MEETING

Held Tuesday Evening.
Only Routine Business Transacted.

The City Council met in regular session. Present Mayor Shaw; councilmen Britt, Dunford, Fick and Grieve, Recorder Dox.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Reports of committees received and filed.

Application of L. I. Brown for saloon license was presented and on motion bond was approved, and license ordered issued.

The regular monthly accounts were audited and warrants ordered drawn in payment thereof.

On motion council adjourned to meet Thursday evening.

ADJOURNED MEETING

Of City Council. Held Thursday night.

Pursuant to adjournment the city fathers met at council chambers at 8:25 Thursday night.

Mayor Shaw in the chair; all members of the council being present at roll call.

A number of bills were presented and allowed with the exception of the bill of Dr. Golden for medical attendance on a prisoner confined in the city jail, which bill was laid on the table.

The question of surveying the streets of city was informally discussed, it being the general opinion that a survey was not necessary at this time.

An ordinance prepared by A. C. Hough, counsel for the Electric Company, proposing an amendment to the city charter, was read and passed without discussion.

A resolution calling a general election for March 5th, and naming the election officers was presented and adopted.

Mr C. F. Hoefs appeared before the council in regard to street and boundary lines in the south end of the city. Council then adjourned.

PROPOSED ENABLING ACT

Adopted by committee appointed Governor West.

An act entitled "An Act to Enable the Several Counties of This State to Avail of the Provisions of Section 10 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, as Amended by Initiative Petition Effective on Proclamation of the Governor December 3rd, 1910."

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. That any county in this state desiring to incur a debt for permanent roads within said county may, by an election called by the County Court upon the petition of ten per cent of the legal voters computed upon the last registration lists compiled in said county, by a majority of those voting on the question create and issue bonds warrants or other evidence of indebtedness or debts for permanent roads or for construction, maintenance, improvement or repair of the same within said county.

Section 2. All acts, or parts of acts, in any way inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Act, are hereby repealed.

PORTLAND LETTER

State Wants Share of Reclamation Fund. Convention to Consider Immigration Question.

Portland, Or., Feb. 6 (Special)—In response to several hundred invitations to be held in Portland February 19-21, a large number of acceptances have been received. The interest in this centers particularly in two things, judging from the letters received at the headquarters of the Oregon Development League: There is an unanimous sentiment for registering Oregon's demand for a more just share of the reclamation appropriation according to Oregon's contributions. There is also a strong desire for a spirit of co-operation among those chiefly interested in the principal irrigation projects of the state and for a better understanding of the problems common to them all. It is believed that united action in this respect will mean much for the development of the state. Among those who have promised to be present are members of the Legislature, state officials, members of the Desert Land Board, presidents of water users associations and water supervisors.

Reports from all over the state indicate that Governor West's proclamation setting aside this week especially for the consideration of the subject of good roads is being acted upon with great enthusiasm. His message was an appeal to the citizens of Oregon to get ready for the opening of the Panama Canal and thus provide the easiest possible access to the interior country. Under the auspices of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement, copies of the eight bills that have been prepared were sent to the commercial clubs and to the newspapers. The secretary of the Oregon Development League sent out a message that as this question was not a political issue, he urged that special meetings of the commercial bodies affiliated with the League be held to discuss good roads and to make their recommendations.

Calvin S. Thomsen, who has been employed by the Oregon Bankers Association and the Oregon Agricultural College to carry out plans for the encouragement of agriculture among the school children of the state, started his work this week by visiting Tillamook, Lincoln, Yamhill and Benton counties. Preparations were made for his reception by the county superintendents and meetings of the commercial organizations held at the points at which he stopped gave him an opportunity to explain his mission. He announces prizes will be given for displays by school children in agriculture, wood-working, sewing, cooking, and poultry and hog raising.

A convention to consider the question of immigration, as it will affect the Pacific Coast following the opening of the Panama Canal, has been called to meet at Tacoma February 21-22. The governors of California, Oregon, Idaho and Washington, also the Lieutenant Governor of Canada, have been invited. It is hoped to secure the endorsement of the bill introduced by United States Senator Brown to create a division of information, under the direction of the Department of Commerce and Labor, the function of which shall be to gather, from all available sources, useful information regarding the resources, products and characteristics of each state, publish such information in the different languages and distribute it among the admitted aliens.

ENTRIES ON PUBLIC LAND

Proposed Law introduced by Congressman Hawley.

A Bill relating to entries on public lands.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That on and after the passage of this Act it shall be unlawful for any executive or administrative officer of the Government of the United States to consider or use in connection with any order, finding, or decision to be entered, made or rendered in any case relating to the rights of any person to enter or perfect title to any land entered under public land laws of the United States any report, letter, or other information submitted in writing, directly, or indirectly, without first submitting to the person whose rights are affect-

ed a true and literal copy of said report, letter, or other information submitted in writing, and affording said person proper opportunity, at a hearing to be had, to disprove any charge so made injuriously affecting his or her rights, and at said hearing issues shall be joined upon the charge or charges made and evidence shall be confined strictly to the matter in issue.

Sec. 2. That every report hereafter submitted by any agent of the Government of the United States affecting the rights of any person to enter or perfect title to any public land of the United States shall state: First, those facts made of the agent's personal knowledge; second, those facts alleged upon information and belief; and all reports submitted by any such agent shall be signed by said agent and shall be of the same solemnity as though duly acknowledged by said agent under oath, and for any false report so submitted any such agent shall be proceeded against under chapter six, section one hundred and twenty-five, of the Penal Code of the United States approved March fourth nineteen hundred and nine.

Sec. 3. That upon the entering of any order or rendition of any final decision by any executive or administrative officer involving the right of any person to enter or perfect title to any land of United States' the aggrieved party shall have the right to appeal therefrom to the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia or to the United States district court within whose territorial jurisdiction the land in controversy is situated within ninety days from the entering of said final order or rendition of said final decision, and jurisdiction is hereby conferred upon the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia and the United States district courts to hear and determine the right or rights of any such person or persons in any such case so appealed. Upon the filing of the appeal and a proper bond for costs, to be approved by the judge, in either of said courts and the issuance of citation and evidence of service thereof upon the opposite party or parties, the clerk of said court shall so advise said executive or administrative officer from whose final finding or decision the appeal is taken, who shall thereupon cause to be forwarded to the said court the complete record in the case, and said cause shall then be heard upon the record so transmitted and the rights of the parties determined according to the law and equities of the case, with the right of appeal as in other cases provided by law: Provided, however, That whenever, in the opinion of the judge before whom the cause is pending, it is deemed necessary in the interests of justice to allow additional evidence to be offered, such evidence may be taken under such order or orders as may be entered by the court and shall become a part of the record in the case.

Sec. 4. That upon final judgment or decree being entered by a court in any such case said judgment or decree shall be certified by the clerk thereof to the Secretary of the Interior, who shall proceed in strict conformity therewith.

Sec. 5. That upon the submission of final proof upon any lands entered, it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of the General Land Office to consider and determine the sufficiency of said proof within one year from the submission thereof, and upon his failure to do so the entryman may then apply to the United States court within whose jurisdiction the land is located, and upon the submission by the entryman of satisfactory evidence of his compliance with all the requirements of the law, the judge thereof shall enter a final order, judgment, or decree, adjudging or decreeing the entryman entitled to a patent to the land applied for from the Government of the United States, which said judgment or decree, unless appealed from as in other cases provided by law, shall become final within sixty days from the entering thereof, and upon certification thereof to the Secretary of the Interior shall be by him carried into effect.
