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There has been some talk of establishing a canning factory in this city but the matter has not been definitely settled as yet. There is no question about such an establishment being a benefit to a community if properly conducted, specially in a region like this where fruit-growing is the principal industry. But too much should not be expected: the managers of a fruit cannery could not pay the fancy retail prices obtained in the eastern markets, but if the grower would be satisfied with a fair price for fruit in bulk he would likely find at the cannery a market for his whole crop at prices which would still return a living profit.

Speaking of a cannery reminds us of a suggestion made the other day by a gentleman of this place, that it might be a profitable proposition to manufacture grape juice and put it on the market for sale. The suggestion appeals to us as a good one; most of the grape juice sold on this coast and there is lots of it used, is made in the state of New York, where grapes do not yield more than 50 per cent of the average yield in the vineyards adjacent to this city; then the juice is extracted, bottled and shipped across the continent and sold here at a price sufficient to pay freight charges and still leave a handsome profit to the grower and the manufacturer. By the way; one of our merchants informs us that the price of Welch's grape juice (the leading brand) has advanced very materially of late. Better look it up. It may mean much in the future of this region.

Japs Will File Formal Protest.

Washington, May 6.—The Japanese embassy was supplied today by the state department with a copy of the alien and owning bill passed by the California legislature and the ambassador will employ his time between now and Secretary Bryan's return preparing a formal protest against it.

Apparent by the embassy has no hope that any word of President Wilson may end after Bryan's return will influence Governor Johnson to withhold his signature from the act, so the only object of protest will be to acquaint the American people with the Japanese contentions, and if it is possible to influence the legislative branch of the government to endeavor to nullify the action of the California legislature.

It is well known that whatever the outcome, the resort to judicial proceedings will first be had, and it will be for Secretary Bryan to determine whether the government shall become a party to a suit of this character.

International lawyers hint that the administration is in an exceedingly delicate position for the reason that while apparently championing the Japanese cause before the California legislature, probably from this point on, it must defend the California law against Japan in the diplomatic struggle about to begin.

Montenegro King Abdicates rule

London, May 5.—King Nicholas of Montenegro having placed the future of Scutari in the hands of European powers, the settlement of the Albanian trouble now depends on whether Essad Pasha and Djavid Pasha will obey the orders sent by the sublime porte to withdraw the armies to the Turkish empire.

It is believed as Montenegro has abandoned Scutari, Essad will recognize the utility of his aspirations to the kingship of Albania, in the face of the Austrian-Italian threat to expel him. Another meeting of ambassadors will be held Thursday when the arrangements with regard to the future of Scutari and Albania will be discussed.

Frankfort-On-The-Main, May 5.—

King Nicholas will abdicate the throne of Montenegro in the near future, according to a telegram received today by the Frankfurter Zeitung from Constantinople.

Cologne, May 5.—It seems certain, the Gazette declares editorially this afternoon, that Austria and Italy will send troops into Albania, irrespective of the outcome of the conference of European ambassadors in London.

The Geologists' Clock.

Each fossiliferous rock bed contains characteristic forms or groups of forms that determine the period in which it was laid or sand. Former Director Powell of the United States geological survey once tersely explained to a congressional committee the value of paleontology by saying that it is "the geologist's clock," by which he tells the time when rock beds were formed. The economic importance of paleontology has been repeatedly shown in this country. In the earliest exploitation of anthracite coal thousands of dollars were fruitlessly expended in New York in search of coal beds until the New York geologists showed that the beds in that state could contain no coal. The fossils in the rocks exploited are Devonian, whereas the fossils of the Pennsylvania anthracite coal beds belong to the carboniferous, a much later period. This discovery at once stopped a useless expenditure of money.—Argonaut.

A Fatal Sleep.

Hugh Miller, the Scottish geologist and writer, was one of the most illustrious of sleepwalkers. Miller, who had been addicted to somnambulism in his youth, found his restless return while he was engaged upon his "Testimony of the Rocks." He used to wake in the morning feeling, as he said, as if he had been abroad in the night wind, dragged by some invisible power and ridden by witches. On the night of his death he slept alone. In the morning they found him stretched dead on the floor with a bullet through his breast. He had written a note to his wife: "My brain hurts. I must have walked, and a fearful dream rises upon me. I cannot bear the horrible thought. My brain hurts as the recollection grows." So intense had been the poor fellow's anguish that to make certain his end he had torn back shirt and vest and placed the muzzle of the pistol to his naked flesh.—St. James' Gazette.
