ASKED TO QUIT WORK.

Petition circulated asking that Honor men be laid off.

T. E. Pottenger of this city is circulating a petition to the county court asking that Westville, honor camp No. 1, be abandoned and the men returned to Salem. Mr Pottenger states that the move was instituted by taxpayers who believe that convict labor is proving too expensive to the county.

Mr. Pottenger refuses to divulge the names of the taxpayers who launched the movement.

According to the men who are closely in touch with the work done by the honor men, the work is the cheapest ever done on roads in this county, it costing an average of 75 cents a day to clothe, feed and pay the men.—Mall Tribune.

TWO OFFICIAL OPINIONS.

By Attorney General, of interest to Many.

Salem, Or., March 20.—That whenever a corporation transacts through its agents, business in a state, it is amenable to the state laws, is the opinion rendered by Attorney-General Crawford today. The Secretary of State was in doubt as to whether an action might be commenced against a corporation by serving its secretary, when it has no attorney in fact, and the opinion holds that he can do so, as the corporation, the moment it transacts business in this state, becomes amenable to its laws. In response to a request from the Superintendent of Umatilla County, the Attorney-General rendered an opinion that a person holding a diploma from a normal school is not qualified as candidate for County School Superintendent, but must have a state certificate.

Washington Letter.

Washington, D. C., March 20.—If there is any way to escape intervention by the United States Government, with honor in the Mexican imbroglio, it may be depended on that both the President and Congress will seize on that way.

The situation in the southern Republic seems hourly to be growing more menacing to foreigners within its boundaries. The struggle going on there is likely to continue for a long time, for the country is large, means of communication are imperfect and the government seems to be but inadequately equipped to cope with the revolutionists.

Not only are American interests in Mexico imperiled, but many business interests not in the country are menaced. However, this government is taking every means at its command to bring about better conditions, and to make the sending of troops across the border unnecessary.
