Medford's specialty will be pears, while Grants Pass will enter the ring as the champion of apples and grapes, thus forming a phase of "community of interests." Ashland hopes to win laurels as a general all-round exhibit, embracing dry farming products, field and garden seeds, also apples of the best quality from representative orchards which have already made an enviable record. Holds Up City With Bomb.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 19.—A mild-mannered, smiling man carrying a box walked into Chief of Police Sebastian's office today, and with only a word or two captured central police station, cleared out the city jail, cleared out the municipal hospital and caused the summoning of all the police reserves and every police sergeant and doctor on duty. For two hours he held absolute sway while detectives watched him and frantic efforts were made to obtain drugs, the fumes from which might overpower him without the laying on of hands.

"This box contains 86 per cent dynamite," said the man. "If any one touches me I will pull the trigger and away goes this whole section of the city."

The police station was closed in a moment. The jail was emptied. So was the city receiving hospital, just around the corner. And at noon they remained empty, while the man with

box sat in the Chief's office, calmly watching Sebastian and two detectives, who in turn watched him for and opportunity to overpower him.

The man allowed his attention to be distracted for a moment shortly after noon, and Detective Hosick instantly laid him out with a "billy." Detective Samuel D. Browne grasped the box and rushed out into the street.

The box really did contain dynamite, 75 sticks of it, fully equipped with cap and detonating arrangements for an explosion. It was low-grade stuff, but would have caused widespread destruction had it been exploded.

Austrian Council Bayoneted.

Vienna, Nov. 19.—Relations between Austria and Serbia are strained today to the breaking point as a result of the reported bayoneting of Austrian Consul Prochaska at Pristren by Serbian troops, who also are alleged to have turned their machine guns on the inhabitants of Pristren, killing 11 men, 35 women and children.

A telegram received here today from Puda Pest says that when Emperor Franz Josef was told of the incident he said:

"We are for peace, but not for peace at any price."

The Vienna Reichspost demanded today that Austria declare war on Serbia. The paper says:

"The unbridled insensibility of Belgrade regicides has created a spirit in Serbia which is intolerable."

The news of the alleged bayoneting of Consul Prochaska was received here from the correspondent of the Reichspost at the front. He is said to have received his information from Koldiriba, the fugitive Albanian leader.

Returns From Low Grade Ore.

One hundred and thirty dollars' worth of gold was exhibited in Grants Pass Saturday as the result of a forty-eight hour run of the mill on the property of the Jump-Off-Joe Mining company twelve miles from Grants Pass, says the Courier.

This company which took over the old Fino mine is most encouraged over the showing that is being made since the installation of the mill. A great amount of development work had been done on the property before the new company took possession of it, and the ore upon which it is now working is part of 3000 tons that was put into the discard by the previous operators. As the ore was taken from the tunnel the high grade was sacked and shipped, while that of lower values was put into the dump and is what is now being ground into wealth.

Towns Destroyed by Tidal Wave

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 20.—A great tidal wave was reported to have practically wiped out the town of Savanna la Mar, on the Southeast coast of Jamaica.

Forty-two were killed by the hurricane in Montego Bay, according to a report brought by the fruit vessel which arrived at Port Antonio today.

Confirmation has now come to hand of the great destruction caused by the recent hurricane in the western end of the island. Floods which accompanied the storm caused immense damage, 100 houses being blown down. Telegraphic communication still is suspended.

The Governor of Jamaica has left on a special train accompanied by a detachment of artillerymen, who have taken with them 300 tents and foodstuffs, as in certain sections the people are homeless and destitute.

The gale began on November 15 and continued in increasing fury for several days. Vessels arriving in port reported that the wind was blowing over 100 miles an hour.

Lucia is a town of 2000 inhabitants on an inlet on the Northwest Coast of Jamaica, while Savanna la Mar is a seaport without the same population on the Southwest Coast, almost directly across the island.

Would Not Hang Murderers.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 20.—Governor West this morning announced that Lieutenant Colonel Bert K. Lawson of the Oregon National Guard had been appointed to succeed Frank H. Curtis as superintendent of the Oregon state penitentiary. Superintendent Curtis has resigned. That the change was pending was not known outside the executive office and came as a surprise. The governor refuses to state what led to the change. Among the first duties of the new superintendent will be to officiate at the hanging of five murderers on Friday, December 13th.

