PRESIDENT WILL RESIGN

Removed that Vice-President Suarez will also retire.

Mexico City, March 6.--Receipt of President Madero's resignation and also that of Vice-President Suarez would not surprise the members of congress when that body meets April 2, or soon thereafter, according to a report in circulation here tonight. In fact, Madero and Suarez's resignation are said to be expected, in which case, according to best information obtainable, General Trevino will be the choice of congress for president, his probable length of service being two years or until peace has been restored throughout the republic, and when new elections will be held. The cabinet changes intended to placate the warring elements will soon be made, if the report, apparently well authenticated, proves true. The substitution will affect six of the eight portfolios.

Line to open Northern Nevada.

San Francisco, March 4.--Contracts are to be called for today by the Southern Pacific railroad for an extension of the Fernley Northern Electric line from the Central Pacific line at Fernley, Nevada, to Susanville, Cal. 124 miles.

The extension, which will cost \$5,000,000, will open up 500,000 acres of timber land in Northern California and it is stated to be the beginning of a plan of the Southern Pacific to entrench itself in northern California, southeastern Oregon and northwestern Nevada. The plans for the system of the Southern Pacific in that territory will mean an expenditure of \$30,000,000.
