

PORTLAND LETTER

Portland is Getting Acquainted With Surrounding Country.

Portland, Or., May 21 (Special)—Portland's business men have been clasp hands with Tillamook County communities this week. Excursions to other parts of the state are teaching Portland's people that Oregon is a great state and that Portland, after all is only a small part of it. A better understanding of the needs of the country comes to the city people after every such excursion.

Children are to be interested in forest protection. Forestry officials of the Government have taken steps to secure the assistance of boys and girls of the state in helping to protect forests from fire. The importance of the trees to the people of the state and how to safe-guard this great resource is taught in an attractive story to be issued and distributed through the schools.

Oregon people bade farewell to one railroad president the past week and welcomed another at a banquet at the Portland Commercial Club. Carl R. Gray, head of the North Bank road and Hill lines in Oregon, leaves to become president of the Great Northern Railway, and J. H. Young, of Seattle, comes to take his place in Oregon. The state lost one good man but gained another and the state will profit by having such a good friend as Mr. Gray at the head of the Great Northern at St. Paul.

What is declared to be the most valuable tract of farm land in the state and probably in the whole country, lies near Beaverton, in Washington County. This fifteen acre farm is beaver-dam land and has grown onions, valued at \$9,000 a year, for forty years. The tract has produced a total of approximately \$260,000. Onions yield 400 sacks per acre on this land and its richness seems inexhaustible. It is thought there is no other piece of land in the United States that can show a similar record.

One representative of Manila lodge of Elks has reached Portland for the annual reunion, coming 8,000 miles for the national convention to be held here in July. This is believed to be the record for long distances covered to reach this year's reunion. In all, it is expected that 60,000 Elks will flock in to Portland during the second week of July.

McMinnville will hold a big horse show Saturday, May 23, demonstrating to the remainder of the state the excellent breed of horses raised in Yamhill County. Many breeders will exhibit stock.

Lebanon Commercial Club has issued invitations to other organizations to help celebrate its annual strawberry fair, June 6, 7 and 8. This fete is getting better every year and now attracts a great deal of attention from Willamette Valley people.

The Country Life movement throughout the state is making good. The idea is growing and it is expected to interest 75,000 children in the work. C. H. Lane, representing the Department of Agriculture, has been in the state during the past week giving practical talks on the subject. It looks like the plan to make Oregon soil produce everything needed to feed Oregon people will succeed.

Fencing the Grounds.

San Francisco, May 22: The Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition within another week, will request the Board of Supervisors to close all streets leading to the Exposition site, and immediately upon the passage of the final ordinance the contracts will be awarded for fencing the site. These fences will be about three miles in length.

Plans and specifications are also finished for the Service Building which will be the first to be erected on the Exposition Grounds. This structure will cover an area of 150 ft. and will be two stories in height. This building will house the Department of Works, the pre-Exposition Hospital and the pre-Exposition Department of Admissions. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$60,000 and is to be constructed immediately.

Calendar for Fair.

San Francisco, May 25: For the benefit of those who wish to make engagements to meet friends and relatives in this city during the progress of the 1915 Universal Exposition, the Department of Exploitation has prepared a 1915 calendar. With this calendar one is able to decide three years in advance just what days can be set aside for entertaining at the World's Fair.

It is a 'winter to winter' Exposition. The ideal climate of California permits nine months and thirteen days. Visitors are guaranteed balmy breezes in the summer time and sunshine during the winter months.

The Exposition will open its doors on February 20, 1915 and close December 4, 1915.

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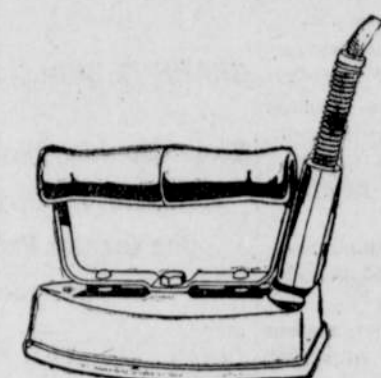