Schrank, Who Shot T. R. Insane

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 19.—John Schrank, who attempted to murder Colonel Theodore Roosevelt here, is insane. He will be sent to an asylum for the criminal insane, probably for life.

Five alienists who were appointed by Municipal Judge Backus to inquire into Schrank's sanity today unanimously agreed that the would-be assassin is insane. The stenographic report of the physicians will be returned to Judge Backus tomorrow. It will state that Schrank is a paranoiac.

SUSPECT CONFESSES**Frank Brownlee, Arrested at Medford Confesses to Crime.**

Positively identified by four of the men he held up in a saloon at Hilt, Cal., last Saturday night, Frank Brownlee, alias "Goldie" Brown, alias S. G. Smith, arrested in this city Wednesday morning, last night confessed to the boldest hold-up in northern California in years, and divulged to Officers Pat Mego and Cady the hiding place of diamonds valued at \$1500, taken from the person of "Slim" Warren, proprietor of the jockey resort. Brownlee, according to local police, is one of the most desperate characters on the Pacific coast, with a long criminal record. The hold-up netted the robbers \$2500 in money and jewels.

Friendship for Officer Mego, who knew his past, led Brownlee to confess his share in the daring crime, but with the true instinct of the criminal he refused to give the name of his pal. After two hours of cross-examination the prisoner broke down and weepingly told the authorities his share in the plot. Sheriff Howard, with four victims of the robbers, arrived in Medford Wednesday evening and positively identified Brownlee, and this weakened the nerve of the man, who before stoutly maintained his innocence. The lavish expenditure of money in this city led the local authorities to suspicion Brownlee.—Sun.

Suicides at Roseburg.

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 20.—Whitcomb Field, aged 30, a Harvard law graduate, once in the office of Louis D. Brandeis, of Boston, committed suicide in his room in the Hotel McCallen here early this morning, shooting himself through the head with a revolver. A note left by him assigns no cause, but says to notify his brother, Henry C. Field, 617 Western avenue, Seattle. Field and John W. Parker last August bought a 2700-acre ranch, 12 miles east of this city, following Field's purchase of an orchard tract near Medford. Parker said that Field was subject to a nervous breakdown annually, forcing the abandonment of his law practice, and that he has been generally depressed for the past two months.

Few Clerks Have No Errors.

Salem, Or., Nov. 20.—With the exception of those from Multnomah and Malheur counties, the abstracts of the votes cast at the general election have been received by the secretary of state's office, and the checking of the returns is practically completed. Out of 30 abstracts, from as many different counties checked here, only seven were without errors. One of the abstracts had 20 errors, another 11, and others had from four to 10. These had to be sent back to the county clerk's for correction.

Want to Give P. O. Plums.

Washington, Nov. 18.—One cent postage, an extension of the parcel post, and rural free delivery service; the establishment of federal aid for post road and readjustments of railway pay, are some of the post office reforms to be instituted by the democratic administration, according to information obtained here today. Democratic sentiment in the house and

senate is against any further extension of the civil service in the post office department at present.

It was stated that President-Elect Woodrow Wilson will be urged to rescind the executive order promulgated by President Taft, putting fourth class postmasters in the classified list. Democrats, it is said, believe this policy is impractical.

Information gathered by house democratic investigating committees shows the postal service is burdened with unprofitable business which should be offset by business now carried by the express companies. Legislation to remedy this will be urged.

That the dissolution of the Standard Oil and tobacco trusts may become a reality without waiting for congressional action is the belief current here today. This because Louis Brandeis, acting for the independent oil and tobacco men, protested against the action of Attorney General Wickham in declining to appeal from the decree of the United States circuit court when it approved the reorganization plan of these trusts. Now Brandeis is talked of as the next attorney general.

Wilson's Lead in State 10,269.

Compilation of the complete official vote of the state, which became possible with the announcement of the figures for Multnomah county yesterday, shows that Woodrow Wilson defeated Theodore Roosevelt by 10,269 votes, and was 13,384 in advance of Taft.

