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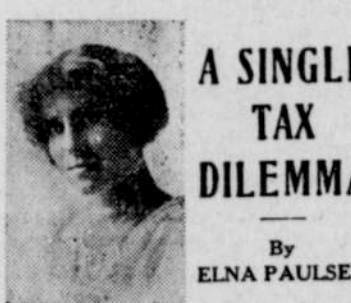

Address Jacksonville Citizens

From "Water Wagon" Auto.

An altogether unique method of campaigning was that employed by B. Lee Paget, Prohibition candidate for United States Senator and O. A. Stillman, candidate for Congress who delivered addresses here from their automobile "water wagon" Friday afternoon. The citizens of Jacksonville were afforded an opportunity to hear an able presentation of the Prohibition party's principles and policies in the speeches of these campaigners. Since their tour opened August 4, Messrs. Paget and Stillman have spoken in nearly 100 towns in Washington, Yamhill, Clackamas, Hood River, Marion, Polk, Benton, Linn, Lane, Douglas and Josephine counties, covering the entire distance of 1400 miles by automobile.
