

**WAYLAND COMMITS SUICIDE****Owner of Appeal to Reason Shoots Himself.**

Girard, Kan., Nov. 11.—"The struggle under the competitive system is not worth while. Let it pass."

This note was found here today in the home of Julius A. Wayland, owner of the "Appeal to Reason," a socialist publication, who ended his life here yesterday by firing a revolver into his mouth. The note was in Wayland's handwriting.

Friends here believe that federal prosecution of Wayland and Fred Warren, editor of the publication, and of E. L. Phifer, an editorial writer, prompted the action of Wayland. The three men were to have been arraigned at Fort Scott today on charges of sending obscene matter through the mails.

Other friends say that Wayland brooded continually over the death of his wife, who was killed in an automobile accident a year ago, and that this may have had something to do with the suicide.

Schrank Pleads Guilty.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 12.—John Schrank, who shot Colonel Theodore Roosevelt here three weeks ago as the latter was entering an automobile to go to the Auditorium for an address, pleaded guilty today to assault with intent to murder. Colonel Roosevelt will be asked to come to Milwaukee to testify against his assailant, if examination shows Schrank to be sane, according to District Attorney Zabel.

Schrank was brought into the courtroom heavily manacled. He pleaded to the charge before Municipal Judge August Backus.

"Did you intend to murder Theodore Roosevelt, as charged?" asked District Attorney Zabel. "Do you plead guilty or not guilty?"

"I plead guilty to shooting that man, if that is what you mean," answered Schrank.

"Did you intend to kill Theodore Roosevelt?"

"I did not intend to kill Roosevelt, the citizen," responded Schrank, "but I did intend to warn the third term."

"Did you intend to kill or murder Roosevelt, the Progressive candidate for president?" asked Zabel. "I want a direct answer."

"I intended to kill Roosevelt, the third term," insisted Schrank. "I didn't want to kill the Progressive party. I shot Roosevelt as a warning to other third terms."

Judge Backus adjourned the hearing until 2 o'clock this afternoon, when a commission to investigate Schrank's sanity will be named.

Attorney Christian Doersler was appointed by the court to defend Schrank. The extreme penalty on conviction of the charge laid against Schrank is 15 years' imprisonment.

Judge Backus this afternoon named the Schrank insanity commission as follows: Dr. Walter Kempster, expert alienist; Dr. Alfred Young, county physician, and Dr. S. C. Studley, of Riverside sanitarium. They will report later. If Schrank is found insane he will be sent to an asylum.

Dozens of messages are being received by District Attorney Zabel urging him to treat Schrank leniently.

Jerry Nunan Big Aid to Lane.

Portland, Nov. 12.—No man ever was elected to the United States senate as cheaply as Dr. Harry Lane.

Aside from his traveling expenses, for which he does not have to account under the law, it cost him exactly \$37. The traveling expenses covered 90 days, at a little less than \$5 a day, or \$425. The total cost of electing Harry Lane to the senate does not amount to \$500. In the old days a single member of the legislature would scorn less than \$500 for his vote in a senatorial contest.

"I got the senatorship at a bargain," grinned Dr. Lane, looking like a cat that has just swallowed a canary. "But I haven't made any profit out of it."

"Well," was suggested, "the salary of senator for six years is \$45,000, which is pretty good" returns for \$35 in cash and the pleasure of taking a vacation throughout the state at a cost of \$425."

Dr. Lane smiled some more.

"There is only \$75 that I have to make an accounting of," continued the doctor. "Of this, \$40 was contributed. An old Irish man, Jerry Nunan, of Jacksonville, sent me \$20, and I would not have accepted it but for the kind letter that accompanied it. Jerry is an old patient of mine, and I saved his life once when he was dangerously ill. Then John Van Zante came in one day and handed me a twenty. I didn't want to take it, but John insisted, and I couldn't refuse such a nice fellow as John Van Zante, so I handed the money over to Judge Seneca Smith to be used, but just then in came a bill for \$75 for printing my cards, and as I didn't have much change, I took back the Van Zante money from Smith, dug up the \$20 from Jerry Nunan and contributed \$35 from my own pocket and paid the bill. And that is every cent that the law says I must account for."

