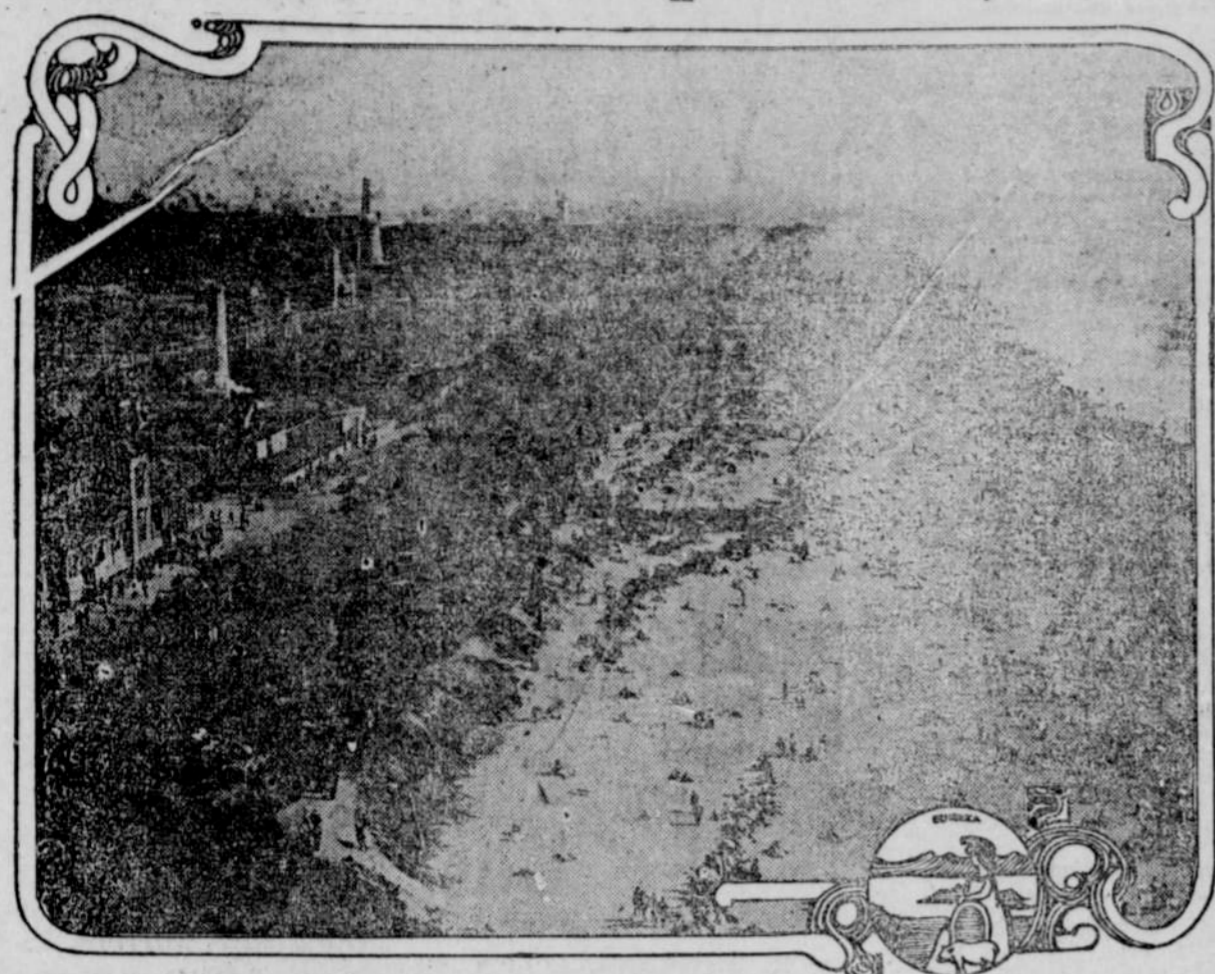
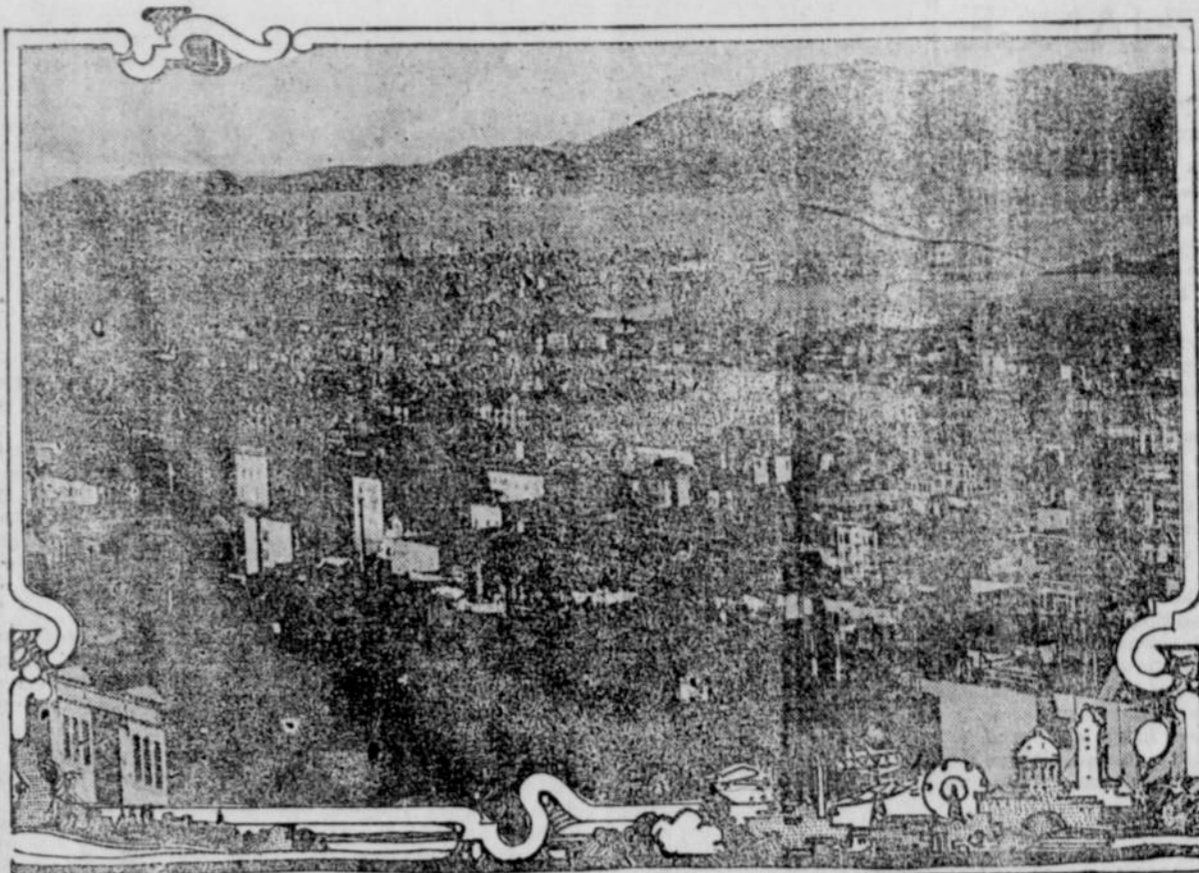


