FOREST FIRES

Some Pertinent suggestions by Proposed by Mr. U'Ren should be Beaten if Placed upon the Ballot

The Forest Fire season is only a few weeks off. Those who have slashings to burn, as the result of land clearing, logging, road building, or any other purpose, should begin to watch for the time when burning can be done in accordance with the law, and with safety to surrounding property. It is only by having slashings removed through early spring or late Fall burning that there is hope of keeping down fires later on.

Timber land is paying a large part of the taxes in Oregon; 75 to 80 per cent in some counties. The owner of this class of property are not asking for roads, or other improvements to enhance the value of their property, but are contributing cheerfully to have these built for the benefit of others. It therefore, seems only right that county officials should assist in preserving a property which contributes so substantially to the running expenses of the government.

County Courts can do much to help keep down fires both by being sure that rights of way of roads are kept free from inflammable material and by assisting the State Forester during the dry months through assigning men to work under his direction. One bad fire will result in the loss of thousands of dollars of tax money to the State, and it is sound public policy to avoid this if possible.

U. S. Hall to be Improved.

THE CABINET PLAN

Proposed by Mr. U'Ren should be Beaten if Placed upon the Ballot

The following extract from an article recently published in the Oregon Journal, in regard to the plan of Mr. U'Ren and other so-called reformers, for changing our present system of state government is worthy the perusal of our readers. In matters of this kind it is always best to "make haste slowly," and the voters of Oregon will do well to hold fast to those things which have been tried and found sufficient, rather than to adopt the "air castles" of a visionary and imaginative mind.

"There is no use to encumber the November ballot with Mr. U'Ren's measure for a new kind of government in Oregon. It would not pass. It should not pass.

It would not pass, because the people of Oregon are not ready to change their form of Government every time they change their clothes. It would be beaten out of sight, because it proposes revolutionary changes that would frighten citizens into a bitter and overwhelming opposition. It would be voted down overwhelmingly, because it proposes to convert the state into a governmental experiment station. It contains almost every new fad in government that has been heard of from New Zealand to the North Pole.

It contains a little of almost everything from the short ballot to Chinese suffrage, some of it good and some bad. If there is anything new that has been proposed as a government experiment which is not provided for in the plan, Mr. U'Ren seems to have overlooked it. In practical effect, it provides for an almost complete new system of government and does not hesitate to proceed far in legislative enactments. It is almost a new constitution and a new code of laws. It not only provides new plans of administrative and legislative government for the state, but complete new arrangements in county government.

Though Mr. U'Ren has aided in doing many good things in Oregon, his proposed plan will create the impression among those who have worked side by side with him in the past, that he is going too far in governmental tinkering."

LIFE SAVING METHODS

U. S. Bureau of Mines Demonstration Car at O. A. C. This Week Finely Equipped.

Corvallis, Ore., May 20—Today lessons in life saving methods and first aid to the injured are begun at O. A. C. by the experts from the U. S. Bureau of Mines in charge of the demonstration car now at Corvallis.

Through the efforts of Prof. H. M. Parks, head of the college school of mines, the car was brought from Washington where it was giving demonstrations, and arrangements have been made for a week's instruction, two hours daily, for 75 or 100 young men from the college.

The work is of especial value to all students whose future business will take them some distance from medical aid. Electrical engineers will be given instruction as to the manner of reviving a man suffering from electrical shock. Foresters will learn how to give immediate relief to a man on whom timbers have fallen, or who is overcome by smoke or flame in fighting forest fires.

The agricultural student will learn what must be done immediately after an accident with the "deadly corn shredder" or other farm tool which is likely to maim one. The pharmacy student and those of the chemistry courses will be interested in the means of reviving men overcome by gaseous fumes. There is hardly a course given in the college which does not present aspects making the life saving methods important to its students.

For these reasons it is expected that nearly 100 students will be scheduled for the course, in spite of the fact that two hours a day for a week at this busy time of the year' examination period, is not lightly given any outside activity.

THE EIGHTH GRADE

Jacksonville Class of 15. Only one receives diploma.

The report of the recent eighth grade examinations held in this city does not seem entirely satisfactory to those interested in the welfare of our public schools.

Out of a class of 15 taking this examination only one succeeded in making the grades required in order to obtain a diploma. Of those failing to make a passing grade several were conditioned; that is they failed in only one or two branches and need take those branches only, at the June examination, when, if they are successful in making the required per cent, they will be entitled to diplomas. Several pupils failed in more than two branches and if they desire to try again will be required to take the examination in all subjects.

The principal, Prof. Harrington, thinks that the failure of so many to pass the examination is largely due to the system of advancing pupils to a new grade before they were sufficiently proficient in the old one; that is, at the beginning of the present term a number of pupils were advanced to the eighth grade who had not properly mastered the work of the seventh and were consequently handicapped all through the work in the eighth. From a perusal of the markings given for work during the term we are inclined to believe that the professor is right.

The pupil who passed the examination is Dan Bagshaw, Jr., son of the editor of the Post. He has received his diploma and is highly elated in its possession.

THE PARCELS POST

A Summary of Senator Bourne's Parcel Post Bill.

Postal rates on parcels vary with distance, thus protecting local merchants and competing with express companies.

Third and fourth classes of matter are combined.

A special rate of one cent an ounce up to four ounces is provided for circulars and small packages of goods.

Rates are as follows:

Local, city and rural delivery only, 5 cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional pound.

Within 50-mile zone, 6 cents for first pound and 2 cents for each additional pound.

Within 200-mile zone, 7 cents for first pound and 3 cents for each additional pound.

Within 500-mile zone, 8 cents for the first pound and 4 cents for each additional pound.

Within 1000-mile zone, 9 cents for the first pound and 5 cents for each additional pound.

Within 2000-mile zone, 12 cents for the first pound and 10 cents for each additional pound.

Outside 2000-mile zone, 12 cents for the first pound and 12 cents for each additional pound.

These rates are based upon a careful computation of the actual cost of collecting, distributing and delivering packages, plus actual cost of transportation.

Weight limit 11 pounds and maximum charge 12 cents—the international limit and rate.
