TURNOWS TRAIL FOUND

Dead Elk Show Where Alleged Murder of four Made his Camp.

Hoquiam, Wash., May 29.—Three dead carcasses of elk and a portion of a newspaper containing a story of the murder of Deputy Sheriffs Colin McKenzie and A. Elmer in the Oxbow country on the headwaters of the Wynoochie last March, were found by members of a posse of 19 men, who have spent the past six weeks in the woods endeavoring to run to earth John Turnow, alleged slayer of the officers and of his twin nephews, John and Will Bauer.

The posse found the elk within a radius of two miles and near each carcass was a well protected fire, over which the fugitive had cooked his meals and probably smoked the meat. The carcasses were well stripped of meat and one had been killed but two days prior to its discovery. The posse has heard shots a number of times at sundown, and it is presumed that Turnow killed the elk at dusk and stripped the meat under cover of darkness.

The finding of the newspaper is considered to be good evidence that Turnow was the man who robbed the mail boxes in the vicinity of his old home and in this manner kept well posted in what was going on concerning the hunt for him.

Concerning Wireless Telegraphy

At present the whole literature of wireless telegraphy is encumbered with obscure usage of terms and with contradictory definitions which stand in the way of the most rapid progress of this art. The international wireless conference arranged for at London in June, at which a large number of experienced engineers will meet, with a mutual interest in the welfare of a single art, is expected to adopt a standard set of units and symbols. This official action, binding on wireless operators all over the world, will bring order out of chaos by distinguishing between antenna and "radiation" resistances, by rating transmitting outfits not by power input alone but with due regard to their efficiency, by determining the meaning of the term "frequency," whether as number of cycles per second or number of half-cycles per second, and by cutting out duplication of terms such as "jigger" and "oscillation transformer," "group frequency" and "spark frequency," and the like.—Scientific American.

FIRE DRILLS

Ships With Special Facilities for Protection of Passengers.

From information received from the Southern Pacific Company, operating the Steamship Line between New York and New Orleans, we learn that passengers using that line need have no fear in case of accident. The life-boat capacity of these ships has always been sufficient to accommodate all of the passengers and crew, and the wireless equipment is such that the wireless room at all times, night and day, is in charge of an experienced operator. Notices are posted in all staterooms, public rooms and steerage, showing the assignments of occupants to specific boats, and all life boats are conspicuously numbered. Fire and boat drills are held at each port as well as on the first day out and passengers are invited to take part in them. Stewards demonstrate how to attach life-belts to the body. It is said that these are not new rulings, but have been in force on these ships for several years.

Noted Aviator Dead.

Wilbur Wright the famous inventor and aviator died of typhoid fever at his home near Dayton, Ohio, early Thursday morning.

Mr. Wright had been ill for some weeks and his death was not unexpected. He was noted as the principal inventor of a wellknown type of aeroplanes and was an aviator of more than average ability.

Memorial services will be held in the Presbyterian church, Sunday evening at 8 o'clock.

HINDU JUSTICE.

The Case of the Cat That Carried the Fire to the Cotton.

Four Hindus, partners in business, bought some cotton bales. That the rats might not destroy the cotton they purchased a cat. They agreed that each of the four should own a particular leg of the cat, and each adorned with beads and other ornaments the leg thus apportioned to him. The cat, by an accident, injured one of its legs. The owner of that member wound around it a rag soaked in oil. The cat, going too near the hearth, set this rag on fire and, being in great pain, rushed in among the cotton bales, where she was accustomed to hunt rats. The cotton thereby took fire and was burnt up.

The three other partners brought a suit to recover the value of the cotton against the fourth partner who owned this particular leg of the cat. The native judge examined the case, and this was his decision:

"The leg that had the oiled rag on it was hurt. The cat could not use that leg. In fact, it held up that leg and ran with the other three legs. The three unhurt legs therefore carried the fire to the cotton and are alone culpable. The injured leg is not to be blamed. The three partners who owned the three legs with which the cat ran to the cotton will pay one-quarter of the value of the bales to the partner who was the proprietor of the injured leg."—London Telegraph.
