



PORTLAND LETTER

Panama Canal Will Be Great Boom To Fruit Growers.

Portland, Or., Nov. 21 (Special).—That the completion of the Panama Canal will mean millions of dollars annually to the fruit growers of the Pacific Northwest was the statement of J. N. Teal in an address to the State Horticultural Society at its annual meeting. He believes the fruit grower will profit more by the opening of the canal than the man engaged in any other industry, with the possible exception of the lumberman, although producers generally will be much benefitted.

Mr. Teal told of the reduced freight rates to the markets of the world that will follow when the canal is opened, while at the same time better rates will lower the cost of almost all the horticulturist uses. Markets for fruit will be widened greatly because of cheapening of transportation and Mr. Teal estimates a saving of approximately \$20,000,000 in freight charges to growers of the Northwest each year.

Oregon will have a creditable exhibit on board the Governor's Special train that leaves St. Paul Nov. 27 for a three weeks tour of the East. Various communities have contributed products and the exhibit has been sent forward. It is believed such a showing will have a good effect in attracting settlers to this state.

A deal is now being negotiated for the title to hop lands near Independence where by Kerbs Bros. and Pacific Coast brewers will combine yards with an aggregate of 1000 acres. The company will have a capital stock of \$250,000 and this farm will be the largest in the largest in the world given over exclusively to hop growing.

The first cargo of lumber to be used in the construction of the Panama-Pacific Exposition buildings went from an Astoria mill. The Pacific Northwest will probably supply many cargoes for this purpose during the pre-exhibition period.

Legations that will give the buyer of cloth the same protection as the pure food law gives the purchaser of provisions is to be sought as the result of the recent convention of Oregon wool growers. "Pure Wool" may be demanded and those making and selling goods of a poorer quality must label their product, showing how much wool and how much shoddy the goods contain, if the proposed measure is made a law.

To get due recognition for the Col-

umbia and Snake rivers in appropriations by the Government, the whole Northwest is interested in sending a strong delegation to the Rivers and Harbors congress which will be held at Washington, D. C., December 6 to 8. Oregon, Washington and Idaho commercial bodies are naming delegates and it appears there will be a good representation.

Hood River's Commercial Club want 300 new families to settle there next year and will carry on a more extensive publicity campaign to attract them. The Ashland Commercial Club is in good shape, out of debt, with money in the treasury. Springfield business men have just held a house warming in their new Commercial Club quarters and they look forward to an active year.

RURAL HYGIENE

O. A. C. Bacteriology Department Plans Health Talks for Farmers' Short Course.

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 18.—"The farmer ordinarily gives far more attention to health of his stock than to that of himself and family," said Prof. T. D. Beckwith of the bacteriology department of the Oregon Agricultural College in speaking of the course on rural hygiene to be inaugurated this winter during the short course.

"The point that the health of the people may be reckoned in dollars and cents to the community escapes the average citizen in his mad scramble for more evident wealth," he continued. "For example, it is computed that the annual loss to the United States through human tuberculosis amounts to \$6,000,000 which is approximately three fourths the value of the entire wheat crop of the country. This immense annual loss, about 75 per cent of which is preventable, is due solely to carelessness and ignorance of the most rudimentary rules of life and health. Of vastly greater importance than the money loss is the pain and suffering most of which can be prevented by a little care and knowledge."

The short course lectures, which will be illustrated with stereoscopic views will cover such subjects as water supply (especially from wells), their location and construction as to health; sanitary methods of sewage disposal, the use and abuse of septic tanks; transmission of disease, such as tuberculosis and typhoid; flies and germ carrying; cause of colds and grippe and other epidemics.

TROUT FOR OREGON

A large number of Young fry to be Released in Oregon waters.

Six hundred and twenty-five thousand black spotted trout are being held at the Bonneville hatchery, all of which will be released in the various waters of the state as soon as the special tanks that are being constructed are completed and the little fish are old enough to take care of themselves. These trout eggs were secured from the Yellowstone country, where they were taken by the Government.

This release of trout is especially designated to assist in the re-stocking

of several of the streams of the State. Under authority of the State Fish and Game Commission, Warden Finley has been instructed to designate the waters into which the trout will be liberated. Under the state law, any stream may be closed by commission for a period, for a purpose of re-stocking or protecting fish.

To entail as little hardship as possible upon the anglers of the state, the State Game Warden believes that some of the upper small tributaries of the rivers of the state would be the best grounds for the trout. These tributaries will then be closed for two or three years, and at the expiration of that time opened again, when fishing in the main streams will be unexcelled. It is believed that in time, the trout will be able to propagate and mature sufficiently to amply re-stock the main river.

It will be the policy of the warden to make the distribution as wide as possible, closing small tributaries in all parts of the state. A year hence the same plan will be followed, so that after three years, many new streams will be opened for fishermen, every year.

About 75,000 steelhead trout are now being released in the upper tributaries of the Clackamas River. These have been fed by the state for some time, but have been at the government station at Cazadero. The commission is now getting ready to gather a large number of trout eggs at the coast stations, and up the Mackenzie. This work will be done in the spring.

MEETING OF COUNCIL

Held Monday Evening. Resolution for laying water mains and assessing property benefitted.

An adjourned meeting of the council was held in the City Hall Monday evening. Present: Mayor Shaw, Councilmen Britt, Dunford and Fick; absent Greive.

A communication from the Rogne River Title-Abstract Co. in regard to the making of a "Present Ownership" and official map of the city, was read and after some explanatory remarks by Mr. Hoggett, the president of the company the matter was continued for further consideration at a later time.

Resolutions Nos. 11, to 32, both inclusive, declaring the intention of the council to make improvements upon the parts of streets mentioned in the resolutions by laying water mains thereon, were regularly introduced and passed by the unanimous vote of all the members present. The resolutions also approve and adopt the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Surveyor now on the file in the Recorder's office and direct that proper notice be given to those interested.

The matter of repairing certain street crossings and water ditches was discussed in an informal manner it being the sense of the council that the same be repaired at once.

On motion council then adjourned.