Give Skin to Save Boy's Arm

In order to save the right arm of Norman Merrill who was badly injured a week ago while out hunting, eight square inches of skin will be grafted on the injured member by Dr. Porter. The skin will be furnished by the young man's two sisters, Mrs. A. A. Flynn of Medford and Miss Edna Merrill of San Francisco. Such an operation was deemed necessary to save the arm from amputation.

The grafting process will require the greatest medical skill in order to insure growth of the grafted covering, but if it is successful Dr. Porter hopes that nature will step in and the arm will eventually be restored to its normal usefulness. Merrill is getting stronger rapidly and gives every promise of having the use of his arm in the near future.—Sun.

Story of Confessed Robber.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 12.—Local and government authorities are slow in believing the story of George Maine, the eighteen year old ranch hand who surrendered himself at the police station here, saying he was one of the bandits who held up the Shasta Limited near Redding Friday. In compliance with his request, he was taken to the scene of the hold-up today to point out the places where he says the mail sack was burned and the nitro-glycerine buried.

While the police are inclined to believe that the youth is demented, they say he tells a number of surprising things, and his original story remains unshaken after hours of questioning. Robert Benshoff, an employe of the Rupp ranch at Sisson, will attempt to identify Maine, who says he was employed at the ranch.

James Gaynor of the United States secret service bureau and Special Agent Thomas of the Southern Pacific will sift Maine's story to the bottom.

FINDS OFFICIAL GUILTY**Mayor of Klamath Falls and Sheriff, District Attorney Hear from Governor.**

Salem, Or., Nov. 13.—Basing his opinion on the report of Colonel Lawson, who went to investigate conditions in Klamath Falls, and other reports, Governor West today sent a scathing letter to Mayor T. F. Nicholas, Sheriff W. B. Barnes and District Attorney D. V. Kuykendall. The governor's letter says in part:

"We find that past conditions in Klamath Falls have been such as to give just cause for complaint. We will, however, devote our attention to the present and future. This office is charged with the enforcement of the law. It is advised that the laws of this state covering gambling, immoral houses and the sale of liquors are now being violated and that this fact has been known to the officers charged with enforcement of the law."

"We are advised that certain of these officers justify their action in not enforcing the law by saying that public opinion favored their existence. It is the duty of such public officials to interpret and enforce the laws, not to interpret and enforce public opinion."

"I hereby request that you, as officers of the law, take prompt steps to bring about a strict enforcement of the laws as to the matters complained of. Otherwise, this office will feel that it is its duty to take such action as will bring about the desired results. Your attention is particularly called to the road house known as the 'Altamont Tavern.'"

"These are all matters which should be properly taken care of by local officers without interference on the part of this office and it will be for the best interest of all concerned and save the city and county the unpleasant notoriety which usually accompanies an investigation from the outside, if taken care of by the local officers."

Oregon Sidelights.

Hepner Gazette Times: The Ladies' Improvement society, being very desirous of putting the proposed fence around the graveyard, once again urges all to donate. It is their desire to have the fence completed by the holidays.

Drewsey News: Millsdale, from its favored location, is to become one of the best towns of Harney county. John Ott & Co's. large sawmill of that place will saw over a million feet of lumber next season. A large shingle plant will be in operation there as soon as it can be installed.

Joseph Herald: Another carload of elk will be brought to Joseph from Wyoming about next February to be turned into the elk pasture in the northern part of the county. They will be fed at Joseph for several months—perhaps until May before taking them to the reserve.

Banks Herald: The first artesian well this side of the Cascade range, in Oregon, was obtained last Friday at Christie for the Damascus Creamery company's cooling station three miles southeast of Banks. There is a steady flow of approximately 100 barrels of clear cool, soft water every day.

Estacada Progress: Clark Denny, who owns a tract of land across the Clackamas, has been experimenting with White Dent corn the past four years and has had good success, this season picking over 23 bushels from a half acre, after feeding his stock out of the patch a month.

Tillamook Herald: The enterprising citizens of Beaver and vicinity have organized a berry association and have an acreage of some 35 acres pledged by the different ranchers for cultivation. The plants will be set out next spring and the following season the dryer will be installed.

Oregon City Courier: Active work on the foundation wall of the Episcopal church is going on. This work has been slow and expensive, but this big wall when completed will make the most handsome church site in Oregon City. High on the bank of the Willamette, it will have a most beautiful view.

