FRANK NORRIS KILLED

Former Jacksonville Boy Meets Death at Weed, Cal.

Frank Grady Norris, twenty-one years old, a nephew of Alex Norris, and a former resident of this city was killed early Sunday morning while at work in a mill at Weed, Calif. Young Norris who was employed in the boiler room in the capacity of head fireman had crawled through a small passage leading to the sawdust bin with the intention of raking down sawdust with which to feed the fires. While engaged in this work it is supposed he dislodged a mass of over-hanging sawdust which fell and smothered him. The unfortunate young man was buried for about thirty minutes before he was missed and a search made for him. Efforts to resuscitate him were without avail.

Frank Norris was well known here, making his home with his parents in this city for a number of years. Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Norris, of Medford, he leaves a wife and young child. Funeral services and interment was held at Phoenix Wednesday afternoon.

Ralph Williams Given 60 Days.

Ralph Williams charged with breaking up the dishes and furniture in his parents home while out of his mind due to the effects of a habit to which he is said to be afflicted, and who struck his mother, according to the police, was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail by Justice of the Peace Taylor Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Williams stood steadfastly by her boy and only consented to prosecute when she was told that it probably would be better for the boy to spend sometime in jail, and allow him to get a grip on his appetite.—Tribune.

Heinie Heitmuller Dead.

Los Angeles, Oct. 8.—Heinie Heitmuller, star batsman of the Los Angeles Coast league baseball team, died today in the Good Samaritan hospital here of typhoid fever. He had been ill for about 10 days, and was taken to the hospital just before his team left for San Francisco last week. It had been reported that he was improving from day to day and his death came as a shock to his friends.

Heitmuller had been playing in the outfield for Los Angeles and was the heaviest hitter on the team. His loss

will be greatly felt by his club. He was a graduate of the University of California and first became famous in baseball as a member of the college nine. He was a member of the Philadelphia Americans in 1909.

William Heitmuller began his baseball career in 1900 at the University of California in 1900, he was captain of the varsity football team and won fame in the Stanford and California game in 1903.

After finishing college he came to Jacksonville to play in the Rogue River Valley League. He remained on the Jacksonville team a short time when he was taken sick and returned home to Oakland Calif.

In 1905 he signed with Everett, Wash. In 1906, he played with the Oakland Coast League team in the outfield. In 1907 he was taken by the Philadelphia Americans and remained with the Athletics through 1908. In 1909 he went to Baltimore and returned to the Pacific Coast League in 1910, signing with Los Angeles. He led the Coast League in hitting for many weeks, being passed only a short time ago by Del Howard of the San Francisco team. He hit .336 for the year. Heitmuller was a San Franciscan and was 31 years old.

FRUIT APPRECIATED

Eastern Paper Says Rogue River Pears Finest on Market.

"Six cars of California deciduous fruit were disposed of, including the first car of Rogue river pears received in this market in years. The new pears are from Oregon and are extra fine in quality, with sales ranging from \$2.10 to \$2.50 a box."

"A straight carload of Rogue river Bartlett pears from Oregon sold at auction here yesterday at an average price of \$2.30 a box. The quality of the new pears was said by experts in this line to be the finest ever seen on this market."

These reports were contained in the market comment and naturally were absolutely impartial and constituted an official estimate placing Rogue River pears ahead of any fruit of the kind ever grown.—Sun.

Consideration \$12,000. It is proposed to immediately put a force of men to work developing this property. COURT HOUSE NOTES

New Pump Installed. County Jail Prisoner Accidentally Hurt.

Ernest Langley and E. S. Wilson installed a new submerged centrifugal two-step pump at the court house pumping plant this week to supply water to the different offices and the county jail. This pump is driven by a 7½ horse-power vertical motor and has a capacity of 12,000 gallons of water an hour. It can be operated at a cost of \$7 per month, which is a distinct saving, as, including repairs, it cost the county about \$10 per month to run the old pump.

Charles Johnson, an inmate of the county jail, received a painful injury while assisting the men on the wood saw at the court house last week. Johnson attempted to kick a block of wood from beneath the machine when his leg came in contact with the saw teeth inflicting a painful but not serious wound. A physician was called and the wound dressed. Johnson is rapidly recovering from his hurt and henceforth, doubtless, will have much greater respect for a revolving saw.

John Whitehead, a farmer of the Applegate district was committed by Judge Neil to the state asylum for the insane at Salem, Thursday. Mr. Whitehead was formerly a partner of Erick Anderson of the Blue Ledge country, and is well known in this city having been a resident of the county for a number of years.

Oregon Sidelights.

The first electric sign in Woodburn made its appearance last week. It lures toward a lunch counter.

The Silverton high school now offers Latin, English and German courses. The enrollment of 100 students is expected.

Independence Enterprise: Sloper Bros. have secured the contract of drilling the well at Monmouth for the city water system.

Oregon City Courier: The excavation for the new Carnegie public library is well along. It is expected to be finished and opened for the public in three months.

Independence Monitor: A party found 31 acres of government land surrounded by good farms near the Newtown place on the Peedee a short time ago and has just completed filing on the tract for a homestead.

Forest Grove News-Times: John Ranes of Gales Creek has a large stump puller, which he bought in Iowa. The puller, it is claimed, will yank out a stump three feet across. It works by horse power.

