

TRIP TO PORTLAND FOR PRIZE ESSAYS

CHILDREN OF STATE GIVEN A
GREAT OPPORTUNITY.

Compositions on "Evils of Single Tax"
Will Be Awarded Prizes—Full
Particulars Are Printed Here
For All Pupils.

Two three-day trips to Portland, with all traveling and hotel expenses paid, including tickets to all the leading theaters and other attractions in the metropolis, are offered as prizes to any grade or high school pupil in Oregon, outside of Portland, for the best composition on the subject: "The Evils of Single Tax."

One prize will go to a boy and one to a girl. Arrangements will be made for the couple to come to Portland fully chaperoned.

The prizes are offered by the Oregon Equal Taxation League, 708 Board of Trade Building, Portland, Oregon, and all compositions should be mailed to that address.

In addition to the two big prizes there will be a number of consolation prizes.

Writing Must Be Clear.

At the head of every composition the name and age of the pupil should be written, with the school he or she attends. There should also be a statement from a teacher or parent that the composition is the unaided work of the contestant.

All compositions must be written on one side of the paper only and if this rule is not followed, it will be necessary to reject the essay.

All writing must be clear and legible. No composition must be over 400 words in length.

Talk to Parents.

Children who desire to enter this contest should talk to older persons and get their views on the subject. They should ask their fathers and mothers what they think and they should learn just what harm this pernicious scheme would bring on the great State of Oregon.

Charles H. Shields, secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation League, said the other day: "The children of today will be the voters of tomorrow, and there can be no better chance for them to learn just what Mr. W. S. U'Ren and his Single Tax friends would inflict on Oregon when they ask the people of the state to vote for Single Tax."

"All compositions must be delivered at this office before September 15 and the award will be announced on or about October 15. We intend to be as fair as we can and will make allowances for the age of the children."

"I want every contestant to remember that the composition must be written in his best handwriting, for unless it can be read easily there is more than a chance that it might be missed."

"Compositions will be numbered as they arrive, so that if there are two compositions, one as good as another, the one that arrives first will have the best opportunity for the prize."

Here Are the Rules.

"If any child is in doubt about any part of these rules, I shall be pleased to answer letters, but I think if this is read over carefully there will be no need to answer questions. But, remember, every rule must be followed carefully. These rules are:

- "1. Tell your age.
- "2. Get a statement that composition is your own work.
- "3. Write on one side of the paper only.
- "4. No composition over 400 words.
- "5. Send in early to the Oregon Equal Taxation League, 708 Board of Trade Building. Contest closes October 1."

Oregon Sidelights.

A concrete brick plant is among the latest additions to the activities of Rainier.

Gervais Star: W. M. Weidner has 11 acres of cucumbers and is shipping about three tons a week to Portland.

Pendleton East Oregonian: Mrs. L. G. Peil, living on the Swant ranch near Milton, has raised some cucumbers that measure 15 inches in length and look like young watermelons.

J. W. Bailey, for two years city engineer at Baker, has gone to Weiser to serve the city council as consulting engineer in relation to the extensive municipal improvements planned there.

The taxpayers of the Metolius school district have voted to add high school grades, beginning this fall. A. G. Le-wark, formerly of Indianapolis, has been elected principal of the high school to be established.

Ashland Record: George Inlow has killed the biggest blacktail deer seen in this region for many years. He shot it in the Hyatt Prairie country. Its antlers had a spread of 33 inches with 13 points on one and 11 on the other. It weighed 282 pounds.

Oregon City Courier: Joseph Meindl brought to this office a new kind of turnip, called kolrabi, which grows on top of the ground and looks much like a cabbage head. Mr. Meindl is making a success of the new vegetable. They are splendid eating and find a ready market.

Cottage Grove Sentinel: A cabbage producing three heads, each weighing about three pounds, is an agricultural freak reported by J. Perkins. It is common for cabbage to produce small heads after the first growth has been cut off, but this particular plant has never been decapitated.

Weston Leader: Capable workmen are in demand in the Weston district, what with brickyard work, warehouse work, and the mountain harvest about to begin. The brickyard is short-handed, eight men who were enlisted from Pendleton having quit their jobs paying \$2.50 per day.—Journal.
