Klamath Commissioner Complains of this End of Route.

"Jackson county is doing very little toward improving the Klamath Falls-Ashland road this year, and from the Jackson county line to Ashland the road is in an awful condition," says County Commissioner Sam T. Summers, who returned recently from an automobile trip to Ashland. "From Green Spring mountain on toward Ashland the road in many places is almost impassible. Three or four men and one team are at work on the road, but they will be able to accomplish but little before fall. The Klamath county portion of the road, I am glad to say, is in excellent shape."—Klamath Northwestern.

Death of Emperor expected soon

Tokio, July 26.—A decided change for the worse occurred today in the condition of the emperor of Japan. All hope for his recovery has been abandoned, physicians declaring that his death is but a matter of a few hours. The coroner prince, almost entirely recovered from his own illness, is able to go to the bedside of his father.

The bulletin issued by the mikado's physicians at noon gave his temperature as 98.7, and his pulse as 110. It said the emperor's restlessness and fatigue were increasing. At 8 o'clock tonight his condition was not materially changed.

New Typewriter Record.

Spokane, Wash., July 24.—Miss Florence E. Wilson of New York today is the holder of the world's typewriter speed record for one hour's continuous writing on unfamiliar copy. Competing in the contests held under the auspices of the National Commercial Teachers' Federation, Miss Wilson wrote 7,219 words in the hour with 68 errors. Deducting five words for each error this gave her a net score of 6,879 or an average of 115 words a minute.

PORTLAND LETTER

Eugene Exhibition is Arranged for State Fair.

Portland, Ore., July 25, (Special).—The State Fair board has voted \$500 to be used as prizes for the Eugenics Exposition planned for Wednesday, September 4. This is a feature of the State Fair this year for the first time and it is expected it will attract a great deal of attention. It is to be really a scientific baby show, children up to three years old being eligible for prizes. A \$50 silver cup will be offered for the best boy and the best girl in the show and six cups for the best boy and girl in three divisions, the ages running from 6 months to three years.

Medical experts will judge the children entered from the standpoint of physical perfection, much as livestock is judged. O. M. Plummer has been made superintendent of the Eugenics show and is hopeful of having 200 children entered at Salem. He hopes various granges, commercial bodies and districts will hold local shows in each county, sending the best boy and girl from the county to the state competition.

Public sales of dairy stock will be held during the Pacific International Dairy Show, which is scheduled for the Portland Union Stockyards November 18-23. During two days and a half, cattle from all parts of the world may be sold. In competition, only stock from the states west of the Rocky Mountains and from British Columbia may be entered. Prizes and trophies amounting to \$6,000 will be given. There will be no entry fee nor will admission be charged.

To extend the usefulness of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, a branch has been opened in London by W. F. Gwin, general manager, and it is hoped to extend the fame of Northwest fruit throughout Europe. It is believed the present business there can be increased largely.

It is promised that liberal sums will be provided for the building of boulevards and general improvements in Crater Lake National Park by the Government. It is the intention to secure appropriations for \$100,000 annually for the next seven years. An item of \$100,000 has been inserted in the Sundry Civil Service bill and it is expected it will go through this session.

The Southern Pacific Company plans a new department of electric lines which will include many of the shorter roads through the Willamette Valley. It is thought a big system of trolley interurban lines will be built up within the next few years that will aid very greatly the development of the Willamette Valley country.

D. Paul Ritter, Minister from Switzerland to the United States, believes large numbers of his countrymen will come to the Pacific coast and settle when the Panama Canal shall have been opened. He was entertained at luncheon by the Portland Commercial Club the past week. He looks for a heavy movement of thrifty European farmers to this state as soon as the way is opened.

That Oregon should not overlook the chances to capture some good prizes at the International Dry Farming Congress at Lethbridge, Alberta, in late October, was urged upon Portland people the past week by Daniel Morgan, of Spokane, one of the governors of the Congress. He told of the importance of this exposition and the publicity to be gained by good exhibits.

Oregon Sidelights.

Estacada has entered upon a program of permanent street improvement.

The News Reporter declares that the oiled streets have settled the dust problem at McMinnville.

Moro Observer: The farmers around Wasco are certainly beginning to realize one of their opportunities. George N. Crossfield has sold 18 cream separators this season.

The city council of Independence has heretofore ordinances providing for a street grade and for the granting of traction water and electric light and power franchises.

According to the statistics compiled by the county superintendent, the total number of children of school age

in Linn county is 8153, or a gain of 400 over the past year.

Brownsville Times: The city well at the head of Spaulding avenue, an old landmark, having been dug so long ago that memory faileth the oldest inhabitant, was filled up this week by the city authorities.

Odd Fellows of Woodburn, Scotts Mills, Gervais, Stayton and Aumsville have scheduled a series of joint meetings to be held at intervals of four months. The first will be held at Silverton in October.

Newberg Enterprise: The German Methodists of this conference are arranging to hold a camp meeting two miles east of town near the German Methodist Episcopal church at the foot of Parrat mountain from July 25 to 29.

Independence Enterprise: There are a number of pretty lawns in the city and one of the finest is that surrounding Calvary Presbyterian church and manse. Although sown only last April yet it is a solid carpet of clover and blue grass and has already been cut five times.

Eugene Guard: Before the end of next year the Oregon Electric and Southern Pacific will have expended a million dollars in Eugene for electric freight and passenger depots, yard facilities and trackage. And during the same time another million will be expended by the city for sewers and street paving. And we have just begun to grow!

GIRL WALKS 2,000 MILES

Nebraska School Teacher Bound for San Francisco.

Ogden, Utah.—Nearly a month ago Miss Della Anthes, a winsome school teacher of Sutton, Neb., walked out of her home in that town, strolled down the street and on out into the country. Thursday she arrived in Ogden, still "strolling," having walked 901 miles in 27 days, an average of 33 miles each day. Friday Miss Anthes walked out of Ogden, en route to San Francisco, 1,000 miles to the westward.

Miss Anthes is not in any sense of the word a "lady tramp." She is simply a young school teacher of good education and refined manners. She enjoys walking and determined to spend her summer's vacation in a hike from Sutton to the Pacific coast. When school opens in September she will be found at her desk in the Sutton high school.

In the 27 days she has been on the road Miss Anthes has walked every step of the 901 miles between Sutton and Ogden. Not for a single foot of the way has she accepted a "lift" of any kind, although all sorts of chances to ride have been offered her.

"I'm out for a walk, not a ride," has been her answer when invited to "climb in" by some rancher going in her direction. Or, when some well-meaning hobo tells her of a soft berth in a side-door Pullman, the young woman smiles and thanks him with a shake of her head.

Miss Anthes traveling outfit is unique. It consists of an automatic pistol and a toothbrush. She takes just enough money along with her to pay her "walking" expenses. However, she has letters of credit which she can use in an emergency. Her extra clothing she sends on ahead by express and catches up with the trunk every few days.

Swept by Cloudburst Saturday

Pendleton, Or., July 22.—The Butter Creek Valley, in the southwestern part of this county, is today a scene of devastation, according to the first authentic news reaching this city.

A wall of water which followed the cloudburst Saturday evening swept the valley for miles almost clean of human habitations, and but for the fact that farmers rode in advance of the water, warning the inhabitants, many lives undoubtedly would have been lost.

The water came five feet high and 400 or 500 feet wide.

Charles McCracken, James Nelson, Frank Jones, S. G. Lightfoot and a number of other prominent ranchers lost every building on their farms, saving only themselves and livestock.
