

AN INTERRUPTION

Oregon Sidelights.

A flock of robins, the first of the season, appeared at Baker Tuesday.

Klamath Falls Northwestern: R. Brown, the Worden sawmill man, has signed a contract with the Klamath Falls Tub and Pail factory for 2,000,000 feet of lumber during the current year.

Marshfield Record: Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Rogers have sailed for San Francisco and are going for a long trip throughout the southwest. Mr. and Mrs. Rogers have spent many busy years on their Coos river ranch, and now, when they are past 80 years of age, they feel their activities can be laid aside, and the remaining years be enjoyed in ease.—Journal.

Hunters See 8 Companions Die.

Cape Town, South Africa, Jan. 27.—Exciting experiences with taft beasts and cannibals befell Robert Taft, the Los Angeles explorer and hunter, and Gordon Campbell of Glasgow, during their hunting expedition in Central Africa, according to advice just received here. The young American and his companion, a Scotchman, started a year ago to cross the continent of Africa from the east via Victoria Nyanza and the Congo. At Stanley Falls the raft on which the two men and their porters were traveling was capsized by a hippopotamus. The explorers succeeded in saving themselves, although two of the party were eaten by crocodiles and three others were drowned.

A short time later the hunters were attacked at night by a party of cannibals and another of their party was killed. Still another of the porters went mad with jungle fever and had to be shot to save the lives of the few remaining members of the party. The last negro accompanying the men was seized by a gorilla soon after this and was carried off into the jungle. He was never found, despite the efforts of the two men. Left alone, Taft and Campbell were in a serious predicament owing to the hostile attitude of the natives and were finally rescued in dangerous surroundings by Belgian rubber hunters.

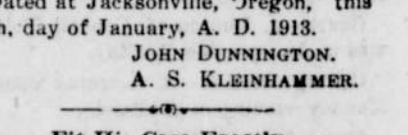