The final figures give Wilson 47,997, Roosevelt 37,728 and Taft 34,613. These figures may differ slightly from the coming official announcement from the secretary of state's office, as those who sent in the returns may not in every case have used the same basis. In most cases the figures represented the vote for the highest elector out of five on each ticket, but in some cases an average vote or the vote for the first name on the ticket may have been taken.

For United States senator, Harry Lane has 1764 over Ben Selling and 14,238 over Senator Bourne. Selling's vote was 12,474 ahead of Bourne. The totals for the state give Lane 40,177, Selling 38,413, Bourne 35,939. A. E. Clarke, the Progressive party nominee received 11,071.

A charming wedding took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kitto, on Fifth St., Wednesday evening, when their brother, Joseph Kitto was united in marriage to Miss Alfaretta Fisher, both of this place.

The house was prettily decorated with white chrysanthemums and evergreen. The bride and groom were attended only by Miss Flossie Dunford as bridesmaid and Mr. Will McIntyre as best man.

The bride was prettily gowned in white chiffon over white silk with a border of pink roses. She wore a chiffon veil with a coronet of orange blossoms and carried a bridal bouquet of white carnations and ferns. The bridesmaid wore a dainty dress of tan mull over pink silk, and carried pink carnations and ferns. Mr. Kitto wore the conventional black.

During the ceremony, which was performed by Rev. Paul Bandy, the bride and groom stood under a large wedding bell, composed of evergreens and chrysanthemums, which hung suspended from the archway.

After the ceremony a bountiful turkey supper was served to the guests who numbered nearly fifty. Mr. and Mrs. Kitto were the recipients of many beautiful gifts.

Mr. and Mrs. Kitto will make their future home probably in this city.

Plan Guard for Wilson

Washington, Nov. 20.—When President-Elect Woodrow Wilson marches in the inaugural parade to take the oath of office next March he will be accompanied by a body guard of suffragettes, according to the assurance given today to the Suffrage association of the District of Columbia. This will be the first time in the history of the United States that women have acted in such a capacity.

It is expected that 10,000 suffragettes will be in line, many of them having cast their votes for Wilson in the equal suffrage states. A general call for volunteer marchers will be proposed in the National convention of the American Woman Suffrage association, which meets tomorrow in Philadelphia.

MARINES IN CONSTANTINOPLE**U. S. Embassy is Guarded by Men Lent by British.**

London, Nov. 18.—Two thousand machines and bluejackets from the warships of the powers were landed in Constantinople this afternoon. The Turkish government was willing that the powers should land their forces, but the marines were moved into the city quietly, as the authorities feared to arouse the anger of the masses.

Bulgarian diplomats deny reports from Constantinople that the Turks have been victorious in the defense of the Tehatalja forts, and the action of the powers in landing 2000 men is believed to indicate that the Turks are not holding their own in the defense of the city.

London, Nov. 18.—British marines are guarding the United States embassy in Constantinople, according to a dispatch received from the commander of the British warships assembled in the Bosphorus. Early dispatches say that the American guardship Scorpion had landed 80 American marines to protect the embassy were untrue. The Scorpion is one of the smallest guardships, and was able to furnish only six men. England it is stated, let Ambassador W. W. Rockhill have 116 men to protect his office.

London, Nov. 18.—The surrender of Monastir to the Serbian investing army is reported this afternoon from Belgrade. It is said in the dispatch received by the Serbian government that three Turkish generals and 45,000 Turkish soldiers were captured. Monastir is the principal city of Macedonia, and is connected with Salonika by railroad, the latter city being its seaport.

Josephine Half Wet and Half Dry

The Josephine county court has set aside the order of prohibition in Josephine county so far as it affected those precincts that voted wet at the recent election, and from now on the sale of liquor within them will be legal if it does not conflict with the various state and municipal laws.

Three wards within the city of Grants Pass came within the scope of the order, one of the wards, the 1st, having given a dry majority so that licenses can not be issued within it. Of the sixteen precincts outside the city, half gave wet and half dry majorities, the wet over the dry vote being 76. The precincts that must remain dry are Dineck, Fruitdale, Lucky Queen, Merlin, Selma, Pioneer, Wolf Creek and Granite Hill.

No applications have yet been made for licenses, though a number of parties are preparing to enter the business and numerous salaried men for liquor wholesalers have been here for several days talking their wares.
