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## The Mexican Muddle Still Unsettled

That the Mediation conference at Niagara Falls is likely to adjourn and give up the matter as a hopeless tangle is the latest report as we go to press. The split between Villa and Carranza in Northern Mexico seems to be the last straw that broke the camel's back. Huerta's representatives have held that the new president of Mexico should be from either the Federal party or a "neutral," while the Washington government has always insisted that the appointee should be from the Constitutionalist ranks and as at present there are three divisions of the latter party it is impossible to select a candidate from one division without offending the members of the other two.

After weary weeks of "watchful waiting" the only result seems to be that the Mexicans, both Federal and Constitutionalist, have secured ample supplies of both arms and ammunition which may later be used with effect against the United States troops should this government attempt to enforce order in that benighted land.

In the meantime the U. S. is spending thousands of dollars per day keeping her squadrons in Mexican waters. The old Texan adage, "Never pull your gun unless you mean to use it," might have been studied with good results in the beginning of this unfortunate affair.

If Mr. Wilson is correct in his views as to the need of regulating the trusts, we hope to see him go ahead and finish the job while he is at it, the state bankers to the contrary notwithstanding. Bankers like other mortals are prone to be selfish in their views when encroachment upon their preserves is threatened. Capital and labor each play important parts in the development and prosperity of a nation and the capitalist and laborer are alike entitled to protection under a government founded upon the principles of Justice and Equality. That oft quoted phrase in our Declaration of Independence "The greatest good to the greatest number," refers to men—not dollars.

#### First Omnibus.

"Omnibus" was an almost brand new word in its modern sense when Shillibeer took it from the French in 1829, and in France the name possessed a special significance for those who knew their history, for from 1672 to 1676 Paris had already seen a regular service of rotary public vehicles "carrosses a cinq sols." Only these predecessors of the modern bus were not "omnibus" for all. The letters patent which instituted them for the benefit of middle class people and down that they were not to be used by soldiers, mechanics or any other wearers of livery or artisans and laborers. These exclusive vehicles faded out of existence, and the new ones, which were started in Paris in 1828, were named "omnibus" expressly to signify their democratic character. — London Chronicle.

#### Crockett Wouldn't Have Maggie.

The first school the late S. R. Crockett attended was the Free Church school in the village of Laurieston, of that parish, distant three miles from his home. When he was a very wee chap "Sam" used to be accompanied to school by Maggie—a girl somewhat older than himself, who was supposed to look after him. Their daily appearance together led one of the villagers to say to him one day as the couple passed her door: "Man, Sam, I think ye'll be mairryin' Maggie some day, ye're aye together." "Mairry Maggie?" was the indignant boy's response. "She disna ken the names o' the kings o' Israel yet!" The lady whose suggestion to the future novelist was so contemptuously received often recalled the incident with amusement. — Westminster Gazette.

#### Yellow Fever on the Amazon.

Ignitis is a town on the Amazon river within four degrees of the equator. An equatorial swamp not only surrounds the place, but thrusts invading swarms into the city itself. Open sewers run the length of the principal streets, which are quite innocent of paving. Yet an American surgeon, seconded from the public health service and joyfully supported by the Peruvian government of the place, has driven out yellow fever even under such disadvantages as these and reduced the general death rate from forty-nine per thousand per year to twenty-eight. In the face of such an achievement, what excuse has any American city for harboring preventable disease? — Chicago Inter Ocean.

#### Haggis as the Scotch Make It.

To make haggis take the heart, tongue and small liver of the sheep, one pound of bacon, four ounces of crumbs of bread, the rind of one lemon, two eggs, two anchovies (sardines may be used), a quarter of a teaspoonful of pepper and two teaspoonfuls of salt Chop the heart, tongue, liver and bacon, mix thoroughly, add the bread-crumbs, the anchovies, chopped fine; the lemon rind, grated; then the pepper and salt. Beat the eggs and pour them over. Pack this into a kettle or mold, cover and boil or steam continuously for two hours. Turn it on a dish and serve very hot.

#### Seven Wonders of the World.