# Panama Exposition, San Francisco, California, 1915

### Ashland Tidings advises looking for Motive.

When things happen it is a good idea to look for a motive. For example: County Clerk Coleman began to give out information in relation to bad management of county affairs. He was a very popular man in Jackson county. Many voters expressed the wish that he become a candidate for county judge.  
The "gang" at Medford were tooting Mayor Canon for the place. If the records and circumstances tended to show that most of the bad management by the present county court was brought about by its close alliance with the Medford gang it would be bad for Canon. The facts so far made public tended to show that.  
Therefore, it was necessary to silence the reports coming from the clerks office.  
Somebody dug down and found that County Clerk Coleman had technically violated the state law in not remitting license money collected by his office. He was arrested by a game warden, tried in a Medford justice court fined by a Medford judge—and the fine was remitted.

### Oregon Sidelights

Sheriff Gage of Coos county intends to put county jail prisoners to work on the county roads.

### Bean Growing Profitable.

A limited area in the wheat growing region of Eastern Washington, eastern Oregon and northern Idaho is adaptable to bean growing. Many farmers of Latah and Nez Perce counties, Idaho, and a few farmers in Umatilla county, Oregon, have been raising beans instead of summer fallowing for the past fifteen years. At first bean culture was carried on only in an experimental way, but of late years beans have become a staple crop about Kendrick and Juliaetta, Idaho, and have taken the place of the old summer fallow system to a great extent.  
According to the most successful beans growers the labor cost of an acre of beans is about \$9. If the producer receives 3 cents per pound, which is a fair price, 300 pounds of beans will pay expenses on an acre

of the crop. The average crop in the Kendrick section is about 800 pounds per acre many fields yielding as high as 1200 to 1400 pounds per acre. If the farmer raises an average crop and receives 3 cents per pound for his product he will clear approximately \$15 per acre over and above the labor cost. In addition to this the beans should be credited with the average cost of summer fallowing. Besides yielding a very good profit this crop leaves the ground in excellent condition for fall seeding.
