Save Your County.

Of all the measures before the people at the November election none is more absolutely vicious and unjust than No. 348-9 on the official ballot providing for the division of counties.

It is bad, unfair and unjust in many ways, but one provision alone is sufficient to condemn it without further consideration. It provides that in the organization of a new county out of one or more existing counties only those residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county may vote upon the proposition, and if 60 per cent of these be favorable the new county comes into existence. The people in the remainder of the county or counties so cut down are helpless, having no voice whatever in the matter, even though they may outnumber the people in the proposed new county ten to one.

If this measure should become law but a county in our state will be divided.

Vote "No" on No. 348-9.

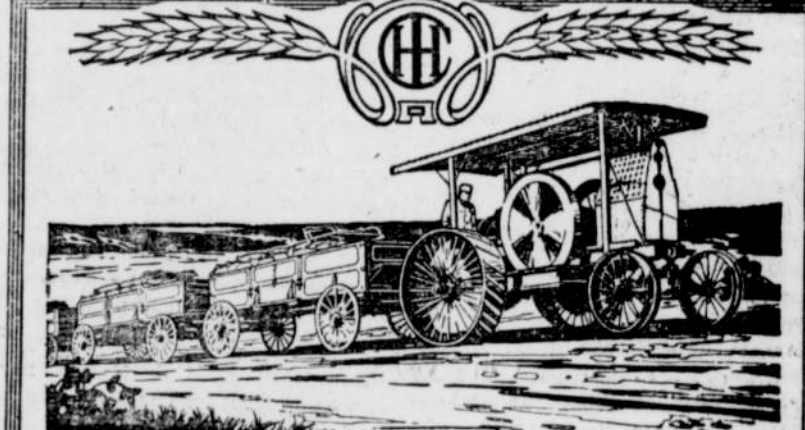
