

PORTLAND LETTER

Oregon's Methods are being Adopted by Other States.

Portland, Or., Nov. 15, (Special).—Oregon's influence beyond the state lines was illustrated during the past week when the Portland Commercial Club's special train excursion visited Lewiston, Idaho, and Walla Walla, Wash. In both places the Oregon system of community publicity was praised and the same methods were incorporated in the Idaho-Washington Development League. Relations between this state and its neighbors were never so cordial and the whole northwest is actively co-operating for development of the whole section.

The program for the twentieth annual meeting of the Oregon Dairyman's Association, to be held in Portland December 7-8, has been issued and it contains a great deal that will be of much interest to the keeper of cows. Addresses by practical experts and exhibits showing improved methods will be seen. Nothing can be of greater value, not only to those actively engaged in the dairy industry, but to the whole state as well. A large attendance at the sessions of the convention is expected. Butter and cheese makers will meet in Portland at about the same time.

A special committee of the Portland Commercial club is boosting flax culture with the hope of building up and industry in this state. A meeting was held during the week and considerable progress is being made. Investigations have shown that flax of exceptionally long fibre can be grown here and all facilities are favorable for linen manufacture.

The seaweed of the Pacific Coast will produce \$12,000,000 annually in potash for fertilizer is a discovery lately made by Secretary Wilson of the Department of Agriculture. Here is a chance for Oregon's coast line to contribute an entirely new product to the wealth of the state.

Hood River and Albany have held their apple fairs and are ready to show their prize-winners at the Oregon Apple Show in Portland November 15-18. Both fruit displays were a credit to the two apple centers and they will be heard from when the prizes are awarded at Portland. Preparations are complete for this event and it promises to be the best exhibit yet held by the State Agricultural Society.

A step of state-wide value has just been taken at the Oregon Agricultural College, where a division of extension has been added to the organization, the object being to extend the work of the institution into every section of Oregon. Instruction in farming will be carried into the homes so that people on the farms may carry on such studies as they wish. Farmers' Institutes will be extended and the scope of the work of the college will be much enlarged. One of the most important things contemplated by the new work will be a campaign to have agricultural instruction carried on in the rural and city schools of the state.

to Increase Bounty on Cougars

Several important policies decided on by the Oregon Game and Fish Commission are announced as the result of painstaking work on the members. The Legislature will be asked to increase the bounty on cougars, lynxes, wolves and other predaceous animals. The present bounty on cougar, is only \$10, a figure which hardly would induce the rancher or woodsman to train and keep "varmint" hounds. No decision has been reached as to the amount to be recommended as a bounty for cougars, but the lower limit will not be less than \$25, and it may be double that figure. While there may be some difficulty in convincing a majority of the Legislature of the fact, practical men know that payment of \$50, for every cougar killed would be economy, while the bounties on wolves and other marauders of the wilds should be correspondingly increased.

Hereafter young salmon and trout will not be liberated from the hatcheries until they are 8 months or a year old and able to escape the onslaught of predaceous fishes. This plan will cost more money, but it necessarily must result in all good streams of the state once more teeming with trout. Master Fish Warden Clanton was authorized to construct a new flume at the Bonneville hatchery, which will provide 22,000 gallons of water a minute for the fishpools and make the hatchery the largest of its kind in the world.

The commission will stand firmly behind all its employees performing their duties and authorized Clanton H. W. Trembath a deputy warden, who shot a fisherman charged with poaching near the falls in the Willamette River at Oregon City.

In view of the comparatively small quantity of eggs taken in the various streams this year it is possible that

racks may be moved nearer the mouth of such streams. Flumes will be installed to supply more water at the McKenzie and Wallula hatcheries. The Master Fish Warden was authorized to purchase 1,000,000 Eastern brook trout eggs to increase the supply taken from Oregon streams. If a site can be procured a trout hatchery will be established on Spring Creek, in Klamath County.

Chairman C. K. Cranston presided over a meeting of the Commission held yesterday and attended by Secretary J. Frank Hughes, Warden Clanton G. H. Kelly and M. J. Kinney.
