

**EDUCATIONAL AGRICULTURE**

**Prof. E. D. Ressler Tells O. A. C. Summer Session Students Value of Training.**

Corvallis, Ore., June 24—That the teachers of the rural schools and, ever more necessarily, the county supervisors must have the spirit of modern country life, must have an enthusiasm for and a sufficient preparation for the teaching of agriculture and industrial branches before they attempt to introduce them into the rural schools and the grades and high schools of the cities, was given earnest emphasis in a lecture yesterday by Prof. E. D. Ressler, director of the summer session at the Oregon Agricultural College.

"So much has been said already as to the necessity of giving children in the country schools and in the grade some industrial training, something in their studies which will attract them to the farm and interest them in agriculture, rather than turn them away from it toward the small clerkship and like overcrowded occupations in the city, that argument on that score is no longer necessary," said Professor Ressler.

"Not enough emphasis has been laid, however, on the preparation of the teacher for this important work. Doubtless the first thought of some of the teachers, when the introduction of domestic science and agriculture into the grades was broached, was, 'How can I do it! How can I add another branch to an already crowded curriculum? How can I teach cooking and sewing and planting and hoeing, raising pigs and chickens and other animals, when I have never lived on a farm in my life, and don't know anything but the vaguest generalities about such things?'"

"The first essential is that the teacher should be given a knowledge which will awaken her interest and enthusiasm for the things to be taught. One can not teach adequately subjects about which one neither knows nor cares anything. Rural economic problems, the trials and successes of the farm, field and home, should be presented first. They should be assisted with detailed programmes and outlines, with illustrative material and lesson helps, with occasional outside talks to the pupils by experts in the different lines, and with the training given in the itinerant schools to be sent out by the extension division.

"The crux of the whole matter may, perhaps, be said to be in the fact that teachers quite without previous scientific training in domestic science and agriculture will be required to teach these subjects and get as good results as in the branches of education for which they have had years of preparation—and probably without the supervision or direction of anyone of scientific training in these branches.

"That brings me to the point I consider immensely important—the necessity of training for the county supervisors, that they may furnish teachers with interest and enthusiasm for their work plus actual help in gathering, arranging and presenting subject matter. The supervisor does not necessarily need to be an expert in teaching classes in the 'three R's' for the teacher is prepared to do that. His province is that of a judge of classroom presence, discipline, and the technique of teaching, and of an able assistant in such problems as the teacher alone can not cope with. Agricultural education comes under the latter head.

"My idea, then, is that the supervisors should prepare themselves thoroughly in the subject of teaching in industrial subjects; and that the teachers, as rapidly as possible—during summer sessions or between terms—equip themselves with the materials. Working together with the assistance of the college always ready, they should be able to meet their problem adequately."

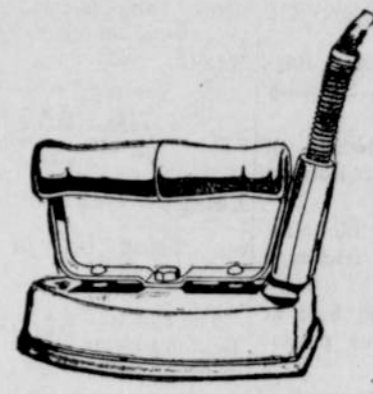
