Talk of proposed new railroads recalls the fact that about three years ago, a right-of-way from Jacksonville through the Applegate valley to the Blue Ledge district was secured. A committee sent out from this city met landowners along the route of the proposed road and, with scarcely an exception, found them enthusiastically in favor of the project. Farmers, cattlemen and miners residing in the Applegate valley realize their need of a railroad. It will open up their country—a vast territory rich in mineral, timber, farming and grazing lands. Situated as we are at the very gateway to the Applegate, the benefits accruing to Jacksonville from such an enterprise are too numerous and apparent to be recapitulated. Sooner or later, either from here or elsewhere, a railroad will be built to tap the Applegate country. Would it not be well to make an effort to have it built from here?

**Man May Beat Wife.**

That a man has a right to inflict corporal punishment to his wife when her actions are such as to cause unfavorable comment was the ruling made by Judge Tazwell today when he released Weldon DeLashman and Mrs. DeLashman from the charge of disorderly conduct brought by Patrolman Nutto, who Monday saw the husband knock the wife down on the street. DeLashman is a bartender. It developed in court that Saturday night he completed his work and waited for his wife. He leaned against a lamp-post at First and Morrison three hours before she appeared. When she did arrive she was with another woman and two youths. DeLashman took exception to her conduct and hit her in the eye.—Journal, Sept. 17.

**NEWS IN BRIEF**

**Mrs. Lounsberry Returns.**

Mrs. Wells Lounsberry, wife of the Rogue River orchardist, wounded and captured in an attempt to escape after robbing a Union Pacific mail car some weeks ago, returned to her home on the Central Point-Jacksonville road Monday, after visiting her husband and friends in the east. Postal authorities who have been probing the matter, utterly failed to in any way connect Mrs. Lounsberry with her husband's lawless career. Friends of Mrs. Lounsberry state that she will make her home, for a time at least, at the family residence.

**Applegate Cattle Rustlers Busy.**

It is reported that D. S. Ames of the Applegate valley recently lost five head of beef steers through the agency of cattle rustlers. This and other losses sustained by neighbors has resulted in the organization of a vigilance committee by the Applegate cattlemen and it is likely to go hard with any rustler who falls into their hands. The thefts started some months ago, and at that time the ranchers banded together for the protection of their live stock. The rustlers, evidently frightened by this move ceased operation for a time, only to become active again when they thought that danger of detection was past. This time the ranchers are determined to put an end to the matter.

**Scientists Visit Crater Lake.**

The excursion to Crater Lake arranged by the Medford Commercial club for the entertainment of 70 of the world's foremost scientists, who are now touring the country, has been pronounced an unqualified success. Thirty autos were at hand upon the arrival of the party at Medford Monday morning and they were immediately taken to the lake, returning Wednesday. The visitors were profoundly impressed by the many scenic beauties of the lake and enthusiastic in praising the hospitality of Southern Oregon people.

**Gold Mine in Well.**

Workmen, digging a well for A. McNair Harrison at Gold Hill this week, uncovered a twelve-inch vein of fine quartz which seems to carry gold values. Specimen of the quartz are to be assayed to determine whether the prospect is worth working. The ledge was encountered at a depth of sixteen feet, and water in sufficient quantity was found at twenty-five feet.

**Entertains Passengers Agents.**

Over 100 general passenger agents from all sections of the United States were the guests of Medford people Tuesday morning for an hour, being taken for a drive throughout the city and surrounding orchard sections. Later they were informally entertained at the Rogue River Valley University club rooms. The agents arrived on a special train from the north about 11:30 a. m. and were immediately whisked away for a brief glimpse of city and valley. All were enthused by what they saw.—Sun.

**Raising More Fruit.**

An interesting fact concerning the agricultural development of the Rogue River valley has been brought to notice. In years past it took at least a dozen

threshing outfits to handle the crop of cereals raised. At the present time perhaps three machines can do the work. This is due entirely to the fact that the tillers of the soil have ascertained that they can make a better profit from their acres by raising hay and fruit than they ever did by growing wheat and oats.—Oregon Observer.

**Reform Wave Strikes Klamath.**

Klamath Falls.—After having waited in vain for some action by Mayor Nicholas and the chief of police to put a stop to vice in Klamath Falls, Sheriff Barnes last week took the matter into his own hands and, proceeding under a state law, sent out a moral squad to clean up the city. Deputy Sheriffs J. G. Schallack and James Wheeler began the move to clean up Klamath Falls early one morning, when they visited the red-light district and ordered the women of the demimonde to close up and move out.
