FOR STATE PRINTER

Governor West Appoints Expert to Succeed the Late W. S. Duniway.

Salem, Or., Aug. 7.—Governor West today appointed as State Printer R. A. Harris, State Printer Expert until the State Printer flat salary law abolished his office by the death of State Printer Duniway.

Governor West made the appointment from his summer home at Cannon Beach, where he is on his vacation.

Harris was appointed State Printing Expert by Governor West shortly after the Governor assumed office, in return for services rendered during the gubernatorial campaign. Scarce had he entered upon the duties of his office when he began a campaign in the Legislature for the State Printer flat salary law, and it is to this law that he owes his appointment, for it was passed. This was in the Legislature of 1911, and over the bill the Legislature became involved in a fight which resulted in its defeat in the House. Governor West urged its passage, however, and it was resurrected, and after a clause was inserted that it should not go into effect until January 1, 1915, the expiration of Duniway's term, was passed.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION

President sends John Lind of Minnesota as Personal Envoy. Has Power to act for U. S.

Washington, Aug. 5.—Following the selection of former Governor John Lind of Minnesota to be President Wilson's personal representative in Mexico City, the administration here is confident that peace soon will come in Mexico, it being believed that Lind is the best available man to reconcile the warring factions there.

Lind will endeavor to get influential Mexicans to force Huerta to restore order. He also will investigate the question as to whether raising the embargo on importation of American arms and ammunition would help the situation.

It is rumored that the president and John Bassett Moore, counselor of the state department, disagree on a solution of the Mexican problem, Moore, it is said, sides with Ambassador Wilson and favors recognizing Huerta as president and that he should be held responsible for conditions in Mexico. This plan was opposed by the president. Lind was named without consulting Moore. The state department counselor today refused to discuss the matter.

Envoy Lind today is enroute to Mexico. His instructions are elastic and he carries what practically are plenary powers to act for the president and the United States.

Before he started on his trip Lind and the President, with Secretary Bryan, held a lengthy conference in which every possible contingency was considered. Lind's first task will be to communicate with influential Mexicans who have indirectly advised President Wilson that they are working for a reconciliation of the Mexican factions.

To these men Lind will make it clear that recognition of Huerta by the United States is impossible. This is the first step of the administration's policy. The following steps will not be made public until Lind reports. The president expresses the greatest hopefulness that Lind's mission will succeed.

CURRENCY LAWS ASSURED

Only Two Democratic Senators Oppose Promptness Wilson Stands Firm on Original Measure.

Washington, Aug. 6.—President Wilson talked currency to a number of his callers today, and made it plain that he intended to stick to his determination to have a bill passed at the extra session.

Senator James told the President today that the Democrats would put the bill through. Senator Hughes took a similar view. Senator Owen, chairman of the banking committee pointed out that in his poll of the Senate, only Senators Hitchcock and O'Gorman were flatly opposed to legislation at this time. All the other Democrats, he said, but five, were earnestly in favor of the legislation, and they, though preferring to defer the task to the next session would abide by the wishes of the President and the majority.

The President expressed his satisfaction over the action of the House Banking Committee in voting to report the Administration bill, when he talked with Representatives Wilson of Florida, Patten of New York and Seidomridge of Colorado.

Copies of the revised draft of the Glass Currency Bill, containing amendments adopted late yesterday by Democrats of the House Currency Committee, were in circulation about the Capitol today, and were the subject of careful scrutiny by friends and opponents of the President's currency reform plan.

An amendment adopted by the House Committee Democrats making the Federal Reserve Board to a partial extent bi-partisan by having the appointive members divided between political parties, is expected to allay somewhat the opposition based on fear of political control of the proposed new currency system.
