bought a new dynamo for the city lighting plant. It has the capacity of 1000 20-candle lights.

The Eugene Register describes snufflers, raised by W. E. Wilmer, that were 23 and 26 inches in circumference.

Jefferson Review: J. G. Crawford of Albany says the bars along the Santiam are full of water and moss agates, etc., of which he has one of the finest collections in the state.

The Central Point Herald has a report of cornstalks 12 feet high, with ears a foot long, raised by J. M. Samuels, on the Biddle ranch, in what is known as the Big Sticky.

A coyote last week appeared in the outskirts of Silverton in broad daylight and mortally injured a turkey hen belonging to F. E. Wray. He was driven away before he could devour the bird.

#### Oregon Loses Coal Trade.

The coal production of Oregon, as compiled by the United States Geological Survey, cooperating with the State Bureau of Mines, amounted in 1910 to 63,241 Short Tons, valued at \$214,119 at the mines.

The coal mining industry of Oregon, according to Mr. Parker, is suffering from the great increase in the production of petroleum in California and its use as fuel, for domestic needs as well as for railroads and for manufacturing. The production of coal in Oregon decreased from 87,276 short tons in 1909 to 63,241 tons in 1910, a loss of 24,035 tons, or 27.54 per cent. The value decreased \$10,966, or 4.66 per cent, from \$235,085 in 1909 to \$224,119 in 1910. Only two mines, the Newport and the Beaver Hill, both in Coos County, ship coal in large quantity, the shipments being made almost entirely by sea to San Francisco.—U. S. Geological Survey.

#### Students Begin Military Drill

Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 6.—At the first drill of the regimental corps of cadets at the Oregon Agricultural College this week, there were 720 recruits gathered in the big armory ready to join the various companies. The new commandant, Lieut. Miller of the 13th Infantry, had not yet arrived from Ft. McIntosh, Tex., so the regiment was in charge of Malcolm R. Cox of Schurz, Nevada, appointed commandant pro tem by President Kerr. Mr. Cox graduated from the college in '10, and was Lieutenant Colonel and Inspector General during his senior year. Last year he was graduate manager athletics.

#### Sparks and the Odor.

Every boy who has struck flints together to make sparks knows the typical odor that arises from the clash. He also knows that the whiter the flints the more smell they emit. This phenomenon has been observed for centuries, but scientific men have been at a loss to account for it. Many explanations have been given, but experiment has proved all of these to be erroneous. Recently, however, two Italian scientists, the brothers Piccardi, demonstrated that the smell of spark emitting flints is due solely to the minute quantities of organic matter that are upon the stone and that are burned by the sparks. This organic matter need be in only the most minute quantity, such as may be left by water in which lichens, weeds or water plants have decomposed, for the olfactory nerves are so exquisitely sensitive that they can detect the burning of almost infinitesimal bits of matter. The delicacy of these nerves is proved by the fact that even after the pebbles have been washed in lye the smell of burning can still be detected. But if the pebbles be heated in lye and then struck together at points that the hands have not touched there is absolutely no odor at all.—New York World.

#### Insects That Imitate Ostriches.

The habit of the ostrich of burying its head and imagining that it has eluded discovery is copied after a fashion by certain insects, according to Dr. G. Rodman in his lecture on the subject of the stick insect, or bacillus rossi, which he has cultivated. These insects, which are so called because of their resemblance to dry sticks, have two fore legs which they fold completely over their eyes when disturbed and evidently think that in so doing they themselves are lost to view. The eggs of these insects, Dr. Rodman says, take something over six months to hatch. They are only one-tenth of an inch in their longest diameter, and by some miracle an insect which at hatching is three-quarters of an inch in length is packed into them. The stick insects destroy the weavings of their number by eating their legs.—Westminster Gazette.

#### A Whack at Turtle Soup.

Turtle soup is called green just because turtle fat is "kinder that color." And believe it, whether you now do or not, turtle soup will make anybody sweat green who eats it of often and much. Hogarth has a picture showing how green turtle soup and its fellow foods and drinkables in the good old golden days put London aldermen under the tables. From the viewpoint of nourishment turtle soup is not worth a tenth its costs. Sun dried turtles are found in some of the markets of the world, and many chefs say they are about as good as the fresh reptile. As for the true secret of mock turtle soup, it is only the scalp of a sucking calf, a gelatinous fraud, masquerading as a chunk of green turtle shell fat, but even so, it is better than the best genuine sea turtle soup at that.—New York Press.

#### A Floor That Turns Over.

The floor in the Apollo theater in Paris is reversible, one side being made for dancing, the other being the usual inclined floor equipped with the folding seats of a theater auditorium. The floor is mounted on a horizontal axis on which it revolves. It is built on a framework of steel girders, has an area of 2,500 square feet and weighs 100 tons. The axis, which is parallel to the front of the stage, is not in the middle of the thickness of the floor, but nearer to the seating surface than to the dancing surface. The floor swings through an excavation over thirty feet in depth.—Cement Age.

#### Coffee and Fatigue.

The question is often asked, What will relieve fatigue more quickly than anything else? Clerks in stores and men generally, as well as women shoppers, become at times very tired. Fortunately the British army has thrashed the question out and tried every kind of decoction that could be thought of, and we may profit by its experience. It awards the palm to coffee and declares it has neither superior nor equal for this purpose.—Indianapolis News.
