NEW DREADNAUGHTS

Monsters may be armed with eight fifteen-inch rifles.

Washington March 18.—The 30,000-ton sea monster, which has been the dream of American naval architects ever since the British shipbuilders began the struggle for supremacy in size and power in battleships with the launching of the original dreadnaught already is being planned on paper at the Navy Department, in anticipation of the allowances by congress of the department's estimates for two new battleships.

The plans call for a ship about as large as the New York, with a good-sized cruiser like the Olympia. Admiral Dewey's old flagship at the battle of Manila, added to her bulk.

If Congress permits them to be built the new ships will present unusual features. Possibly they will have 15-inch guns, eight for each ship, which will be by far the most powerful ordnance afloat in any navy.

PORTLAND LETTER

Oregon's Advertising Opportunity. Site Selected at Exposition.

Portland, Ore., Mar. 21.—Oregon is to have a state booklet for information and guidance of inquirers who want to know exact facts regarding opportunities and resources. Governor West has made this possible by releasing the \$25,000 appropriation enacted by the last legislature. The booklet will be compiled by C. C. Chapman, State Immigration Agent, with the co-operation of the State Board of Immigration, the Oregon Agricultural College, Oregon Development League and the commercial clubs of all the sections of the State of Oregon.

Besides general information regarding the state as a whole, Commissioner Chapman proposes to have detailed information concerning each locality. This will be gathered through the Oregon Development League and the local commercial clubs. The state will issue 200,000 of these booklets and the railroads will supplement them by publishing several hundred thousand more. It is of vital importance to each locality that the commercial organizations engage promptly in preparing information to be used in this booklet which will have such an enormous circulation. Other states all over the union have had state booklets for years, and everywhere there has been a demand for information signed by the Governor and stamped with the seal of the state, telling the exact facts and conditions. The publication of this booklet is the greatest single event in Oregon's development program since the Lewis-Clark Fair organization of the Oregon Development League.

Oregon enjoys the distinction of possessing the most beautiful site possible to any state for its building on the grounds of the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. The flag of Oregon was raised by Governor West at the site choosing ceremonies held Thursday afternoon, March 14. It was flown upon the 30 foot Oregon pole contributed by Portland. The site was selected by Julius L. Meier of Portland, L. M. Travis of Eugene and F. N. Rodison of Baker, Oregon's Commissioners and the deed to the same was presented to Governor West. The day was a perfect one and the ceremonies witnessed by 300 Oregonians who had journeyed there on the "Oregon First" Excursion for that special event aroused the spectators to a high pitch of patriotic enthusiasm.

The population of the metropolitan district of Portland, which includes the area within ten miles of the city, is given by the officials of the United States census as 259,745. This shows a gain of 114.3 in ten years.

A manufacturers' exposition of "Made in Oregon" goods will be held in Albany, the date to be announced later and a committee of the Albany Commercial Club has been appointed to work out the details as every community in Oregon will be asked to send out exhibits.

The state-wide "Made in Oregon" campaign was given additional enthusiasm by a rally at Oregon City on the evening of March 15 at the Commercial Club. The "Oregon First Consumers' League" was organized.

The ladies of the State W. C. T. U. are sending a call to the women of Oregon to prepare for the visit of the delegates to the National Convention to be held in Portland, October 19-26. Through the representatives of the local lodge the commercial clubs will be asked to advertise their localities at the headquarters of the Convention by the distribution of literature. It is expected that not fewer than 3,000 visitors will come to Oregon on this occasion.

A two-story cement building 50x80 feet, is to be erected at Terrebonne by W. A. Pickett. It will be fitted up for stores and offices.

CHARACTER EDUCATION

Letter received by Rev. Johnston from Superintendent Alderman.

The Rev. C. H. Johnston, Jacksonville, Oregon.

My dear Mr. Johnston: As I travel over Oregon I am distressed to see such a large number of young people with seemingly nothing to do. I am sure you are aware of the great importance of character building in education. A young man who reaches the age of sixteen without a fixed habit of industry is heavily handicapped.

Realizing the great extent of the influence exerted by the ministers of the state, I feel that one of the most effective ways of reaching the people is through the pulpit, and I would appreciate it very much if you would preach a sermon on this subject Sunday March 31st. By a concerted action we can make Oregon morally and industrially what it was intended by nature and God to be, one of the best places in the world for a child to live and grow up.

Broccoli Experiment.

Corvallis, Ore., March 16.—About the middle of April is the proper time to plant Broccoli, commonly known as winter cauliflower. The Oregon Agricultural Experiment League, of which Prof. F. D. Henzel of O. A. C. extension division is secretary, is undertaking experiments to determine the adaptability of this vegetable to different parts of Oregon, and has outlined some suggestions to aid those desiring to join the league in this work.

Broccoli is ready for market during the fall, winter and spring months and therefore needs peculiar climatic conditions for its best development. The seed sowing should be made thinly in a well prepared seed bed, with the rows two and a half inches apart. The middle of April or the first of May is the best time to start the plants, and but one transplanting is necessary, to the field when they are up six inches.

The rows should be thirty-six inches apart, and thirty inches between the plants in the row. By tying the leaves over when the heads first form, the blanching may readily be done. Good cultivation should be kept up, and when possible irrigation should be done. To protect the plants in cold weather they should be laid over or bent to the north (without disturbing the roots) so that the stalks may be covered with soil. They will then be safe from the alternate freezing and thawing.

A table upon which to note results will be furnished the league members interested. It will include the variety, kind of soil, source of the seed, date of sowing, and of transplanting, the first and last cutting of heads, the grower's name and address, and any remarks on his success he may desire to make.
