Eugene Claims 17,100 People.

Eugene, Or., Nov. 5.—If directory figures are to be relied upon, the population of Eugene is 17,100. The new directory now being printed by the Polk Company contains approximately 8250 names and using the multiple of two, gives this estimate of population. The city has grown rapidly since the census of 1910 was taken. The enumerators counted only 9000 people here at that time, but it is known that they missed whole sections of the city and it is claimed that their work was very ragged. It is believed that 1600 people in the city at that time were not enumerated.

Altitudes in United States.

The differences between the Eastern and Western elevations in this country are striking. Colorado has 40 peaks that are more than 14,000 feet above sea level. Mount Washington, in New Hampshire, and Mount Mitchell, in North Carolina, the highest peaks in the Appalachian system, north and south, respectively, are considerably less than half as high as this above the ocean.

Several transcontinental railway lines in the West pull their main line trains over a greater elevation than that reached by the cog railroad up New Hampshire's above-mentioned peak. These Western elevations are, of course, reached gradually.

Most large cities lie low. Chicago is only about 600 feet above sea level, and Pittsburg but 100 feet higher. Philadelphia ranges from sea level to a height in the suburbs of some 300 feet. Minneapolis, near the head of the Mississippi, has an elevation of less than 1000 feet, and various parts of New Orleans at the mouth of the great river are recorded in the Government tables as having elevations of from one foot to 50 feet. St. Louis lies about half way between these terminal cities.

Montana is away up, with its leading city perched at the elevation of the highest peaks of the Adirondack Mountains. In Denver there is a mark, near the State Capitol, which is just one mile above sea level.—Telegram.

Why Not Feet Per Second?

It is a singular testimony to the persistence of impressions and the natural conservatism of mankind that we continue to use "familiar" expressions long after they have lost their original correctness of application. Thus we say "miles per hour" in estimating rates of speed, even in cases where only very short distances are covered. This practice has become a habit, and not a very creditable one at that. Much better would be the expression "feet per second," and this phrase would be equally understandable and far more explicit. "Miles per hour" is easily reduced to "feet per second" by a simple formula (the multiplying of the rate of speed in miles per hour by 1.466). Conversely, the rate of speed in feet per second is converted to miles per hour by multiplying the "feet per second" figures by 0.682. Approximately, "miles per second" is one and a half times "miles per hour," and similarly "miles per hour," is about two thirds "feet per second."—Scientific American.

Hurrah, for Wilson!

Catching a Wolf Alive.

One of the favorite sports of a Polish country gentleman is to capture a wolf alive. A wolf being driven into the open, the well mounted horseman pursues it, armed only with a long whip and some rope. The wolf after a time tries to take rest, but the rider forces it on with his whip till, after repeated attempts at rest, it sinks exhausted. The rider then springs from his horse, jumps astride the wolf and, holding it by the ears, secures it with the rope. Most men require the assistance of a mounted companion, who ties the wolf while the other holds its ears with both hands, and in this way the capture is comparatively easy, but to do it single handed is a difficult feat. Nasty bites and even dangerous wounds result should the hunter have miscalculated the strength of the animal. No one, however, is considered a perfect sportsman till he has done this, yet many never succeed.

How Cowards Were Punished.

Many of the devices by which military indifference to life has been nurtured and sustained are curious. In ancient Athens the public temples were closed to those who refused military service, who deserted their ranks or lost their fighters, while a law constrained such offenders to sit for three days in the public forum dressed in the garments of a woman. Many a Spartan mother would stab her son who came back alive from a defeat, and such a man, if he escaped his mother, was debarred not only from public offices, but from marriage, exposed to the blows of all who chose to strike him, compelled to dress in mean clothing and to wear his beard negligently trimmed. In the same way a horse soldier who fled or lost his shield or received a wound in any save the front part of the body was by law prevented from ever afterward appearing in public.
