juice will drip, and pressure should not be used. The clear juice may be used at once, or may be strained through a flannel bag before use.

"When the juice has been measured into a clean preserving kettle, a pint of granulated sugar should be added for every pint of juice and stirred until dissolved. When it has been put on the fire and brought to a boil, it should be drawn back and skimmed. This should be repeated twice before pouring the liquid in hot, sterilized jelly glasses. These should be put near a sunny window in a room free from dust. The glasses should be covered with cheesecloth until the jelly has set.

"Large fruits, such as the apple, must be boiled in water until soft, and the liquid strained from the pulp before making the jelly. The heating of the fruit juice and sugar to the boiling point serves three purposes: to sterilize the material completely; to concentrate it to the proper consistency; and to invert, by the combined action of temperature and free acids, a large quantity of cane sugar, preventing the jelly from granulating.

"Precautions to be observed in jelly making are: Do not use iron or tin utensils; the fruits acid attack these metals and give a bad color to the finished product, and effect the taste; the kettle should be porcelain lined or enameled, or of aluminum. Do not cook the fruit juice and sugar too long or the pectin will lose its gelling power. Do not add too great a proportion of sugar or the jelly will crystallize. Hard boiling may also cause crystallization.

"Jellies should be covered as soon as they have set to prevent the growth of molds and bacteria and to prevent evaporation. They may be covered by a quarter-inch coat of sterilized paraffin. When removed from the glass the jelly should be firm but not tough. It should preserve its angles when cut, and should have a good color and a distinctive flavor of the juice used."

WEST MAKES WAR UPON SINGLE TAX

GOVERNOR AND TAX COMMISSION TO SUBMIT PLAN.

Oregon Equal Taxation League Joins Hands With Executive Against Tricky U'Ren and Fels Fund Propaganda.

At the request of the State Tax Commission, which intends in its own measure to prosecute vigorously the war against Single Tax, the Oregon Equal Taxation League withdrew its initiative petition against Single Tax. This petition was signed by almost 14,000 registered voters and represented the sentiment of at least 50,000 voters, whom it was impossible to reach in time. The signatures were obtained by voluntary circulators, most of them farmers. Over 12,000 of the signatures were obtained outside Multnomah County.

Fearing a chaotic condition in the minds of voters, Governor West wrote to the Equal Taxation League in Portland requesting that their measure be withdrawn.

Issue Clear Says West.

By so doing, he said, "the issue will be clearly drawn between two systems of taxation—one of which is Single Tax, the other in opposition to Single Tax, and at the same time presenting a rational plan of tax reform which will remove many of those causes which breed discontent, and give life and support to many radical schemes of taxation."

The letter was signed by Governor Oswald West, Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott, State Treasurer Thoms B. Kay and Tax Commissioners J. B. Eaton and Charles W. Galloway.

"While not specifically declaring against Single Tax the bills of the State Tax Commission will have the effect of nullifying the U'Ren campaign, and make it impossible to secure Single Tax county legislation by trickery or otherwise," said Phil Metschan, president of the Equal Taxation League.

"The decided stand taken by the Governor and the Tax Commission against Single Tax renders it unnecessary for our league to bring our bill before the people at the next election.

Joint Work to Be Done.

"Our organization will now get behind the Commission's reforms and at the same time we shall continue our campaign against the Single Tax measures proposed by U'Ren and the paid beneficiaries and emissaries of the Fels Fund."

In writing to the Tax Commission and agreeing to withdraw its measure, the Equal Taxation League said:

"It appears to us, in view of the definite stand your Commission has taken against Single Tax, that by joining forces with you the opposition to the Single Tax propaganda in Oregon will be concentrated and made more effective and that confusion will be avoided. In other words, as you say, 'the issue will be clearly drawn between two systems of taxation—one of which is Single Tax and the other in opposition to Single Tax.'"

The numbers of the tax measures on the ballot, which will bear Single Tax are 304, 305 and 308.