Lents Herald: Nicholas Faler, a Lents resident, who has been engaged in the culture of mushrooms on a small scale, brought a single mushroom to this office that weighed one and a half pounds and measured 27 inches in circumference.

Hill-boro Independent: The new street flusher throws a stream with such force that debris is washed into the gutters on either side. Pressure from the mains compresses air in the tank as the water is drawn from the hydrant and this supplies the force.

NEWS IN BRIEF

Will Enforce Pool Room Law.

Prosecuting Attorney Mulkey will begin at once an active campaign against violators of the law in Jackson county prohibiting minors in pool halls and made the second move in this direction Wednesday when he caused the arrest of J. L. Garom and W. B. Thurbur of Talent on this charge. The pair were fined \$25 and costs in Justice Taylor's court, which they paid.—Sun.

Convicts Not Heartless.

As an example of the openheartedness of men behind prison walls, a little incident occurred during the past week which should demonstrate that a "convict" is by no means the hard-hearted brute he is so often pictured. An inmate, suffering from an acute

ble malady, was promised his release provided he could raise the money to pay his fare to a warm, dry climate. As soon as this was made known a paper was passed around and the required amount (about \$25) raised in a few hours, many of the men donating the last cent they had. This is the second case of this kind within the past three months, more than \$50 being raised for the first.—Lend-a-Hand.

Says He is Persecuted.

Salem, Or., Oct. 8.—Declaring that he is being persecuted by enemies, a man believed to be mentally unbalanced entered the executive office here today and demanded protection from Governor West, and while the officers were immediately communicated with, he succeeded in escaping before they could reach the scene and apprehend him. Ralph W. Watson the governor's private secretary, who was in the office when the man entered is of the opinion that it is the same man who last summer sent communications to the governor saying that he was being prosecuted and demanding protection.

To Make Him Pay For Visit.

Because their step-father, Charles Zeller, made them a visit of 15 years and ate three large meals a day during that time, Ella V. Reynard and Amos B. Frost have asked the courts to assess him the value of his board and lodging, which they place at \$9000. Judgment for that amount is demanded in an action filed in Circuit Court.

Will Improve Harbor.

Crescent City and Medford will be represented this week in San Francisco, where a meeting with government engineers will be held regarding the construction of a deep sea harbor at Crescent City or Woolseyport. According to reports, Crescent City has raised \$125,000 by subscription to aid in the harbor work and District Attorney Webb of that city is now in San Francisco. Medford will be represented by a San Francisco man delegated by local members of the Medford-Crescent City railroad. Major Morrow and Colonel Biddle, for the government, reported favorable on the Woolseyport harbor and residents of Crescent City are confident that with available funds subscribed work of construction will soon begin.—Tribune.

Civic Duties vs Political Game.

Ida M. Tarbell says one of her chief objections to woman suffrage is that "it will take the attention of women from what I believe to be their civic duties by interesting them in the political game, when they should be concentrating their attention on specific civic work."

All right minded women want this work done, but differ as to the method. The suffragist thinks the ballot the way for all ills of society. The anti-suffragist believes that the constant and effective influence now exerted by women on legislation and public affairs is due to the character and intelligence of the women who advocates good causes. A woman now interested in a matter of public welfare is known to be unselfish and with only the interest of her cause at heart. The same woman under woman suffrage is only one of many political units with ignorant and indifferent women voters added to the other elements arrayed against her success.

A few women today are idealizing the ballot, while what will really solve juvenile delinquency, intemperance, the white slave traffic and the social evil is education, education and more education in the home and from the earliest hour of childhood, and therein lies the civic duty of woman, bigger than the casting of any ballot, and absorbing enough to occupy all the women of Oregon for all time.

It is to keep the women of this state out of the "political game" and leave them free for the greatest of all their duties that we ask you to vote against the woman suffrage amendment at the coming election.

WAR DECLARED

Passports Handed Sulian's Charge d'Affaires at Cetinje.

London, Oct. 8.—A dispatch to Reuters agency here from Cetinje, Montenegro, says that Montenegro has declared war against Turkey. The dispatch also reported heavy fighting along the Montenegrin frontier.

London, Oct. 8.—Confirmation of the report that Montenegro had declared war against Turkey was received today by the Montenegrin consular general here. He said that passports had been handed the Turkish charge d'affaires at Cetinje, and that the Montenegrin representative at Constantinople had been ordered home.

Diplomats in London are greatly depressed over Montenegro's early declaration of hostilities. They believe that it will now be impossible for powers to prevent Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece from issuing a similar declaration.

Bert Cummings Again Free Man.

Bert Cummings arrested charged with complicity in the murder of George Dedaskalous, a Greek, was discharged by Justice of the Peace Taylor Tuesday afternoon following a lengthy hearing. W. P. Mealey defended Cummings and had little difficulty in freeing his man.

Mike Sparos bound over for the murder of Dedaskalous was the only witness against Cummings. On the stand as chief witness he further entangled himself in connection with the crime and told a story different in several particulars from the one he had previously told the officers.

Cummings proved an alibi by his wife. The officers are satisfied that he had nothing to do with the crime but that Sparos endeavored to throw the blame on him in an effort to free himself.—Tribune.
