THE BALL GAME

Jacksonville Boys Too Much For Medford Score 20 to 3.

The reporter for the Medford Sun, who by the way was official scorer, gives the following account of the game here Sunday afternoon:

Jacksonville so easily defeated the Medford second team in Sunday's game, 20 to 3, that it is quite probable they will jump into the Rogue River Valley League and battle with the top-notchers.

Coffman pitched for the county seat and had his opponents fairly bewildered at the speedy and curved ball which he never failed to put over. He let the local boys down with two hits and struck out 12 men. Cleveland was on the mound for Medford and although he pitched a fair game was unable to keep down the score.

The fielding done by the Jacksonville team was far superior to that of Medford. Dunford, Bagshaw, Abbot starred for the county seat while Cooley, Thomas, Hibon and Henderson practically played the game for the locals. The score:

TO ABOLISH THE SENATE

A young man whose time might be better employed has been in Salem circulating an initiative petition to place upon the ballot for the voters' consid-

eration at the November election the question of abolishing the State Senate.

Here is another piece of experimental legislation, of which Oregon already has more than her share. The government of the State has become one of experiment, and that to the detriment of the good people who make up the population.

Some of us have somehow got the idea into our heads that the more new-fangled legislation we enact the nearer the government is to the people, and there are some who actually believe that if the the upper branch of the legislature can be abolished much good will result.

Slowly but certainly we are getting away from representative government. It is all very nice and sounds well to say that the people shall rule, but the only sensible way for the people to rule is through representatives, and to abolish the State Senate is not going to bring the government any nearer the people than it has been. If this agitation for something new in government will eventually be a one man proposition or it will be a free for all affair entirely lacking in anything like a responsible head, either form being much less satisfactory than that which we now have. In any event, it is hoped the people will deal this latest fancy a death blow at the election in November. A few rebukes in the way of defeats will teach the agitators a lesson which nothing else ever will.

HELD FOR STEALING TURKEYS

Harry Price Says He Was Doped by Partners Who Have Escaped.

Harry Price, alias Harry Lewis, was arrested late yesterday afternoon by Chief of Police Hittson on a charge of stealing fifty turkeys from the Bradshaw ranch in the Antelope district. Price is alleged to have stolen the fowls and sold them to the Hotel Medford and the fish market.

He is supposed to have two partners who helped him in the exploit, but these parties have made their getaway. The turkeys are supposed to have been stolen Monday night, Price and his partners hiring a rig from the West Side stable and proceeding to bag the game drove to the city and sold the turkeys at a fancy price Tuesday.

When arrested Price appeared to be in a senseless condition stating that he remembered nothing since he met up with the two men who worked with him. He maintains that they doped him with cocaine and other drugs.

PORTLAND LETTER

League to Back Oregon Industries. Enlarged Homesteads. First Freight Through Panama Canal Loaded at Portland.

Portland Ore., June 23. (Special)—A new organization, The Oregon Industry League has recently been formed in Portland, the object of which is to conduct an educational campaign for the extension of the use of Oregon made goods of all kinds, for the encouragement of all lines of industry in this state and for the moral and financial backing of all Oregon institutions. L. Samuel, for many years prominent as a leader on the movement for the support of Oregon industries, has been elected president of the organization.

The campaign will be carried on through publications in the state, and the league may in time establish an official publication of its own. Meetings of all kinds, where the league can properly send its speakers will be covered and all large conventions in the state will be attended by its delegates. 21 leading civic and commercial organizations of the city and state sent delegates to assist in the establishment of the new league and it is to bring to its assistance practically every organization of importance in the state.

The Secretary of the Interior has designated a tract of 284,000 acres of land in Oregon for entry under the enlarged homestead law. Most of these lands lie in the Deschutes and John Day river basins.

The first freight vessel to be towed through the Panama Canal was the Grace liner Santa Clara, carrying a cargo of Pacific Coast products, 90 per cent of which was loaded at Portland, nearly all of which will be discharged at New York. The vessel is comparatively new, this being her third trip to the Pacific Coast.

MEDFORD STORE ROBBED

Mysterious Theft of Silk. Thieves Leave No Clue.

Silk amounting to 250 yards, and valued at \$275 was stolen from the M. and M. department store in Medford some time between Saturday night and Monday morning. The theft is one of the most mysterious ones the local police have ever been called to contend with. Although it is thought that the thieves gained entrance through the front door there is no clue to indicate that this method of entrance was used. The loss was discovered Monday noon and telegraphic and letter descriptions of the stolen goods have been sent north and south in an effort to catch the thieves.

INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Manufacturing Enterprises and Improvements Providing Payrolls and Promoting Development of Oregon

(Prepared by the State Bureau of Industries and Statistics.)

Bandon fire losses amounting to \$200,000 are to be rebuilt.

