The report of the expert who audited the books of the county officials is now on file in the office of the county clerk and can be seen by anyone who is interested. The report covers the period of three and one-half years, beginning July 1st, 1908, and ending January 1st, 1912.

The examination was ordered by the county court as a result of the insinuations of graft and dishonesty made some months ago by certain agitators who claimed to see "a nigger in the woodpile," and that the county affairs were in the hands of incompetent and untrustworthy men. As a matter of fact, it is doubtful whether anyone believed the charges or insinuations, but in simple justice to the officials it was deemed advisable that an examination be made.

The result of the examination is that no money was misappropriated but every dollar is accounted for and deposited in the treasury. Instead of censure for neglect or incompetency, the expert has nothing but praise for the manner in which the work was accomplished and accounts kept by officers handicapped by the lack of proper space, equipment and adequate help.

Staining Wood Dark Hues.
The appearance of walnut may be given to white woods by painting or sponging them with a concentrated warm solution of permanganate of potassa. The effect is different on different kinds of timber, some becoming stained very rapidly, others requiring more time for this result. The permanganate is decomposed by the woody fiber. Brown peroxide of manganese is precipitated, which is afterward removed by washing with water. The wood, when dry, may be varnished and will be found to resemble very closely the naturally dark woods.—Harper's Magazine.
