#### White Slave Law Valid.

Washington, Feb. 24.—The supreme court today upheld the validity of the federal white slave traffic act of 1910. It had been contended this question morally was reserved for action by the states. Justice McKenna delivered the court's opinion.

"Our dual form of government has its perplexities," said he. "The state and nation having different spheres of jurisdiction, but it must be kept in mind that we are one people and that the powers reserved to the states and those conferred on the nation are adopted to be exercised whether independently or concurrently to promote the general welfare, materially and morally.

"This is the effect of the decisions and surely if the facility of the interstate transportation can be taken away from lotteries, obscene literature, contagion of diseased cattle or poisons, the impurity of food and drugs, the like facility can be taken away from the systematic debauchery of women and more insistently of girls."