The Oregon Public Utilities commission authorizes increased telephone rates at Newberg, and in the Eugene electric power case, sustains the contention of the Oregon Power Company.

The manufacture of logan berry juice and sawdust are new industries being considered in various parts of the state.

Hood River county will vote on a \$75,000 bond issue for the Columbia highway.

Labor Commissioner Hoff had a meeting of officials of labor boards at Portland to consider needed labor legislation.

Hop growers met at Aurora and protested against putting up their industry with annual product of \$6,000,000 on a popular vote.

Portland millers are to be allowed to bid for army supplies.

Sellwood is to have the first wing of a large hospital built.

Mersey hospital Eugene, will build a \$15,000 training school.

Clackamas county will establish a sand and gravel plant at New Era.

Maupin is to have a new \$15,000 bank building.

The Langreel, Baker county, sawmill will be located on Burnt river.

The State Grange bulletin says not one person in a hundred will pay anything but a land tax if the \$1500 exemption passes.

Albany will have a \$50,000 school erected this year.

Eugene is laying 21,000 feet of water main extensions.

Charles Bordeaux of the American Brewing Co. of Baker has been looking up a location at Fort George, R. C.

Marshfield voted \$15,000 for a high school gymnasium.

The Oregon Power Co. has 100 men at work extending its intake for the Springfield water supply.

Cannery, cannery, is the cry of the Albany business men.

Milwaukie will get a one dollar gas rate from the Portland Gas Co.

Independent harbor bar pilots have reduced rates from \$1.50 to \$1.00 per foot draft for vessels.

Dallas voted fair grounds and septic tank bonds.

Force of laborers doubled on the Hill terminals at Flavel.

Lane county hop crop this year will be \$350,000.

Albany loganberry drier handled 8000 pounds a day.

The 1914 wool crop brought Oregon \$2,080,000.

Mrs. Hogue will build a \$200,000 hotel at Eleventh and Washington streets Portland.

It is claimed that the \$1500 tax exemption for "every person" would allow whole families to take out \$1500 apiece and virtually establish the single land tax in Oregon.

The new quarter of a million feet a day electric sawmill of the Booth-Kelly Co., at Springfield was given a trial the past week.

Under the head of a state industrial survey the water power on the Rogue river is to be investigated with a view to putting the state into the business of generating electric power.

Astoria is to have the most powerful wireless telegraph station.

A franchise has been granted the Pacific Power and Light Co. to build 4 miles of streetcar lines in Clatsop county running from Astoria.

Porter Bros. expect to add 800 men to their force on the Tillamook lake section of the Willamette Pacific, south of Florence.

Portland municipal dock No. 1 will be enlarged to hold two large ships at the same time.

DIRECT LEGISLATIVE SYSTEM

The voters of Oregon will pass on 24 amendments to the constitution and 13 bills at the November election.

More are being incubated and there will probably be forty statewide propositions and perhaps twice as many local municipal measures.

Many of these bills if not all will impose new burdens on the people, invent new taxes, create new boards and offices. Here are some of them:

To grant to "every person" a \$1500 exemption on assessed valuation. Household goods are all ready exempt.

Two tax amendments to allow taxation of incomes, "proportional, graduated or progressive taxation," whatever that may be.

A sur-tax amendment of 50¢ per \$100 on all above \$25,000, and graduated to \$1 per \$100 on all above \$100,000.

A tax on all land not public property. This would tax churches, colleges not owned by the state, and is in line with single tax ideas.

To create the office of Lieutenant Governor to be president of the Senate and get \$10 a day when Legislature sits.

To abolish the senate. By the State Grange, State Federation of Labor, and Peoples Power League, authors of nearly all the freak legislation in Oregon.

To abolish the death penalty as a punishment for capital crimes.

To prohibit manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors except for medicinal purposes, or for scientific, sacramental or mechanical purposes.

To increase salary of members of the legislature to \$5. per day and mileage to 10 cents.

To authorize state bonds for construction of irrigation and water power projects by the state to amount of 2% of state valuation.

To prohibit paid circulation of initiative and referendum petitions.

For non-partisan judiciary on petition of one percent of the voters.

Proportional representation by Peoples Power League, Grange and Federation of Labor.

To authorize the Governor to remove from office county officials who fail to co-operate with him in enforcement of laws, and appoint others in their places.

To revoke franchises of Portland Gas & Coke Co., by Portland Central Labor Council.

To take over channels of rivers and authorize leasing same to cities, and construction of public docks.

For eight hour day and ventilation of rooms for women workers.

Stringent Sunday law against all places of amusement for gain, by Washington Christian Endeavor Union.

Universal eight hour day in factory or farm.

Special tax for employment of unemployed laborers.

Change election law requiring only fifteen days residence in precinct.

Registration certificate to vote anywhere in the state.
