### Mayor Argues With Fists.

Interest in the bond election at Eagle Point reached the fighting stage Tuesday when Mayor William Von der Mellon of that place mixed it for several rounds with Charles Haward, a P. E. brakeman. Haward held forth against the advisability of bonding Eagle Point for \$10,000 to improve the streets and the mayor took exceptions, using right and left swings to emphasize his objections. Spectators separated the men before the issue was thoroughly fought out.

### Wilson Now Plain Citizen.

Trenton, N. J., Feb. 25.—President-Elect Woodrow Wilson today sent his resignation as governor of New Jersey to the secretary of state. It becomes effective March 1.

"I will be a private citizen for three days," said Wilson this afternoon. "I feel like I would like to turn a hand to celebrate the fact that I haven't the dignity of any office to maintain."

## MORE COLD WEATHER

### Middle West Suffers From Big Blizzard.

Chicago, Feb. 22.—Heavy snowfall and temperatures far below zero are predicted for tonight as a development of a great blizzard which is raging today all over the middle west. The storm, which has almost isolated Chicago telegraphically is centered in Southwestern Wisconsin.

In this city a heavy sleet storm has weighted the wires and is making the operation of street cars difficult. The weather is most disagreeable. Weather bureau predictions, however, are that tomorrow will be fair.

Milwaukee, Wis., Feb. 22.—Celebration of George Washington's birthday throughout the state was marred today by the worst storm Wisconsin has suffered in years. Zero weather obtains in most localities and suffering among the poor is intense.

All railroad schedules are demoralized, no attempt being made to move freight. All cities in Western Wisconsin are snowbound and wire communication is badly crippled.

LaCrosse, Wis., Feb. 22.—Railroad and street traffic here is almost completely blocked through a terrific blizzard which swept this part of the state last night. There is a foot of snow on the ground and all telegraph and telephone wires are crippled.

### Co. Hires Irrigation Engineer.

E. E. Ryder, formerly of Fresno, has been employed by the Rogue River Canal company as chief engineer. Mr. Ryder was formerly employed in the United States government services in large projects in Washington state, that of the Sunnyside unit in Yakima and the Kettle Indian reservation project. He was also employed in the Oregon district in the large water projects there. He was recently employed at Fresno, Cal., in the late projects there.

Mr. Cummings states that Mr. Ryder is perfectly capable of taking charge of the large water project that will soon be under way here.—Tribune.

### Oregon Sidelights.

The city council of The Dalles has taken first steps in the 1913 program of paving and sewer construction.

Astoria Refectory: The Astoria Education and Civic Development league has requested the city council to set aside the property at the corner of Ninth and Duane streets for use as a

public play ground.

Burns Times-Herald: The prospects are now good for waterworks and a sewer system in Burns. C. H. Green, a consulting engineer of Spokane, has arranged with the city authorities to immediately begin preliminary surveys.

The new city hall at Coquille will be ready to turn over to the city March 1. The building, providing room for council chamber and municipal offices, contains space for a public library, the fire apparatus and lockup. Complete it will cost \$12,000.

Klamath Herald: Charles W. Sherman Jr. of Dairy, who recently ordered a large traction engine and 10 share gang plow, is making contracts with many farmers for plowing this spring. With the outfit he can plow up to 50 or 60 acres a day.

Toledo Sentinel: The little old house that served a good many years ago as a church and later, up to last year, as a school house, has been sold to I. W. Gill and will be torn down and removed. A good many of Toledo's citizens got their education in this building.

Grants Pass Courier: Captain S. A. Harris has arrived from Wenatchee, Wash., to take charge of the Salvation Army work. He will be assisted by Lieutenant Genoweth, from the training school at Chicago. Captain Forrest, in charge here for some time past, will probably go to Seattle.—Journal.

### Fight's Bill Ceeding Park.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 25.—For some unknown reason the Klamath delegation has killed the bill introduced at the request of the secretary of the Interior, surrendering jurisdiction in the Crater Lake national park to the United States government. Word received from the secretary of the Interior is to the effect that the department will withhold all recommendations for improvements until such authority is secured.

After meeting defeat in the senate yesterday the bill was resurrected again in the senate this morning, and it was again defeated, owing to opposition of Klamath.

The bill has been in the Ways and Means committee for over ten days. Reames got it out and passed it through the house, but defeat in the senate looks sure. Another effort will be made this afternoon to pass the measure.

### Protest Game Laws.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Feb. 25.—Klamath county people are dissatisfied with the game laws being enacted at Salem. The law regulating the deer season provides that the season in Jackson county shall open on August 1 and a month later in Klamath county. It is believed here that this law is an attempt to get the sportsmen who come to Southern Oregon to hunt deer to go to Jackson county instead of coming across the mountains. If the bill providing for the difference in the time of opening the seasons in the two counties becomes a law it will be a decided discrimination against Klamath county.

The closing of winter fishing in Link river also meets with the disapproval of the local people. Those who are familiar with the stream and the Klamath lakes know that the trout taken from Link river during the warm weather are not good, as they taste of decomposed tules.

### Found Dead in Room.

In a room in a local hotel, huddled in a corner, the lifeless body of T. B. Ingham, whose family connections and former home, are unknown, was found by a maid Sunday morning when she entered the room to make it up. The police were notified and an investigation made, the result of which established conclusively that Ingham had died of natural causes, probably heart failure. The body was removed to the morgue where it is held pending an attempt to learn something of Ingham's past.

On the body was found an Ingersoll watch. Not a single letter or a cent of money could be found. He had died for his room in retaining it.

Ingham was but slightly known here. It is believed that he was a chimney sweep, and it is known that he traveled up and down the line occasionally. He arrived in Medford this time Thursday or Friday.—Tribune
