**NEWS IN BRIEF**

**Auto Accidents at Medford**

The beginning of the week was marked by a number of more or less serious auto accidents at Medford. Sunday young Roger Cowles, son of F. H. Cowles of Westaway orchards, while mounted on a bicycle which he was learning to ride, attempted to get out of the way of an auto driven by Frank Amy, but lost control of his wheel and fell under the car. A rear wheel passing over his leg and breaking it. A Conro Fiero's car and a machine owned by C. H. Corey and driven by his son, Everett, figured in another accident when they came together in a head-end collision. No one was injured, although both cars were badly damaged. A third collision was between one of Eades Bros., drays and an auto driven by a Mr. Jennings. The machine was partially wrecked but fortunately no one was injured.

**Believes in Rogue River Valley.**

C. W. Dossett, formerly connected with the Spokane apple show, who has been supervising the trees grown by Roguelahds and has met with remarkable success, left the middle of the week for Yakima, Wash. Mr. Dossett is a firm believer in the future of the Rogue River valley and declared that the best pears and peaches in the world can be grown here. He also believes that no apple grown can surpass the Rogue River Yellow Newtowns, and he favors making more of a feature of this apple than is the case at present. Mr. Dossett has studied fruit culture from coast to coast and from Maine to New Mexico and is considered one of the best authorities on fruit pruning in the country.—Sun.

**Strikers Want Peace.**

Bingham, Sept. 25.—The developments in today's strike of 4500 miners here favor a peaceable settlement instead of a clash between the armed strikers and hundreds of deputy sheriffs. Leaders of the strikers reacted over the announcement by the Utah Copper company that Leonidas J. Sklaris, employment agent, who is distasteful to union men, has resigned. Following this announcement the leaders were appointed to bring about a meeting between them and the company officials.

**Different Here.**

Minneapolis, Sept. 25.—Snow again struck the northwest today. Reports from the Dakotas and western Minnesota told of a heavy fall in the various districts. In the Twin Cities and in central Minnesota a twelve-hour rain today was followed by a cold wave. Dispatches from Fargo declare the snow flattened the uncut corn and flax

and thousands of harvest hands have left the state. Snow fell Tuesday and Wednesday in western Dakota and the Rocky Mountain states, imperiling crops and stock. The fall today is the earliest in the history of the middle west. The weather is unsettled.

**Wholesale Fruit Raising.**

The Suncrest orchard, which comprises the old Patterson ranch east of Talent, is getting in a carload of paper for use in wrapping and packing apples. The same orchard has received a carload of boxes (shipped knocked down) totaling about 15,000 boxes. The Suncrest orchard has 130 acres in bearing out of 460 acres, most of the balance being in young trees.—Ashland Tidings.

**Gathers Crop; Then Goes to Jail.**

Portland.—Ab Captain, honest Indian, was waiting at the United States marshal's office in the postoffice building when it opened the other morning to begin his sentence of 60 days for introducing whiskey into the Klamath reservation. He was sentenced in July, but execution was postponed several times to give him plenty of time to harvest his crops, as he is an extensive farmer. Captain carried a large grip full of things he believed he would need during his two months' sojourn in the county jail, and before being taken down, requested permission to go out and have his shoes shined. Charles Gray, who was convicted with Captain, began serving his sentence September 1. He was paroled too, until his crops were in, but was not hindered so much by rain.
