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## EMPEROR OF JAPAN DEAD

### End Comes Peacefully After Desperate Struggle Against Disease of Long Standing.

Tokio, July 29.—Worn out by constantly decreasing debility due to his age and his diabetic condition, Mutsuhito, mikado and emperor of Japan died here early this morning in the imperial palace, while the elder statesmen of the nation and Yoshishito, his son, stood by his death bed.

For hours the mikado had been unconscious and only his feebly fluttering heart gave indications that life had not fled. Oxygen was being constantly administered during the last few hours of his life, but the shallow breathing of the ruler made it certain at midnight that the end could not long be delayed.

No arrangements have yet been announced for the funeral of the dead ruler, but it is expected that it will be one of great magnificence, and that the obsequies of the head of the nation will be such as to emphasize the fact that the land of the Daimyos is no longer medieval, but is in the forefront of modern progress.

Eutsuhito was 60 years of age and had reigned as emperor for 45 years, during which time he brought Japan from a medieval feudalism into the front rank of modern world powers.

Yoshishito, the crown prince, is 33 years old, an admiral in the navy, a hero of the war with Russia and a popular idol of the people of his country. The new emperor of Japan is not the son of the empress, but of a secondary wife of the late emperor.

The accession of Yoshishito will be proclaimed this afternoon, but his coronation will not occur for a year.

## CRATER LAKE

### Best Attraction Seen in 60,000 Mile Trip.

Last year we motored through Yellowstone and to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. We have traveled nearly 60,000 miles in the United States by automobile and are traveling over six months each year.

"This year we decided to tour the northwest and visit Crater Lake and we feel more than repaid for the trip. The lake is the most beautiful single bit of scenery in the United States and I believe this after seeing many more noted attractions. The trip down Rogue River is a wonderful drive. Some day thousands of machines will travel over that road annually for it is really worth while.

"We have never been in Yosemite valley but expect to visit it this year. Then we will tour eastward stopping at Lake Tahoe. We know the Rockies fairly well now.

"Crater Lake is wonderful. All it needs to make it the leading scenic attraction on the Pacific Coast is advertising and an automobile highway."—Tribune.

## BODY IN RIVER

### Coroner at Estacada Decides Man Committed Suicide.

Oregon City, Ore.—The body of a man about 45 years old was found in the Clackamas river at Estacada Thursday. Coroner Wilson, who viewed the remains, decided the man had committed suicide. A sack in which were several large rocks was fastened to the man's neck. The coroner was unable to learn the identity of the suicide.

A letter "G" was on a handkerchief found in one of the pockets. The man weighed about 170 pounds and was well dressed. The thumb of his left hand had been severed and there was a large scar on his abdomen. Wilson thinks the digit was lost and the scar on the body were the result of an accident. Dr. Adix of Estacada said the body had been in the river at least five weeks. F. G. Robley, assistant superintendent of the power plant found the body.

## "READS TITLE CLEAR"

### Root Tells President Institutions of country are Threatened Today.

Washington, Aug. 1.—"Your title to the nomination is as clear and unimpeachable as the title of any candidate since the political conventions began."

That was the keynote of Senator Elihu Root's address to President Taft here today, when as chairman of the committee of notification he formally advised the President of his nomination by the Chicago convention.

"The committee of notification here present has the honor to advise you formally that on the 22nd day of June last you were regularly and duly nominated by the National convention of the Republican party to be Republican candidate for President for the term beginning March 4, 1913.

"For the second time in the history of the Republican party a part of the delegates have refused to be bound by the action of the convention. Now, as on the former occasion, the irreconcilable minority declares its intention to support either your Democratic opponent or a third candidate.

"The reason assigned for this course is dissatisfaction with the decision of certain contests in the making up of the temporary roll of the convention. Those contests were decided by the tribunal upon which the law that has governed the Republican party for more than 40 years imposed the duty of deciding such contests.

"So long as those decisions were made honestly and in good faith all persons were bound to accept them as conclusive in the making up of the temporary roll of the convention; and neither in the face of arguments produced before the National committee, the committee on credentials and the convention itself, nor otherwise, does there appear just ground for impeaching the honesty and good faith of the committee's decisions. Both the making up of the temporary roll and the rights accorded to the persons upon that roll were in accordance with the long-established and unquestioned rules of law governing the party.

