**NOT THE MAN WANTED**

**Harry Smith Tells Straight Story--Will Likely be Released.**

Two Eugene officials arrived in Jacksonville Friday to examine Harry Smith, a negro and ex-soldier in the regular army known as "Cavalry Jack" who was arrested by the Medford police Wednesday under the theory that he knew something about the murder of 12-year old Mildred Green, daughter of Rev. H. A. Green, a baptist minister of Eugene. The child was brutally murdered in her room Monday night and the murderer is thought to be a negro. Smith, who is incarcerated in the county jail here, was able to tell a straight story and will doubtless be released from custody as the Eugene officers are of the opinion that he is not the man wanted. Smith was arrested on a technical charge of carrying concealed weapons.

**STRUCK BY MOTORCYCLE**

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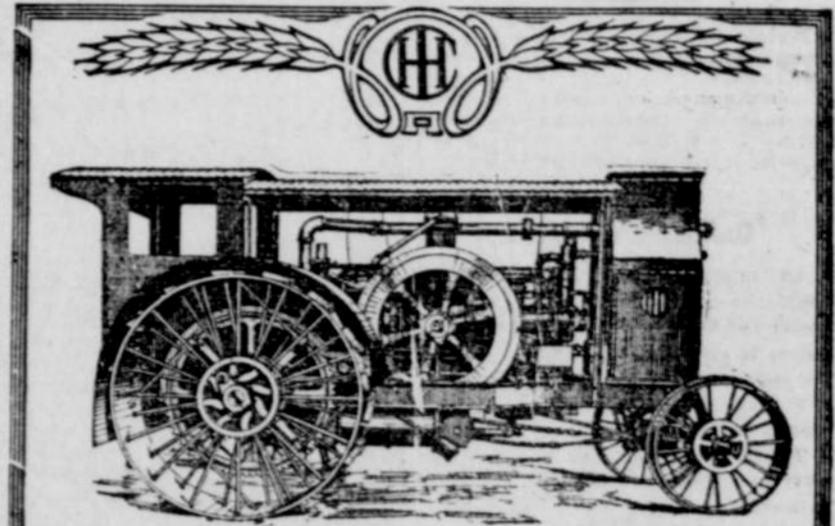
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
