

# Faded Ink

Every one in the little fishing village of W. knew Jane Baxter and her history. When she was a girl of eighteen a young man named Corwith came from the city for the purpose of enjoying what was to the men of the town work, but to him sport. Jane Baxter was a pretty girl with a rosy cheek and a laughing eye. Corwith found less pleasure in fishing than in her company.

She did so and found all those parts that should have been filled in with ink were wanting.

She was not only astonished, but appalled. She had been handed the certificate after the ceremony by the clergyman who had married her, had glanced at it and seen that it had been filled in. ## Belgium's Peaceful Strike.

Belgium in proportion to population, is the most industrial of nations. It is one huge factory. It has a small middle class, and the remainder of its swarming people are industrious wage-working proletarians. Its institutions, for the most part, are democratic, and the country has traveled far along the road of state Socialism.

But a few political privileges have remained with the governing classes. Besides the king and a somewhat make believe aristocracy (tolerated if not popular) there is plural voting. Every male citizen over 25 years of age, married or widower, who has legitimate issue and pays as much as five francs a year house tax, has an extra vote. An extra vote also goes to landowners and to those who have and income of at least 100 francs a year from invested funds. Two extra votes are given to male citizens who have received a diploma of higher education, or a certificate of higher secondary instruction or who have filled offices or who are members of a learned profession. No person has more than three votes, and failure to vote is a punishable misdemeanor.

The Socialist party (with greater accuracy it could be called the Democratic or Progressive party) has long objected to the way the electoral dice have been loaded against it. Their program has demanded one man, one vote. But the landed, the learned, and wealthy have combined against them. It has been impossible for the majority of the Belgian people to secure political control over the popular branch of the legislature.

In olden days, when intolerable political abuses existed and the rulers denied relief, it was customary to rebel and fight for the reform. Philosophers arose who were able to justify what was called the right of revolution. But the reformers of Belgium think there is a better way to secure redress of grievances than to appeal to force. They have called a peaceable strike. They ask their fellow workers to stand idle for a few days in the hope that the ministry will be led to reconsider its decision to prevent the abolition of plural voting. It is believed that without the effusion of a single drop of blood, or the raising of even a hand in menace, the asked for change can be secured.

In Belgium was first raised the banner whose inscription implied that the people had a right to rule and that public officers were servants and not masters. This was in Bruges, when a stout-hearted burgher rallied his fellow burghers. It was in Belgium that the burghers for the first time dared oppose the feudal knights and whipped them. It is thus appropriate that Belgium should be the first to try the experiment of using the machinery and the methods of trades unionism to effect political action. Here is a policy antipodal to the so-called syndicalism, with its advice to the worker to abstain from political action.—EX.

Banker Schmitt of Albany has established a prize of \$25 to be awarded annually to that pupil in the Albany schools who makes the best showing in a "general information" test prescribed by the donor.

Cottage Grove Sentinel: The largest shipment of poles ever to leave this station will be made when the Burkholder Woods company makes shipment of an order received this week from California. The order is for 40 double loads, 80 cars being required in handling the shipment. The poles are to be 130 to 140 feet in length, thus taking two cars for each load.—Journal.
