NEWS IN BRIEF

Coyotes Plentiful.

Frank McCormick residing on Klamath lake says the west shores of Upper Klamath lake are alive with coyotes which are playing havoc with neighboring farmer's chickens. Mr. McCormick says that a good hunter could make good wages for a time killing them for the bounty. He offers to furnish the gun and ammunition if any one wants the job.

Phoenix Lumber Yard Sold.

The Western Lumber and Supply Co., having yards at Phoenix, sold their holdings last week to the Big Pines Lumber Co. of Medford. A resident manager will be placed on the ground by the Big Pines Co., and improvements made.

"Promoter" in the Toils.

Charles Y. Crane, who recently arrived in Medford, landed in the city jail Monday, charged with stealing and pawing the watch and chain of his landlady. Crane posed as the owner of a \$75,000 ranch and a \$100,000 mine, and put on all the frills and flourishes becoming a promoter.

Will Make Active Campaign.

Robert G. Smith, mayor of Grants Pass, and who was nominated for congress in April on the democratic ticket has announced that he will make an active campaign. As Mr. Smith's health has been poor for some time his friends feared that he could not make any determined effort for the place.

Long Distance Heliographing.

Heliographing between Eagle Ridge Tavern and the rim of Crater Lake, an air line distance of about 40 miles, has become the very latest fad in those parts. During a clear day Eagle Ridge Tavern can be seen from the rim of Crater Lake, and at such times an ordinary mirror is used to flash signals. The flashes are caught with the aid of field glasses.

Mountain Roads Bad.

Mountain roads through the Siskiyou are declared by travelers to be in very bad condition. This is especially true of roads in northern California, some of which are said to be almost impassable. The Medford-Crater Lake roads are claimed to be in much better condition than the average mountain road.

Klamath Lake Ducks Plentiful.

Reports from Klamath Lake are to the effect that ducks are exceptionally plentiful this year. As the duck season opens September 1st, duck hunters in this section are cleaning up their double barrels and pump guns and preparing for the fray.

Drowned While Swimming.

Claude Sills, 16-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Sills of Grants Pass, was drowned while swimming in the Rogue river near that city last week. Young Sills in company with two other boys, Herbert McKenzie and Clyde Harper, had gone to the river to swim. There they found a small boat and embarked in it, but the boat, not being large enough to bear their combined weight, sank leaving the boys struggling in the water. Although Sills could swim he apparently made no effort to save himself. Seeing this his two companions made a brave effort to get him ashore, but exhausted their strength and were obliged to give up the attempt.

Two Systems in One.

By October 1, 1912, the work covering installation of equipment providing trunking facilities between the Home and former Pacific Telephone exchanges will be completed, thereby effecting the physical connection of the two properties, and providing for interchange of service between users of telephones connected with other systems.
