**\$707,000 FOR CRATER LAKE**

**Large Sum Appropriated for Improvements.**

Portland, Aug. 6.—While \$642,000 was asked by Major Morrow, corps of engineers, U. S. A., to be used in the construction of roads and improvements in Crater Lake national park, committees of the house and senate at Washington not only adopted the recommendation, but allowed \$65,000 for the building of water tanks and laying supply pipes. It is felt certain that the appropriation will be acted on favorably by congress, as it is a part of the smoky civil bill.

The money is to be set aside under the continuing appropriation law, \$10,000 being available for this season and the same amount each year until it is all expended. Information as to the action of the conference was received privately, but as soon as it is made known that the bill has been signed, Major Morrow will order work resumed immediately. There will be 26 miles of road built around Crater Lake, five miles to the pinnacles and four miles to the eastern boundary of the park.

**Rural Conference Next Fall will Help the Farmer. Send Tallest Pole in world to Exposition.**

Portland, Or., August 6 (Special)—A rural conference that will deal with all phases of farm life will be held at the Oregon Agricultural College this fall. Dates have not been set yet, due to desire to avoid possible conflicts with other state gatherings.

The farm home will be studied at the coming conference. It is expected to have excursions run from various parts of the state, bringing representative farmers in large numbers. Experts on rural problems will talk and teachers and clergymen will give suggestions as to how country life may be made more pleasant and profitable.

The gathering is being arranged by Prof. Ralph D. Hetzel, director of extension at the college and he hopes to make it comprehensive in scope and expects the results will be helpful.

Oregon has contributed the tallest flag pole in the world to the Panama-Pacific Exposition. The stick measures 225 feet in height and was sent to the Astoria Centennial last summer. The pole was stowed in a log raft and taken to San Francisco. Portland people have promised a flag, 50 x 100 feet in size to fly from this big staff.

Picking of the Rogue River Valley fruit crop is now under way and it is the biggest in the history of this famous section. It is estimated there will be from 125 to 150 cars of pears shipped this season and from 500 to 600 cars of apples, all of fine quality.

Investigations without end have been directed at rural life and the end is not yet, but now comes the Government with its announced intention of muckraking the cities, and they need it more than the country ever did. A survey is to be made of urban life with a view to solving some of the problems that are found in every municipality. A government official who passed through Portland the past week told of the plan and says a great municipal exhibit will probably be gathered for the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

A small forest of fruit trees has been donated by members of the Nurserymen's Association of the Pacific Coast as special prizes to be given at the Pacific Northwest Land Products show. The trees will be kept in good condition by the nurserymen and delivered upon the order of the management of the land show at planting time next spring.

Flax will make quite a showing this year in Oregon, according to reports from those sections where the crop has been planted. Plantings made in the Willamette Valley last spring are looking exceptionally well and experts say it is as good flax as is usually seen. It is believed there is a great future in the Pacific Northwest for the flax industry. About 5,000 acres have been planted to this crop this year.

**First New Crop Barley Deal.**

Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 6.—The first barley deal on the new crop of 1912 occurred yesterday, when, through the best bid submitted, the Vollmer-Clearwater company bought 500 sacks from A. R. Johnson, whose farm is on the Lapwai road east of Lewiston. The price paid for Lapwai delivery is \$1.32. Mr. Johnson had asked for sealed bids and three were offered. The other bidders were Mr. Cluser, for the Tubers Brothers Milling company, and Mr. Neil for M. H. Houser. The Cluser bid was \$1.31 and that of Neil, \$1.28. It is believed the barley will grade brewing although it was bought as feed grade. It is believed the price paid was not a criterion of general opening prices in the Lewiston market but instead that the figure would drop materially lower in the next few days. Last year at this time barley was bought for \$1 with some contracts having been made as low as 90 cents. Before the season was closed the price had moved up to \$2.
