PORTLAND LETTER

Definite Plans Made to Aid Settlers From Northern Europe.

Portland, Ore., June 5 (Special)—A splendid foundation has been laid by the State Immigration Commission in the work of attracting farmers to Oregon from the countries of Northern Europe. A series of conferences with Germans, Norwegians, Swedish and Danish people has resulted in outlining the work to be accomplished and in securing the complete co-operation of substantial people of these various nationalities now resident here. Committees formed of members of the different races will work with the Immigration Commission in seeking out suitable lands for colonization purposes, securing them at reasonable prices and aiding the new comers after they are settled. Judging from the success that has attended the preliminary work, much may be expected from this organized effort to settle Oregon's idle farming lands.

More interest is being shown in eugenics, the science of growing perfect babies, throughout the state since the first eugenics show was held last year at the State Fair. The first test of babies has just been held by the Parents' Educational Bureau, of Portland, and this promises to become a regular institution. Babies are given a careful scientific examination and defects pointed out to parents with instructions as to how they may be overcome. Parents who intend entering youngsters in the coming shows next Fall find these preliminary tests helpful.

That the Willamette Valley is the one section of the United States that can raise sheep equal to those of England, was the statement made by Prof. Thos. Shaw, agricultural expert for the Great Northern Railway, in a recent talk at Salem. He also said that here in this state conditions are such that pork can be produced for less cost than is the case in the corn belt of the Middle West, while butter can be produced for 50 per cent less than in New England. Prof. Shaw insists that the Oregon farmer is, as a rule, neglecting his opportunities.

Bend sent its boosters down to Portland last week and took the Ad Club of the metropolis by storm, winning a great deal of publicity. Louis W. Hill and party of railroad men have been inspecting the Central Oregon country the past week. It is a period of general expansion, railroad building and development over there.

Salem has set its dates for the annual Cherry Fair for July 4 and 5, and it will include a patriotic celebration. Steps have been taken to make this year's event the most elaborate affair of its kind ever held.

Good roads workers of two states, will meet at Medford June 6, when the proposed new road between California and Oregon will be discussed. This route, lately surveyed, is designed to avoid bad grades in the present road. A campaign will be started by Jackson County for the issuance of bonds for road purposes.

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 23.—Phadlus Wentworth, of Portland is the biggest student on the campus of the state University. He is also remarkable in another way, for he will graduate next month, if he keeps up the pace he has held for nearly four years, without a single demerit against him for absence from any class.

Just once during his course did he fail to be in his classroom before the bell rang, or his attendance record would be perfect. Wentworth is a senior in the Department of Economics. He weighs 335 pounds and is large in proportion. He has always taken a prominent part in college activities.

BALLYBUNION'S MONORAIL.

One of the Quaintest Railroads in the World is in Ireland.

Where the broad mouth of the river Shannon mingles its waters with the deeper hue of the ocean, where the stern coast thrusts its eager promontories toward America, the land of dreams, stands Ballybunion, picturesque town of 300 Irish men and women. About a mile and a half farther north stands Belmore, and between these two small towns extends one of the world's quaintest railroads—the Ballybunion monorail.

On its single track, raised on a trestle, and in its curious cars passengers and freight are carried from Ballybunion and Belmore and back again in the remarkable time of five minutes. The monorail on which its strange locomotive and trains run is perhaps two feet high, while the distance between the lower rails, which serve to maintain the equilibrium of the rolling stock, is a little more than a foot.

Most remarkable of its equipment is the locomotive, with its queer elliptical boiler and firebox. It has one cylinder on each side, the rods of which are inside connected to the drivers. The interior of a passenger car is divided into two longitudinal compartments, which are entered by separate doors. The guard stands on either side, according to the balancing needs of the moment. Freight and stock cars are similarly divided.

To enable pedestrians and wagons to cross the tracks of the Ballybunion railroad small lift bridges are constructed at the various roads and remain in a lowered position for the accommodation of traffic. When it is necessary for a train to pass such a point the crossing flagman raises the bridge as is shown in the illustration, thus permitting the train to proceed.

The Ballybunion hauls considerable freight for so short a road. The surrounding country has many famous caves, which yield quite a large quantity of stone and some mineral wealth.—Railroad Man's Magazine.

Rhinoceros Horns.
