Both these gentlemen have made good in their respective offices and in accordance with the usages of the party are entitled to another term and if nominated are practically sure of election.

For county recorder Chauncey Florey, republican and Lee Jacobs, democrat, have filed declarations. Both are young men of ability, with a wide circle of friends and acquaintances through the county and if nominated by their respective parties will no doubt make an interesting race at the polls.

The contest for nominations is young yet and from indications plenty of material will be offered from which the dear people may select their candidates.

S. P. INSPECTION

Agent **Rosebaum** One of Those Winning Medals.

Agent at thirty-six stations on the Pacific system of the Southern Pacific company have been awarded silver medals for having premium stations, according to the decision of officials of railroad on the results of the recent annual inspection trip for the year, 1913. The honor for the best division was won by the Coast division, of which T. Ahern is superintendent, M. Lahay, roadmaster of the Salinas district, of the coast division, won the gold medal for the best roadmaster's district and H. Sheridan foreman of Section 16 of Salinas district, won the gold medal for the best section.

The agents who won the medals for best-kept stations are those at Berkeley, University avenue; Camarillo, Covina, Covina, Dundee, Durham, Guadalupe, Iron Point, Kennet, Kenwood, Klamath Falls, Los Altos, Lowell, Medford, Midlake, Millbrae, Monrovia, Oakland, Sixteenth street and Oakland, First and Broadway; Oceana, Paso Robles, Promontory Point, Roseburg, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Santa Margarita, San Luis Obispo, Shasta Springs, South San Francisco, Tulare, Yolla, Watsonville Junction, West Weber, Wheatland, Woodland and Yuba City.

The inspection was begun in October and was concluded in December, the officials having gone over and noted conditions on more than 6,000 miles of track, 792 sections and 670 stations. The medals are awarded annually and the men take a keen interest in the competitive for official recognition of their work by the Southern Pacific in this form of prize.

SEARCH FOR DIAMONDS

Discovered in Arkansas in 1906.

Diamonds were first discovered in Arkansas August 1, 1905, near the mouth of Prairie Creek, in the vicinity of Murfreesboro, Pike County, and since that time approximately 1,375 stones, aggregating 550 carats, are reported to have been found in this locality. The diamonds in Arkansas occur

in a rock known as peridotite, and for this reason search for further areas of the rock has been made. This search has resulted in the finding of three new areas, the known extent of which is much smaller than that near Murfreesboro. They lie within an area of 1 square mile, about 3 miles from Murfreesboro. These localities were visited by Hugh D. Miser, of the United States Geological Survey, and are described by him in Bulletin 549-U, an advance chapter from "Contributions to Economic Geology, 1912."

At the time of Mr. Miser's visit the Kimberlite Diamond Mining & Washing Co. was erecting at Kimberley a plant to wash the diamond-bearing earth to be hauled on a tramway from its peridotite area and from another tract near the mouth of Prairie Creek. Four diamonds of good quality are said to have been picked up on the surface, the largest weighing 4 carats. Further development work to ascertain the extent of the peridotite is now under way.

On another tract, where a little washing for diamonds has been done in a crude way without machinery, 20 diamonds have been secured.

Resolution No. 70.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL of the City of Jacksonville: That the City Council of the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, State of Oregon, acting under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 111 of the City Charter of said City hereby calls and orders a General Election to be held within the City of Jacksonville, Jackson County, State of Oregon, on the First Tuesday in March, A. D. 1914, namely, on Tuesday, March 3rd, 1914, between the hours of 12 M. and 7 P. M. o'clock of said day for the purpose of electing the municipal officers specified herein to-wit:

ONE MAYOR to hold office for a period of two years;

TWO COUNCILMEN to hold office for a period of two years;

ONE CITY RECORDER to hold office for a period of one year;

ONE CITY TREASURER to hold office for a period of one year.

The City Hall is hereby provided, designated and appointed as the polling place for said election.

J. Hartman, Charles Hays and Wm. C. Duffell, citizens of said City over the age of twenty-one years and electors therein are hereby designated and appointed as the judges of the aforesaid election, the first named Judge to act and serve as Chairman of said Election Board; and Joseph Wetterer and Roy Ulrich citizens of said City over the age of twenty-one years and electors therein are hereby designated and appointed as the clerks of said election, the first named to serve as First Clerk.

And the City Recorder is hereby directed and ordered to give notice of the aforesaid election by the publication of this Resolution in the Jacksonville Post, a newspaper published in said City, not less than ten days prior to said Election, to-wit: in a regular issue of said newspaper of Saturday, February 14th, 1914, and by posting a copy of said Resolution in three public places within the corporate limits of the said City for a like period.

The foregoing Resolution No. 70 was duly and regularly introduced, read and proposed for passage and adopted at the regular meeting of the City Council of said City held and convened on Tuesday, the 3rd day of February, 1914, by the following vote:
