

**Babyhood in Japan.**

The great day in the Japanese child's life is the Miyamiri, or the temple visit, which may be said to correspond roughly with the western christening. The infant, if a boy, on the thirty-first day, and if a girl, on the thirty-third, is carried to the temple and is placed under the guardianship of a special deity chosen by the parents. For this occasion the most beautiful crapes clothes that the parents or grandparents can afford are used, consisting of a set of three, the outer one being marked with the family crest and gay with silk linings. Except in dress, no difference is made in the first year or two of a male or female infant's life. White is the color of mourning and is never used for children. Scarlet is the baby's color, but after the first year the boy baby's clothing is of blue or brown and black striped material, while the kimonos of the little girl is much brighter, with large patterns of birds and flowers and leaves, with a profusion of crimson and pink, which diminishes with age.—Chicago Record Herald.

**A Timely Light.**

A French minister tells of an incident during a voyage to India: "One dark evening I sat in my cabin feeling thoroughly unwell, as the sea was rising fast and I was but a poor sailor. Suddenly the cry of 'Man overboard!' made me spring to my feet. I heard a trampling overhead, but could not go to the deck lest I should interfere with the crew in their efforts to save the poor man. "What can I do?" **Where the Guns Kick Hard.**

Duck shooting at an altitude of 14,000 feet, on the Junin pampa, along the shore of the lake of that name, is a sport that can be followed in Peru. Very peculiar effects are noted in this rarefied region, probably the highest altitude for this sport in the world. The guns kick viciously and the shot does not scatter promptly, making long shots successful. This phenomenon is due to the lack of density of the air, which is only about eight pounds to the square inch against fifteen at sea level. Another interesting fact is that the ducks have no fishy taste, as fish do not exist in this altitude.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE, JACKSON COUNTY, STATE OF OREGON: That at this time, the same being not less than fifteen days prior to the first Tuesday in March, A. D. 1912, the City Council pursuant to the provisions of Chapter III of the City Charter by this resolution hereby calls and orders a general election to be held within the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, State of Oregon, on the first Tuesday in March, A. D. 1912, namely, on Tuesday, March 5th, A. D. 1912, between the hours of 12 M. and 7 P. M. of said day, for the purpose of electing the officers specified herein, to-wit: ONE MAYOR, to hold office for a period of two years. TWO COUNCILMEN, to hold office for a period of two years. TWO COUNCILMEN, to hold office for a period of one year. ONE CITY RECORDER, to hold office for a period of one year. ONE CITY TREASURER, to hold office for a period of one year. And for the purpose of voting upon the measure and amendment to Chapter XII of the City Charter proposed and submitted to the voters by the City Council by Ordinance No. 164 and which proposed amendment shall appear upon the official ballot under the following title: "Referred to the People by the City Council." "An Act to amend Chapter 12 and Section 85 thereof and Sub-division 33 of said Section 85 of said Chapter 12 of the City Charter of the City of Jacksonville, as adopted by the voters of said city on the 21st day of June, 1911, at a special election held for that purpose and proclaimed by the mayor of said city on the 29th day of June, 1911, prescribing the powers and duties of the common council of the City of Jacksonville, and authorizing and empowering the city council of said city to provide by ordinance for the granting of franchises to electric light and

power, water, gas, railroad and street railroad companies and other public service corporations."

The City Hall is hereby provided, designated and appointed as the polling place for said election.

C. W. Kittle, Justen Hartman and W. C. Deneff, citizens of said city over the age of twenty-one years and electors therein are hereby designated and appointed judges of the aforesaid election, the first named judge to act and serve as chairman of said election board; and S. P. DeRobom and Joseph Wettler, citizens of said city over the age of twenty-one years and electors therein are hereby designated and appointed as the clerks of said election, the first named to act as first clerk.

And the City Recorder is hereby directed and ordered to give notice of the aforesaid election by the publication of this Resolution in the Jacksonville Post, a newspaper published in said city, not less than ten days prior to said election, to-wit in the regular issue of said newspaper of Saturday, February 17th, 1912, and by posting a copy of said resolution in three public places within the corporate limits of said city for a like period.

The foregoing Resolution No. 64 was duly and regularly introduced, read, proposed for passage and adopted at the regular adjourned meeting of the City Council of February 8th, 1912, by the following vote:
