**ORDINANCE NO. 139**

AN ORDINANCE providing for the issuance of bonds by the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, Oregon, in the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) for the purpose of constructing a system of water works to supply the said city and inhabitants thereof with water, providing for and approving the sale of said bonds, approving the form of said bonds and the coupons attached thereto, and declaring an emergency. THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:  
 WHEREAS, heretofore at an election held by said city the legal voters of said city authorized the issuance of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) of bonds for the purpose of constructing a system of water works to supply the said city and the inhabitants thereof with water, and,  
 Whereas, pursuant to said authorization, an agreement has been entered into for the sale of said bonds when the legality of the same shall have been approved by the attorneys for the buyers of said bonds; and,  
 Whereas by an act approved by a majority of the qualified electors of said City of Jacksonville at a special election regularly called and held on the 21st of June, 1911, the Common Council of the City of Jacksonville was authorized and empowered in the name of the said City to borrow money and pledge the credit of said City therefor and to issue Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) of bonds of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, dated October 1, 1910, due twenty years after said date, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent. (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, interest and principal payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in the City of New York, said bonds to be known as water bonds of the City of Jacksonville, State of Oregon, AND WHEREAS, said act went into force and effect upon the proclamation of the Mayor that said act had been passed by the vote of the qualified electors at said special election, which proclamation was made as by law required on the 29th day of June, 1911, and filed in the Office of the Recorder of the City of Jacksonville, on the 29th day of June, 1911,  
 NOW THEREFORE THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:  
 Section 1: That the City of Jacksonville do issue bonds in the name of and under the corporate seal of said City in the amount of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) each, numbered consecutively from No. 1 to No. 60 inclusive; the entire issue of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) of bonds aforesaid to bear interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and said bonds to bear date October 1, 1910, and to become due and payable October 1, 1930, both principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in the City of New York; said bonds to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, whereby the City of Jacksonville shall be held and considered in substance and effect to undertake and promise in consideration of the premises to pay to the bearer of each of said bonds at the expiration thereof the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of America, together with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, which bonds shall be known as,  
 CITY OF JACKSONVILLE WATER BONDS,  
 the interest on said bonds being represented by coupons, annexed thereto, bearing the lithographed fac simile signature of the Mayor and Recorder.  
 Section 2. The following form be and the same is, hereby approved and declared to be the form of said City of Jacksonville Water Bonds, to-wit: UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, STATE OF OREGON  
 CITY OF JACKSONVILLE, JACKSON COUNTY, WATER BOND  
 NO. .... \$500.00  
 KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, that the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, Oregon, for value received, acknowledges itself indebted and hereby promises to pay to the bearer, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) in Gold Coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, on the First day of October, 1930, with interest thereon in like Gold Coin at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the First day of April and on the First day of October in each year. Principal and interest payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in the City of New York upon presentation and surrender of this Bond and annexed coupons as they severally mature.  
 This Bond is one of a series of bonds of the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, Oregon, of like date and tenor numbered consecutively from one, to sixty, inclusive, aggregating not to exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.) par value and amount, issued by the said City of Jacksonville for the purpose of constructing a system of water works to supply the said City and inhabitants thereof with water, and the issuance of said bond and all of said bonds is by virtue of and in full compliance with all the provisions of an Amendment to the Charter of the City of Jacksonville, adopted by the qualified electors of the said city of Jacksonville, at a special election held on June 21, 1911, and proclaimed by the Mayor on June 29th, 1911, and filed with the Recorder on said June 29th, 1911.  
 And it is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, things elections, votes, orders, ordinances, resolutions and conditions precedent to the right to issue and deliver this bond, as prescribed by the said charter and by the constitution and laws of said state have happened existed and been done and performed prior to the issue hereof in regular and due time form and manner as required by law and that the indebtedness of the said, city of Jacksonville including this bond and the issue of which the same forms a part does not exceed any constitution al, statutory or charter limitation.  
 And for the punctual payment at maturity of the principal and interest of this bond, the faith and credit of the City of Jacksonville are irrevocably pledged.  
 IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, the City of Jacksonville has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor, countersigned by its Recorder, and sealed with its corporate seal, and the interest coupons hereunto attached to be executed in its behalf by the engraved fac simile signature of its Mayor and Recorder: this the First day of October, A. D., 1910.

 Section 3. That the following be and the same hereby is approved and declared to be the form of coupon to be attached to the said City of Jacksonville Water Bonds:  
 Coupon No. .... \$.....  
 On the First day of ..... 19.....  
 the City of Jacksonville in the County of Jackson, State of Oregon, will pay to the bearer fifteen dollars (\$15.) in gold coin of the United States at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in the City of New York, being six months interest on its Water Bond, No. ....  
 Mayor,  
 Attest: .....  
 Recorder of the City of Jacksonville.  
 Section 4. That the bid of Ulen & Co., heretofore duly transferred to Morris Brothers of Portland, Oregon,

heretofore made for the proposed issue of bonds under this ordinance, which said bid is on file in the office of the City Recorder, for the purchase of said bonds be and the same hereby is accepted.  
 Section 5. That the Mayor and the City Recorder be and they hereby are authorized and instructed to prepare and deliver the City of Jacksonville Water Bonds to Morris Brothers in accordance with the terms and conditions of the bid of said Ulen & Co., duly transferred as aforesaid to said Morris Brothers as in this ordinance hereinbefore provided.  
 Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.  
 Section 7. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the health, safety and peace of the City of Jacksonville, it is this, that the present system of water supply is insufficient, inadequate and unfit to supply the City and inhabitants thereof with an adequate supply of good, pure and wholesome water; and inasmuch as the charter of said city provides for the erection and maintenance of a water system and waterworks to supply the City with water for a sewer system and for other useful and beneficial purposes, and to issue its duly authorized bonds therefor; and inasmuch as improvements have been undertaken and are under way; and inasmuch as the issuance of said bonds has been approved by a vote of the electors of said city at an election regularly held therefor, and inasmuch as the contract for purchase of said bonds has been entered into and the form of bond must be approved before the purchasers will accept the same, AN EMERGENCY IS THEREFORE HEREBY DECLARED, and this ordinance shall go into force and effect from and after its approval by the Mayor and publication.  
 PASSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, on this the 3rd day of November, 1911, by the following vote:
