OFFICIAL CANVAS FINISHED

Totals Show Increased Majorities For Singler and Madden.

The official canvas of the ballots cast at the recent primaries in this county, shows a total of 3665 votes of which 2345 were republicans, 1230 democrats and 90 progressives. Only about 40 per cent of the registered voters exercised their rights of suffrage.

St. Petersburg and the Neva.

When the river Neva rises St. Petersburg is always in danger of inundation. The city was built upon a swamp, and the land has been laboriously reclaimed and is liable to overflow by the Neva. That river divides and forms a delta, and this delta is embraced within the city limits. Although the main portion of St. Petersburg is situated on the mainland (a peninsula washed on the east by the Neva and on the northwest by the Great Neva), parts of the city stand on islands formed by the arms of the river. The islands, with their gardens and villas, are a pretty feature of the capital. The various parts of the city are connected by over 100 bridges, the longest being the Troitsky bridge, about a third of a mile in length.—Westminster Gazette.

Russia's Famous Choir.

The members of the choir of the cathedral of Alexander Nevski in St. Petersburg are all monks. They are thirty in number and are chosen from the best singers in all the Russian monasteries. When the possessor of a fine voice appears among the novitiates he is sent to the monastery of Alexander Nevski, which adjoins the cathedral, where he is trained as carefully as an opera singer and remains there, doing little beyond assisting at the music at mass in the morning and vespers in the afternoon, until he becomes aged, when he retires on a pension. Many of the voices are of marvelous power and sweetness. The monks are all vegetarians. The rules of the orthodox church forbid them to shave and their hair is worn like a woman's.

Made the Match.

During his first stay in Washington as Chinese minister, Wu Ting Fang attended the wedding of the daughter of the chief justice of the supreme court and said to one of the bridesmaids:

"When will it be your turn to become a bride?"

"I do not know," she answered. "I have not yet been asked."

So the amiable Chinese minister said to one of a group of young men standing near by: "This is a beautiful lady. Would you not like to marry her?"

He replied, "I shall be most delighted to."

Both the young woman and the young man naturally were somewhat embarrassed by Mr. Wu's plesantry... but three months later they were married.—New York Times.

Street Traffic of London.

The control of London traffic by the police has been a matter of slow evolution. A century ago, when George IV. died with the lord mayor soon after his succession, it took his escort five hours to force a way through the crowd which filled the streets from his palace to the Guildhall. And it was not until about thirty years ago that the existing system of regulating traffic at crossings was instituted. At the beginning it required four policemen at every important junction to do with difficulty what two constables and sometimes one now effect by a motion of the hand. But the men in blue stuck to their task and hung on to horses' heads and summoned rebellious drivers till the reign of law and order was established.

Argentina Humor.

On the prairies of Argentina, where the chief mode of travel is by horseback, the ranchers often make use of the Spanish expression, "comprar tierra." The literal translation of that phrase is "to buy ground." The South American rough riders think that when you fall off your horse you occupy the ground where you land almost as if you owned it, and if you make much of a hole in the earth where you strike, as you are very likely to do when you are riding a fiery Argentine mount, they say that you have bought the ground and begun to dig the cellar for a house.—Youth's Companion

Fatalities Among Alpinists.

In view of the fact that every man or woman who walks up a mountain with alpenstock in hand is a climber in the eyes of the public, it is not at all strange that the appalling annual fatalities in the Swiss Alps are laid at the door of one of the noblest of sports. The truth is that these fatalities—there were 105 last year—are relatively few and far between in the ranks of genuine alpinists, the amateur and professional mountaineers. They who climb with ice ax instead of alpenstock are cautious—first, last and always. Considering the risk taken, few of them lose their lives. Most who meet this frightful death in the Swiss mountains have always been either unthinking or downright reckless tempters of fate. With a complete disregard of common sense, these unfortunates go where they have no business to go save in charge of an experienced guide, and sometimes the mere reaching out for a coveted wild flower sends them to their doom.—Spur.

Theater Audiences.

The tricks of theater audiences have been remarkably similar in all ages. Alciphron, who wrote of the later Attic comedy, shows that the clique was known then and also "young men of the town" who took a malicious delight in hissing a play off the stage. Theophrastus, who died in 288 B. C., sketches among his "Characters" the man of superior taste, whose pride it was to hiss when everybody else applauded and to clap when the rest were silent, and the annoying person who would hum or whistle an accompaniment to every tune that passed his ears. And Aristotle himself refers to spectators who brought out provisions during the dull parts of the performance.
