**Former Jacksonville Man Now an Aviator.**

V. C. Gorst returned to North Bend last evening on the steamer A. M. Simpson and brought with him his flying machine which has been thoroughly tried out near Los Angeles. The machine will not be operated for two or three weeks yet, as there is some repairing to be done on one of the pontoons and Ed Steele the aviator remained at Los Angeles to complete his lessons. **Bowlby Highway Engineer**

Salem, Ore., May 22.—The state highway commission, comprised of the members of the state highway board, yesterday appointed Henry L. Bowlby of Portland as state highway engineer, under the new highway law passed by the last legislature.  
 Mr. Bowlby's appointment was made largely on the recommendation of Samuel Hill, the good roads enthusiast, with whom Bowlby has been associated in highway construction for a number of years. Mr. Bowlby is now engineer for the Pacific Highway association, which position pays him the same salary that he will receive from the state, namely \$3000 a year. He was formerly state highway engineer of Washington. There were about 50 applicants for the position, but Mr. Bowlby was not one of them. He never made application and his consent to accept the position was secured by Mr. Hill.

**Oldest Odd Fellow.**

One of the most interesting delegates who attended the I. O. O. F. convention just closed here was John Bloomfield of Oakland, Ore. Mr. Bloomfield has been a member of the order for 67 years and although 88 years of age takes an active part in all Odd Fellow work. Mr. Bloomfield's home is at Oakland, Oregon, and he was an acquaintance of Joaquin Miller when the "poet of the Sierras" lived at Jacksonville. Mr. Bloomfield is the oldest Odd Fellow in the jurisdiction of the state.
