JAMES H. TWOGOOD DEAD
Resident of Southern Oregon in Early Fifties.

James H. Twogood, well known to Southern Oregon pioneers, died at his home in Boise, Idaho, early this (Saturday) morning. Death was due to heart failure, and the end came very peacefully, the message bearing the sad news stating that he "just went to sleep."

Mr. Twogood was a Southern Oregon pioneer of the early 50's and was well acquainted with the early history of the country. He was one of a family of seven, the father of seven children and the grandfather of seven. He is the first of his family to die. One of his sisters, Mrs. Stoughton P. Jones, residing in this city. Mr. Twogood had the distinction of being the oldest member of the B. P. O. E. lodge in Idaho. Funeral services will be conducted under auspices of the Elks of that state.

S. P. TRAINS DELAYED

Snow in Mountains Hinders Traffic. Snow Shovelers Called on to Help.

The train service on the Southern Pacific was badly demoralized on Saturday by the snow and the rain. The trains from the north were all more or less late because of snow between the Rogue and Umpqua rivers, and by soft track caused by rains and snow. Two feet of snow was reported at tunnel nine, the other side of Grants Pass.

Traffic on the Shasta division was even more demoralized. The first trouble was the derailment of a caboose on the Siskiyou on Friday afternoon, which delayed No. 13 in Ashland until nearly 4 o'clock. That night the trains from the south were about ten hours late, 14 and 16 not going north until between 3 and 4 o'clock Saturday morning. The limited followed close behind them, before the track had a chance to fill again, and was only about four hours late. The southbound limited, Saturday morning, was also about seven hours late.

On Saturday afternoon conditions were even worse. All southbound trains were delayed, 13, due here at 11:35 a. m., not arriving until late in the afternoon, and No. 15 being about three hours late. Both trains 14 and 16, from the south, were annulled because of a big land slide the other side of Dansmuir.—Ashland Tidings.

OREGON METAL PRODUCTION

Jackson County Third in Amount of Gold Mined.

For several years there has been a decline in the metallic output of the state of Oregon, more especially in its gold and silver, but preliminary returns for 1912 show that this has now been checked, according to Charles G. Yale of the United States Geological Survey. The mine report of the Survey for 1911 showed an output of gold valued at \$633,407 and 45,221 ounces of silver. The preliminary returns for 1912 indicate that the Oregon yield was about \$657,000 in gold and 86,951 ounces of silver, a marked advance in the silver output. Moreover, the smelters received about 100,000 pounds of copper, compared with 93,196 pounds in 1911, and 38,000 pounds of lead, whereas there was no yield of lead in 1911. More placers are being worked than formerly in Oregon, mainly by hydraulic methods. The grade of ore in the deep mines has been much lower than formerly, although more of it is treated. The lowering of the average tonnage value is due to the large quantities of old tailings handled, their average yield being taken with that of the new ore in making up the totals and average values.

The largest producer of gold in Oregon is Baker county, as has been the case for some years. Following in order of rank are Josephine, Jackson, Grant, Lane and Malheur counties. Eleven counties of the state are now producing gold, Josephine leading in the production of placer gold, and Baker in that from deep mines. In silver yield Baker county holds first rank. Most of the ore in Oregon is milled, very little of it being shipped to smelters for reduction. Neither the southwestern nor the northeastern

counties of Oregon are producing as a few years ago—although the estimated figures for 1912 show that some little advancement is in progress. The state badly needs the advent of capital to open and develop its deep-mining properties, many of which are lying idle for want of means to place them on a productive standing.—Ashland Tidings.