Solo News: A plan is on foot to reorganize the Solo Condensed Milk company and increase the capital stock. The condensation has been closed the past year on account of lack of funds, but an experienced operator has joined the corporation and taken charge, and will place it in operation this coming spring.—Journal.

Medford Rate Bill Now Law.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 11.—The state railroad commission has notified the larger carriers in the state that the Medford traffic bureau rate bill has apparently been carried and if so, it is in force and that the carriers are liable to a penalty for every shipment they make not in conformity with the rates prescribed by the law.

"I don't care to discuss the merits of the bill," said Clyde B. Aitchison, state railroad commissioner, "because that feature is now entirely closed by the affirmative vote of the people. The commission expects to enforce the law in case the carriers do not voluntarily comply with its provisions. It is manifestly impossible for them to line up their rates instantaneously as the bill affects the entire traffic structure of the state. The carriers have promised to inform us as promptly as possible what line of policy they decide upon."

Horses Perish in Blaze.

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 11.—Fire in this city last Saturday night totally destroyed a half block of wooden buildings, all but one of which occupied by Banks & Walker's livery stable, in which 11 out of 50 horses perished.

Adjoining buildings were badly damaged, bringing the total aggregate loss up to \$30,000, with \$6250 insurance. The next loss to the livery stables and contents is \$13,500. The origin of the fire is not known, but there is strong evidence of incendiarism. A shift in the wind was all that saved the Van Houten annex to the Hotel McClallen and a residence.

During the progress of the fire, a second blaze, five blocks away, destroyed the residence of Mrs. Lucinda Moore, together with nearly all of the household goods. In her extreme nervousness over the livery stable fire, Mrs. Moore dropped a lighted kerosene lamp in a clothes closet. With the assistance of her sister, Mrs. Moore dragged her 77-year-old mother, Mrs. W. B. Singleton, a paralytic, out of the house and abandoned all else to the flames. This loss is \$1500, with \$700 insurance.

The Unregistered Army.

In spite of all the trampeting and drum beating, the making of political war medicine and appeals to the sense of citizenship, 14,000 men of voting age in Toledo—it has been estimated—have failed to register this fall. It is left for something more than 35,000 voters to decide whether the republic shall fall or the country be saved, so far as this community is concerned, whereas the duty should rest with more than 50,000.

There are two ways by which this lamentable apathy could be overcome. If a price were put on voting, no doubt the registration would be larger. It is hard to get some men to accept things which cost them nothing. They have a temperamental suspicion of anything free of cost. The other way to correct the evil is to fine those who don't exercise the franchise. Instead of calling the vote a privilege, we establish the principle that voting is a duty. The thing is done in Belgium. It could be done in this country.

It doesn't seem to do much good to tell people who won't vote that they've no reason to complain of the government they live under. They kick anyway. We suspect they kick harder than all others. To get a democracy that is a real and thorough democracy it may be necessary some day to lay either a trail of sugar to the polls or else make staying away from the polls a thing to be answered for in some court of law.

Shoots Mother for Burglar.

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 13.—As the result of a shooting fray aboard a Pennsylvania railroad train near here this morning, Mrs. Elizabeth Myers is dead and the police are holding her daughter Gladys 13 years old, pending an investigation. Gladys and her brother, Roppe Myers, planned a double wedding, and mother and daughter were en route to New York to purchase the girl's trousseau.

According to Miss Myers' story, her mother awakened her suddenly and the girl, mistaking the woman for a burglar, fired a bullet into Mrs. Myers' right lung. The mother was rushed to a hospital here, but died shortly after her arrival.

SPAIN'S PREMIER SHOT**Canalejas Hand Just Left Carriage When shot was Fired.**

Madrid, Nov. 12.—Premier Canalejas was assassinated here today. The murderer, Manuel Pardo y Zarrate then committed suicide.

When the tragedy occurred Canalejas had just left his carriage and was about to cross a square to the ministry building. The street was crowded, and as the premier always went out unguarded, Zarrate found no difficulty in reaching his victim. When the shots rang out Canalejas did not even utter a cry, but collapsed instantly to the pavement.

Zarrate shot Canalejas through the heart from the rear.

Dispatches from Lisbon this afternoon say that Zarrate was arrested and did not commit suicide. The announcement of the Madrid police that he ended his life is believed to have been intended to throw his accomplices off their guard.
