## To Plant 300 Acres in Prunes.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 6.—What will be one of the largest orchards in Douglas county will be planted at Ten Mile this spring and fall by C. H. Campbell, his three sons, son-in-law and daughter. The orchard will occupy about 300 acres and will be planted exclusively to Italian prunes. A large dryer will be erected on the premises to handle the crop. If plans materialize the Ten Mile district will become one of the most important fruit growing sections of Douglas county.

## Roseburg to Have More Carriers.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 6.—Roseburg is likely to have a motor cycle mail carrier soon, and it is expected another carrier will be added to the present force, making four carriers in Roseburg. At present two carriers are employed, but they are overburdened with work and it is planned to extend the free delivery service to North Roseburg, West Roseburg, Hamilton and Waite additions. Postal Inspector More will recommend the employment of a carrier mounted on a motorcycle, as well as another regular city carrier to cover the outlying districts. An early morning delivery to business houses is also recommended to be included in the new service.

Mr. Koppes, until his removal to Jacksonville a year ago, and later to Medford, was a well-known Cleveland, O., newspaper man.

## Southern Oregon Pioneer Dead.

With the passing of James McVay, county clerk of Marion county, who died at the home of his daughter at Crescent City, Cal., one of the prominent figures in the early life of Oregon and California was woven about the life of James McVay. Probably no other pioneer saw so much of the thrilling days when the country was in the making. McVay first crossed the plains in 1851, locating at Jacksonville, where he spent a year mining on Jackson creek. When the Coos Bay company began the exploitation of the territory now known as Coos county, he, with a party of 100 others, journeyed there in 1852, crossing the mountains between Umpqua river and Coos Bay. On the arrival of the party, McVay and his brother Joseph, took part in the discovery of the coal mines now operated there. A company was formed but the work was abandoned, owing to the difficulty of placing the product in a market. After abandoning the coal mine venture, he turned his energies toward other lines of endeavor but the roving spirit and tales of wealth to be obtained in the south lured him.

In company with his brother, McVay in 1854, journeyed down the coast to mouth of Rogue river where they became the original owners of the famous sand mines that gave Gold Beach its name. Wealth was within their grasp when the Rogue river war broke out, and they escaped from the Indians only after they had seen their buildings and mining ditches destroyed. Continuing their travels on down the coast they discovered the famous Dolan mines at Pistol river, remaining there until 1858, when another Indian outbreak resulted in the destruction of their plant, and in the fight that ensued during their escape James McVay was wounded by a rifle bullet.

After recovery from his wound McVay returned to Missouri, where he was married, and then, acting as guide piloted a large party across the plains to the section now known as Curry county, where they located. In the early '70s McVay moved to the Smith river country, where he established a hotel and was thus engaged at the time of his death.

## Marion County Clerk Dro ind.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 2.—R. D. Allen, county clerk of Marion county was drowned in the swimming pool at the Salem Y. M. C. A. about 8 o'clock this morning. His term of office as county clerk was to have expired next Monday when he expected to retire to his farm near St. Paul.

For two years Mr. Allen had been in the habit of going to the Y. M. C. A. for shower baths every morning, having the privilege of a pass key because ordinarily there are no other persons about the institution at that early hour. This morning for the first time he violated a rule of the association that no person is to go into the pool alone. Mr. Allen was subject to heart attacks and it is believed that the shock of the cold water caused his death. His body was found in the bottom of the pool by Secretary Compton.
