The Roseburg Commercial Club is planning a gala time from May 14 to 18. On the 14th, 15th and 16th it will entertain the members of the State Grange at their annual meeting, and on the 16th, 17th and 18th will hold a strawberry festival and rose carnival.

A plan to own a five story fireproof office building that will provide them with a permanent home has been submitted to the members of the La Grande Commercial Club. It will be financed by issuing shares of \$100 each to be taken by the members of the Club.

The Civic Improvement League, an organization of the women of Burns, has been formed for bettering the sanitary condition of the city. It will also co-operate with the Burns Commercial Club and the Merchant's Association.

The Lebanon Commercial Club has just published a splendid booklet advertising Lebanon and Linn County. The motto of the book is: "Lebanon, the Strawberry Center of the Valley of the Santiam River."

A consolidation of the Woodville and Evans Valley Development Leagues has been effected under the name of the Woodville Club, with the object of the rapid development of the Evans Valley.

The Commercial Club of Portland's Garden has been organized with headquarters at Schools, Washington county. The immediate object of the Club is to build a tunnel under Council Crest, making possible quick transportation between the Tualatin Valley and Portland.

Waldo Hills, Fernridge and Victor Point have joined with Sublimity in forming the Sublimity Commercial Club. The purpose is to advertise that section and to construct good roads in Marion County.

The Lakeview Commercial Club recently raised \$650 with which to publish 10,000 copies of a pamphlet giving information about Lake County.

To advertise its advantages as a summer and winter resort, the Newport Commercial Club has joined with the Southern Pacific in a community advertising plan.

At the annual meeting of the Grants Pass Commercial Club, Secretary Andrews reported a membership of 325.

FRUIT SELLING AGENCY

For the Entire Northwest to be Established at Portland.

Portland, Or., Apr. 16.—Consolidation of the two movements to establish a general Northwest fruit selling agency at Portland has been effected. The Northwestern Fruit Exchange has changed its by-laws to provide for ultimate mutualization under control of the fruit-growers' unions which ship through the exchange. A Committee representing the Portland Commercial Club, Chamber of Commerce and Clearing House Association has investigated the subject and recommends co-operation with the exchange on the part of the press, commercial organizations, banks and the fruit growers. The Portland bankers are arranging to finance advances to growers, based on the market value of the crop as fixed by the exchange.

Until two years ago the demand for Oregon and Washington apples was so heavy that buyers eagerly purchased crops on the trees. The increase in acreage is so enormous, however, that without a strong co-operative selling agency the entire prosperity of the fruit industry would be in danger. Last year, hundreds of carloads of apples shipped by individuals and local associations, were sacrificed at auction in Eastern markets for little more than freight charges.

The prices secured for those districts marketing through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange were high and the growers received large and prompt returns. Co-operation with the exchange as reorganized, has been assured by the different commercial bodies and a vigorous campaign will be conducted to secure a heavy tonnage. The fruit districts represented at the Portland meeting were Rogue River, Mosier, Walla Walla, Yakima, Wenatchee, Cashmere, Spokane, Lewiston and Boise. A branch office of the exchange will be established at Spokane, but the operating headquarters will be built up at Portland.

Uniting these two movements means the salvation of the fruit industry by building up one strong selling agency.

THE EUROPEAN WAR

The Italian Fleet Attacks Dardanelles.

London, April 18.—Rumors that a fleet is attacking the entrance to the Dardanelles in an effort to force its way into the Sea of Marmora and thence to Constantinople are current here today, following the receipt of a cable from an agent of Lloyds at Constantinople giving an unconfirmed report that cannonading was heard near the entrance to the straits.

Constantinople, April 18.—The Italian fleet, according to reports received here, is at the entrance of the Dardanelles and is believed to be preparing to force a passage. It is also reported that one of the Italian warships struck a sub-marine mine and went down.

Hotel at Butte Falls is Burned

The United States hotel at Butte Falls, owned by William Duprey, burned Wednesday night about 11:30 o'clock and was practically a total loss. Fifteen roomers escaped from the flames but two or three are said to have had narrow escapes from death. The loss is about \$8000, \$6000 of which was covered by insurance. Very little furniture was saved.

The fire started in a hallway. Its origin is unknown. A careless hurried match is the theory generally accepted. Duprey says he will rebuild.

This is the second fire at Butte Falls within a month, the bank burning two weeks ago.—Mail-Tribune.
