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THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

As we go to press the political situation remains about the same—members of the different parties prophecy the election of their favorite candidate as a matter of course.

Regarding the election of president and vice president the horizon is not at all clear except in so far as that the race will be close. In fact to disinterested persons it looks as though there might be no choice by the people, that is, that neither Taft, Wilson nor Roosevelt will have a sufficient number of electors to elect, in which case the selection of a president and vice president would devolve upon the house of representatives.

In the state appearances indicate the election of the regular republican ticket with a close race between Selling and Bourne for U. S. Senator.

The county will undoubtedly go republican with the exception of Singler for sheriff, who it is conceded will be defeated by W. A. Jones the present incumbent. A couple of close contests are expected, viz. between Dunn and TouVelle for county judge and between Gardner and Miller for clerk.

As to the proposed measures upon the ballot: the average voter will do well if he understands the effect of one-half of them made into laws. As to those you do not understand the safest plan will be to vote "No." It is better to hold fast to the laws we have than to adopt new ones unless we are sure that the new is better than the old.

H. K. Hanna does not pose as the friend of criminals nor as "a man who can successfully defend crooks," but he does stand for the enforcement of all criminal laws, fairly and impartially and without unnecessary expense to the taxpayer. NEWS IN BRIEF

Quits Journalism to Turn Farmer

S. A. Pattison and family left Monday for Silver Lake, Castle Rock, Wash. where Mr. Pattison has purchased a farm and will hereafter reside there. Mr. Pattison was the founder of the Central Point Herald, former president of the Jackson County Press association and for twenty year a newspaper publisher. He still retains large interests in Central Point and expects to spend a large portion of his time there in the future.—Tribune.

Steers Slain by Hunters.

M. E. Funston, a cattleman of upper Elk creek is down from the hills with blood in his eye looking for a party of Medford nimrods who invaded his domain last week and killed two fine steers leaving them where they fell. They were of brindle color and had evidently been mistaken for deer. Mr. Funston states that this makes six head of cattle he has lost during the past four years at the hands of careless hunters. The last two were pierced with a 30-30 bullet.—Tribune.

Large Crop of Winter Nelis.

The full returns from this year's pear crop at the Snowy Butte Orchard present some interesting figures to show what can be done on a 14-acre orchard tract in this valley. The trees on this tract are set 25 feet apart and this year produced an average of 7.6 boxes per tree amounting to 535 boxes per acre. The total output of pears is given as 713 boxes of Winter Nelis, 128 boxes of Fall Butters, 89 boxes Comice and 167 boxes of Bartlets, these last three varieties coming from graft on the winter Nelis trees. The total

yield was 7487 boxes from 985 trees.—Central Point Herald.

National Guard at Klamath Falls

Salem, Ore., Oct. 31.—Colonel C. C. Hammond of the Oregon National Guard was today called upon by Adjutant General Finzer to take care of the municipal embargo at Klamath Falls, which promises much trouble. Finzer is acting under orders from Governor West. The trouble arises out of an attack on Vance Hutchins, a newspaperman by Policeman Hall, after Hutchins' paper made the declaration that the city is in possession of a "lawless gang." Wholesale trouble is feared as a result of the attack, and Colonel Hammond will go to Klamath Falls in an endeavor to prevent further disturbances.

Baker Democrat: Portland is still building skyscrapers and is the wonder of every eastern visitor.

Dufur Dispatch: The contract was let last week for the construction of the new library building. It will be constructed of concrete blocks.

W. W. Wiley has resigned the principalship of the Athena high school and the vacancy has been filled by the election of Howard Drew, who leaves a position in the La Grande high school.

La Pine Intermountain: J. E. Morson last week brought in an auto load of purple top turnips, many of which measure from 20 to 23 inches circumference. The seed was sown broadcast on June 29, and the turnips were raised according to dry farm methods.

Klamath Falls Northwestern: The new auto truck recently ordered by the Klamath county court for use in road construction is of 50 horse power and is built to carry 12,000 pounds on any reasonable grade. The car is to be taken immediately to the Merrill country.

Dallas Observer: Eight hundred and sixty-two volumes of new library books for the school libraries of Polk county have been received at the office of County Superintendent H. C. Seymour. The shipment comprises the order recently placed with the state commission by the different schools. The books consist of text and reference works and some fiction.