## PORTLAND

### LETTER

#### Portlanders will Invade Central Oregon in August.

Portland, Or., July 30 (Special)—Pathfinders who went over the route to be followed from Portland to Lakeview for the convention of the Central Oregon Development League August 20, 21 and 22, returned full of enthusiasm for the country they found in Interior Oregon. C. C. Chapman, Secy. of the Oregon Development League, says that portion of the state is developing rapidly and that the settlers are prospering.

Secretary Chapman says Central Oregon will welcome the Portland excursionists with open arms when they come to Lakeview in August and each town is preparing a warm reception. He says the journey down through the interior will be one long to remember and that all Portland people who want to learn more of their state should participate. From indications, there will be a large party go from the Rose City.

Appropriations for Oregon River and Harbor improvements, that seem sure to be forthcoming, amount to over \$2,300,000. The bill has passed both houses of Congress and has been approved by committees, awaiting only the President's signature. The biggest single item is \$1,000,000 for the mouth of the Columbia work, while the Lower Willamette is scheduled for \$180,000 Tillamook Harbor and the Nealeam River and harbor improvement each get \$100,000. The Dalles-Celilo canal is listed for \$700,000.

Coos County people will have no lack of celebrations during the summer. Port Orford's Agate Carnival is scheduled for August 8 and 10 and the people of Coquille have in view a big jubilee to celebrate the paving of streets and other municipal improvements. The dates will be named after it is known when this work is to be completed. The Coos & Curry County Fair Association will hold its annual fair and racing meet on Sept. 25-26-27 and 28. Bandon will have a carnival Sept. 5-6 and 7. This is an annual affair.

Dairymen look forward to the Pacific International Dairy Show, which will be held at the Union Stockyards Nov. 18-23. It will be the biggest exhibit of dairy stock, products and machinery ever held in the Northwest and it is believed it will do much to stimulate interest in the dairy industry. At a meeting during the past week to complete plans, it was stated that with proper encouragement, the dairy output of this state should amount to \$20,000,000 annually.

Success has followed the experiment of C. S. Hudson, cashier of the First National Bank of Bend, who last year shipped in a carload of brood sows and sold them to nearby farmers, taking their notes at one year in payment. He writes D. O. Lively, of the Portland Union Stockyards Co., that the hogs are proving a profitable investment and he has a report from each man who purchased, showing a profit as high as 200 per cent in some instances. He says he believes the average will be 100 per cent or more on each hog.

Pendleton people have arranged to enlarge the stadium where the roundup is staged, so that many more people may be seated at the coming show. The management has invited Theodore Roosevelt to attend and he writes he is considering a plan to arrange his itinerary so he may be in Pendleton during the Roundup.

## HONOR MEN FIGHT FIRE

### Westville Camp Turns Out at Call of Ranger.

Responding to the call of George West, forest ranger in charge of the Prospect district of the Crater national forest, the honor men stationed at Westville, on the Crater Lake road, have won new laurels for themselves by saving Uncle Sam thousands of dollars by extinguishing a forest fire near Union Creek, about 20 miles east of their camp. The men proved to be excellent help, according to reports from Prospect, and when the flames were extinguished returned to their com on the road.—Tidings.

## Antimony a By-product.

Information received by the United States Geological Survey indicates that no antimony ore was produced in the United States in 1911, but considerable quantities of antimonial lead were made as a by-product in smelting the precious metals, and there was a large recovery of antimony from secondary sources, such as scrap bearing and type metals, antimonial lead, drosses, and solder. 14,078 tons of antimonial lead containing a total of 2,254 tons of antimony, valued at \$386,786, was produced. The price of antimony was so low in 1911 that there was little encouragement for American miners to produce the ore unless it contained other valuable metals.

The production of secondary antimony as antimony in the United States last year was 10 short tons; and 2,359 tons was recovered in alloys. The output was valued at \$353,030. In 1910 the recovery was 9 and 2,770 tons, respectively, valued at \$444,600.—Geo. Survey.
